## ALUMNI PUBLICATIONS HIGHLY REGARDED BY U. N. B. FORMER STUDENTS IN WEST

**Dr. Ernest E. Brydone Jack of Victoria, B. C., Extended Greetings—Dr. H. H. Hagerman of This City Elected President—Twenty Per Cent of Income Given to Endowment Fund.**

The value of the Associated Alumni of the University of New Brunswick in reviving a spirit of affection for Alma Mater and creating a feeling of solidarity was emphasized at the annual meeting of the Society Wednesday night by Dr. Ernest E. Brydone Jack of Victoria B. C., who is not only an alumnus but also a former member of the faculty and a son of Dr. William Brydone Jack for thirty-four years president of the university.

Dr. Brydone Jack when asked to address the Society said that he found himself in the curious position of greeting those who had been his instructors those who had been fellow-graduates and those who had been students instructed by himself. He particularly emphasized the value of the Alumni Bulletin and other publications of the Society in keeping the alumni in the West acquainted with the activities of the university. For himself he could say that he had been amazed at what he had seen when escorted about the buildings and at the evidences of advancement. It would be his great pleasure when coming in contact with graduates in Western cities to tell them of what he had learned.

### New Officers.

The meeting was held in the Ladies' Room at the Arts Building. President W. J. S. Myles of Saint John in the chair. The election of officers resulted as follows:

President, H. H. Hagerman, Fredericton; vice-president, Dr. W. D. Rankin, Woodstock and B. M. Hill Saint John; secretary-treasurer, Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, Fredericton; additional members of the Council, W. J. S. Myles, W. Brodie and E. C. Weyman, Saint John; P. J. Hughes Hon. C. D. Richards and C. McN. Steeves, Fredericton; J. T. Hebert, Campbellton. Representatives to the Senate, Lieut.-Col. W. H. Harrison Saint John and Hon. Mr. Justice Crocket, Fredericton. Other repre-

sentatives to the Senate are B. M. Hill and C. McN. Steeves.

Chesler Gregory of Halifax and A. Douglas Foster of Montreal were elected to membership.

The financial statement was presented by the treasurer and in accordance with a previous motion that twenty percent of the annual income be devoted to the Endowment Fund, the sum of \$337.91 was credited to that fund.

### Alumni Medal.

Examiners for the Alumni Medal for transportation of English prose into Latin reported to the effect that no award be made this year and the report was adopted.

The special committee composed of A. S. McFarlane, J. B. McNair and Geoffrey Stead named to investigate the decrease in the number of contestants for the Alumni Medal, reported that the decrease was caused by the addition of courses in which Latin is not required. The committee expressed the belief that the opportunity existed in High School and University to prepare for such competition and recommended that the medal be awarded as in the past. The suggestion was made that students in the Freshman and Sophomore years be encouraged to write short translations as a preparation for the competition.

### Brydone Jack Scholarship.

Professor A. F. Baird reported that the Brydone Jack scholarship for physics had been tied for by W. W. Donohoe of Saint John and C. N. Steeves and it was decided to divide the scholarship between the two.

C. McN. Steeves recommended that steps be taken to hold a re-union in 1928 to commemorate the centennial of the opening of the Arts building and this recommendation was referred to the Council.

Dr. Walter C. Murray, president of the University of Saskatchewan, was elected to honorary membership.

W. J. S. Myles reported on the ac-

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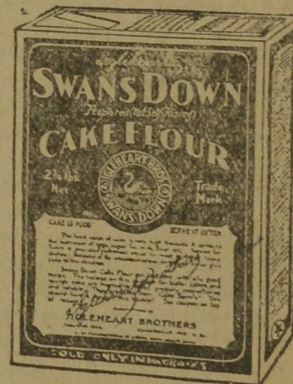
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
