HEAT WAVE COMING EASTWARD

ADMIRER OF VALENTINO IS A SUICIDE

London Girl Was Grieved Over Movie Star's Death.

HAD LETTERS FROM HIM

Had Spent Hours Watching Films in Which He Appeared.

London, Aug. 25—Miss Peggy Scott, a 26 year old girl, committed suicide here today, apparently because of grief over the death of Rudolph Valentino, whom she met frequently at Biarritz.

There were letters from Valentino in her bedroom and she left a letter to a friend in which she gave evidence of grief over the actor's death. Miss Scott told lodge friends that she "simply worshipped" Rudolph and that she spent hours watching films in which he appeared.

PARIS DEMANDS ADVERTISING BE REMOVED

Paris, Aug. 26—Considerable protest is being made in Paris over the use of the Eiffel Tower for radio broadcasting and electrical display advertising. "Le Temps" particularly is attacking these innovations of the last few years as assaulting the tower like "a vulgar Bastille," but without bugles or trumpets. Many Parisians resent the transformation of one of their most famous attractions into a commercial display. Such use of the Eiffel Tower is even compared to the foreigner who wanted to hire the Arc de Triomphe for a party to friends. Parisians who have jealously guarded their city's beauty find advertising flashed from the tower's sides an increasing eyesore.

Although the tower makes an ideal location for a big radio station the French are beginning to complain that it does more harm than good and are asking that the Eiffel Tower be restored to its former dignity.

THE BOB AND SHINGLE HAS REACHED CHINA

London, Aug. 26—The cult of the "bob" and the "shingle" has spread to China, according to Miss Qui Sing Wong, a young Chinese woman who has just arrived here to take a course in hairdressing.

"I am going to take a permanent waving machine back to China with me," Miss Wong said in an interview, "and I expect to do a great business with it."

"A year or two ago there was not a bobbed head in China. Now very many girls have adopted that and the shingle bob of hairdressing."

"I intend to open a beauty culture saloon and hairdressing establishment in Hong Kong. It is a great improvement to have the hair waved and Chinese women who have hitherto worn their hair sleek and short look charming with it curled."

Bride Wore Red Gown and the Groom a Red Shirt.

PARADED THE STREETS

Wanted to Defy the Antiquated Burgeois Tradition.

Waldenburg, Silesia, Aug. 26—A red bridal gown and a red shirt and tie were worn by a bride and groom here at their wedding in order that they could make sure the world would recognize them as Communists.

After the ceremony at the registrar's office the couple paraded in their unusual wedding garb through the streets of the city and told their friends that they desired to defy antiquated "bourgeois" tradition regulating wedding clothing.

OXFORD FINDS A WOODGATE LOST FOR YEARS

London, Aug. 26—Balliol College, Oxford, has found a gate belonging to the college which was lost 200 years ago. The gate is probably the oldest in England, having been built for Balliol in 1288 according to the purchase record in the college books.

For 500 years generations of belated students kicked the gate's timbers to get in after hours. Late in the eighteenth century the gate was missing after the quadrangle was remodeled. It now has been discovered, its oak panels well preserved under a hundred coats of paint and has been repurchased by a group of graduates and given to the college.

THE BLACK EYE BUSINESS NOT PROSPEROUS

Brooklyn, Aug. 26—Lew Alberts, who admits in a sign outside his shop at 87 Sands street, that he is the "world's champion black-eye repairman," says the water front district here is becoming too peaceful and that he may have to move to a more turbulent neighborhood. "I used to be in the old Bowery, around Chatham Square," he said "but they cleaned that up and Sands street was the toughest place I could find. My best business comes from the sailors, but with prohibition and other things it's falling off to nothing."

SPATTEES UP TO KNEES WITH SHORT SKIRTS

London, Aug. 26—They're still wearing 'em higher in London but owing to the well known British climate women of the British metropolis are beginning to wonder whether knee length skirts and silk stockings will be suitable for winter.

Last year an effort was made to popularize soft leather Russian boots for winter wear. This year a successor has been found in "spattees"—contrivances which are a cross between spats and men's golf stockings. These are made of wool in bright colors and reach to just below the knee.

ATTEMPTS TO SET FREE THE DEPOSED GREEK DICTATOR A FAILURE

Pangalos Has Been Transferred From the Island of Argina to a Prison Fortress — New Elections in Greece to be Held in October—Wholesale Replacements in the Russian Army are Reported.

ATHENS, Aug. 26—An attempt to liberate General Theodore Pangalos, the Deposed dictator failed today and Pangalos was transferred from the Island of Aegina to the prison fortress of Izeddin on the Island of Crete, where the inhabitants are anti-Pangalos.

General Vitalosy, chief of the Greek air service was arrested today when he tried to persuade the officers guarding Pangalos on Aegina to permit him to escape to Italy in an airplane. New elections will probably be held in October.

Some Important Changes

London, Aug. 26—The Berlin correspondent of the Daily Express quoting official news from Moscow, says that Leon Trotzky has been granted an indefinite leave of absence from the Russian capital, that Commander Hoff of the Russian fleet has been dismissed and that there have been wholesale replacements in the leadership of the army.

FATHER LOST WEDDING GOWN OF DAUGHTER

Paris, Aug. 26—A Parisian father whose daughter was about to be married was asked to stop at the outfitter's for the wedding dress, veil, gloves, shoes and orange blossom wreath. He received the complete bridal array in a large cardboard box, but en route to his home he paused at a cafe.

At midnight when he arrived at his home he put down the precious package while opening the door. He then walked up stairs, forgetting it. A few minutes later he rushed madly down again to find that the bridal outfit had vanished. He has offered a reward for its return to the weeping bride-to-be.

TRAFFIC COPS STILL FIND TIME TO CHAT

London, Aug. 26—Proof that London's traffic problem is not yet so perplexing as New York's is furnished by the appeal broadcast by the secretary of the Automobile Association to drivers not to pull up in the middle of the street to ask the way from traffic policemen, but to park their cars by the curb, get out and proceed on foot to ask questions.

Americans in London who were interviewed as to their opinions of what would happen if a driver on Fifth Avenue stopped in the middle of the street to ask the way from a cop seemed unable to express coherent opinions.

Last Thursday Half-holiday.

The last Thursday half-holiday of the season is being observed today by business establishments in the city. On account of the reopening of the schools today, stores dealing in school books did not close during the afternoon.

TO FACE COURT FOR BREVIETY OF BEACH GARB

Genoa, Italy, Aug. 26—Several hundred men and women bathers at the beaches here have been ordered to appear before the court to answer charges of being immodestly attired. The new modesty regulations had their first application yesterday and the authorities gathered in all bathers who did not conform to the restrictions. There were exciting arguments in the course of the police raids and some fighting. Many of the women protested against the activities of the special costume censors.

41 CABARETS IN CHICAGO ARE LOCKED

Chicago, Aug. 26—Saxophones were stilled in 41 cabarets and night clubs here early today and padlocks on doors explained that liquor law violations had caused the government to close them for one year.

Included in the list of places closed was the Avalon, the midnight to dawn rendezvous of the gayest of Chicago's social set.

One hundred and ten other places must show cause why they should not be closed before Federal Judge Adam C. Cliff.

Died in Hospital.

The death of Albert L. Duplissea of Fredericton Junction occurred this morning in Victoria Public Hospital to which he had been admitted on Wednesday. Strangulated hernia with complications caused death. The deceased was aged eighty years and eleven months and was one of the oldest residents of Fredericton Junction where he carried on the occupation of wheelwright and blacksmith for many years. He was a prominent member of the Orange order and of other organizations. A large family survives. Mrs. Howard H. Blair of this city is a daughter. The body will be taken to Fredericton Junction for interment.

MARITIME COMMISSION AT WINNIPEG

Winnipeg, Aug. 25—Informal conferences with persons interested in the routing of grain, especially representatives of firms which export large quantities of grain from western Canada, will occupy the attention here of the Maritime Rights Commission, the members of which arrived in Winnipeg tonight.

The commission will be in the city at least two days and probably longer, a member of the board stated on arrival, but no information was divulged as to the nature of the inquiry to be conducted here beyond the fact that "only informal conversations would be held."

To Be Guest of Friends.

Sir Andrew Rea Duncan, chairman of the commission, will be the guest during his stay here of James D. Paterson, a friend of his college days.

At the conclusion of their investigation here the Commission will return to Montreal, where a public hearing will be held next week at which the representatives of the railways will be given an opportunity to express their views in regard to the representations presented in the Maritimes touching upon the transportation of grain overseas through Canadian Atlantic ports.

HEAT WAVE HAS STRUCK PARTS OF U. S.

Is Now Moving Towards States Near Great Lakes.

10 DEGREES AT PIERRE, S.D.

Near Tropical Heat in Northwestern States.

Chicago, Aug. 26—A heat wave was moving toward the lakes states today United States weather bureau officials announced, almost tropical heat has been registered in the northwest.

Pierre, South Dakota, reported 106 degrees at Miles City, Montana, registered 104, at Walla Walla, Washington it was 102, Salt Lake City reported 98, Bismarck, N. D., 98 and Minneapolis, 92.

NO LADY WAS NAMED ON THE TARIFF BOARD

Kipling, Sask., Aug. 25—Premier Arthur Meighen referred to Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King here today as the "man who fooled the women of Canada."

Mr. Meighen was referring to Mr. King in his promise in the last election that he intended to appoint a woman to his advisory tariff board.

The tariff board was appointed, Mr. Meighen added, consisted of three men, not one of them even looked like a woman. A promise of that kind, said Mr. Meighen, made just to get the women's votes, was an insult to the women of Canada.

Mr. Meighen, speaking of the Crow's Nest rates, said his objection was not to low railway rates. The lower they were the better so long as the railways could run. What he objected to was the principle of Parliament fixing rates for one part of the country.

"They tell you," Mr. Meighen said, "that Meighen is going to put the higher rates back." He has no more idea of doing that than he has of cutting his throat. No party of which I am the head will take any step leading to higher rates in this country."

NO DECISION ANNOUNCED.

Liberal Delegation from York-Sunbury Waited Upon Ex-Premier King at Saint John.

No decision has been announced concerning the holding of a Liberal nominating convention for York-Sunbury. On Wednesday a delegation from the constituency waited upon ex-Premier W. L. M. King at Saint John and discussed the situation with him. It was stated today that no announcement was to be made as the result of the conference. In the delegation were Hon. D. W. Mersereau, ex-M. L.
