The regular August meeting of the School Board of Fredericton which took place Wednesday evening concerned itself largely with /business connected with the reopening of the schools. Chief among the items of business was the presentation of a petition from residents of the eastern the withdrawal of one of the three departments which have been maintained for several years at the Morrison School.

This petition was presented by Rev. A. F. Bate, rector of Fredericton, and requested that the School Board continue to operate three departments and that Grade VIII be established in addition to the grades already there; riosn School.

Legislation Would Be Necessary. Rev. Mr. Bate was heard at some length in support of this petition and Woodstock; L. R. Hetherington, consideration was promised. It was Cody; G. J. Marr, Saint John; P. of the Wisely school district.

#### Returned From Ontario.


