Special Joint Action by Committees on Offer Of Maritime Electric Co.

Very Low Rate for Current to Operate the City Pumps After 11 P. M. is Mentioned by Company's Manager—Water and Light Committees to Consider Matter—Short Meeting of City Council.

The City Council disposed of its regular monthly meeting in short order Tuesday night. The business was chiefly routine. Among new business, the chief was the decision to have the Street Lighting Committee and the Water committee take action with regard to the offer of The Maritime Electric company to furnish current for the operation of the new pumping unit of the water-works at a special low rate after 11 p. m. possibly less than 2 cents.

Municipal Home.
For the Municipal Home Committee Ald. Smith reported that \$498.32 had been spent at the Home during September and \$91.25 for outside relief making a total of \$589.57. On his motion a cheque for \$200 in favor Commissioner Niles was ordered to issue.

An application of E. S. Inch for a flat rate for water to be used in Inch Ice Machines was referred to the Water Committee.

On motion of Ald. McKnight the annual grant to the Children's Aid Society was placed at \$600.

Named as Delegates.
Ald. Davidson and Ald. Currier were appointed delegates to the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities.

Offer of Maritime Electric Co.
Ald. Davidson reported that the Maritime Electric Co. had offered to furnish current for the operation of the city's pumping unit from 11 p.m. on till morning at a rate lower than the city could generate current. This was not only for Hospital lighting but for the operation of the pumps. The manager of the company had mentioned a two cent rate and had said the rate might even be lower than that. There also would be saving of wear and tear on the pumping unit and time for the staff to make repair work.

Ald. Davidson's motion that the matter be referred for joint action to the Water and Street Lighting Committees was carried.

COMMANDED BLOCK HOUSE AT MAUGERVILLE

Grand Father of Famous N. S. Politician Once Lived Near Here

(Occasional in Halifax Recorder.)
A noted residence on Barrington St. is offered for sale. Three generations of people have occupied this old residence. Back as far as 1829 it was occupied by Laurence Doyle, a Halifax merchant, who was in the West India trade. He built the house, and resided there until he died. He was president of the Charitable Irish Society in 1829-1830-1831, and was succeeded by the Hon. Michael Tobin, in 1832. He was the father of Laurence O'Connor Doyle, and before erecting the residence opposite the Ladies' College had leased from Bishop Burke what was afterwards the old Glebe House, at the corner of Barrington Street and Spring Garden Road. Mr. Doyle's father-in-law was Constant O'Connor, who was a United Empire Loyalist. During the American Revolution, Lieutenant O'Connor was Commanding Officer at Oromocto Block House, near Maugerville, then in the Province of Nova Scotia. Major Studholme commanded at Fort Howe in 1781, which was garrisoned by Royal Fencible Americans, and among his subordinates were Peter Clinch, Samuel Denny Street, Ambrose Shurman and Constance O'Connor. At the close of the revolution, Lieut. O'Connor came to Halifax and settled. It is stated by Seabean, in his History of the United Empire Loyalists, that Lieutenant

O'Connor killed a man in a duel. Where it was fought, he does not say. Mr. O'Connor died in the thirties of the last century, in the Doyle house, on Barrington Street.


Laurence O'Connor Doyle, the son of Laurence Doyle, was born on the 27th of February, 1804. He was educated at Stonyhurst College, England. When he returned from college he was articled to Richard John Uniacke, Sr., (the old Attorney General.) After being admitted to the Bar, he was returned for Isle Madame for the House of Assembly, being the second Catholic to take his seat in the House after the removal of the disabilities against Roman Catholics.

Hon. Joseph Howe said: "Mr. Doyle and I commenced life together, and have a thousand socialities which neither can readily forget. Many of the gayest and most instructive of our days and nights were spent together. We spent them—not in sport or wine—but in search of deep philosophy, wit, eloquence and poesy; arts which I loved, for they, my friend, were thine." "I might say," continued, Mr. Howe, "that Mr. Doyle is the only man I ever knew who had not an enemy; whose humor never flagged; whose wit never wounded; who, by common consent, was everywhere welcome, and who, if immortality could be conferred by universal suffrage, everybody would vote that he would enliven every scene of festivity down to the end of time. I am quite sure, if he lived so long, the last trump would drown the ring of merry voices over his last jest."

The old house, in old days, rang with his merry jests, when he was a bright young law student, and his humor enlivened the household.






