A NEW INDUSTRY.

The announcement that the Canadian Paxeasy Barrel Company, Limited, has secured sufficient capital to justify the granting of letters patent, should greatly interest the people of this city and vicinity. While many would like to have seen the industry established within the city limits, it will be generally admitted that provisional directors have displayed good judgment in their decision to locate at Nashwaaksis. The erection of suitable buildings in the city would have entailed a considerable capital outlay at a time when building costs are inclined to be high, whereas at Nashwaaksis the concern has been able to secure on a rental basis suitable buildings practically ready for the installation of the necessary machinery. It is the intention of the company to have the plant in operation just as soon as the necessary machinery can be procured and installed. Mr. W. H. Wilkes, the promoter of the company, and patentee of the barrel which it is proposed to manufacture is now on a trip to the United States and while absent will purchase what machinery is needed to allow the company to begin operations.

Mr. Wilkes has certainly been most fortunate in securing the co-operation and support of such men as Messrs. Elwood Burr and J. Stanley Scott, of this city, both experienced lumbermen, who enjoy the confidence of the public to a marked degree. Messrs. Burr and Scott are busy men, and are already doing more than their share towards developing the natural resources of this section of the province. Mr. Burr operates a large sawmill at Burr's Corner and at the present time he has three hundred men and forty pair of horses at work in the woods getting out his season's lumber cut. As for Mr. Scott he is probably the largest individual pulpwood operator in the province today. He is cutting pulpwood in no less than seven counties of the province, employs an army of men, winter and summer and is shipping train loads of the product each week to the American market. He might very well have passed the buck in this case, but like Mr. Burr he believes that a whole lot can be done towards developing the hardwood industry in this province and somebody has got to take the laboring oar. Experience has taught both of these gentlemen that if our young men are to be retained in the country employment must be found for them, otherwise they cannot stay even if disposed to do so. If Fredericton possessed a few more men of their splendid type there would be less cause to grumble about hard times. The Mail heartily congratulates the promoters of this new industry on their success in getting it launched and hopes that it will develop and enjoy prosperity.

The industrial town of New Glasgow, N. S., is proud of the fact, that it has provided the Dominion with three Lieutenant Governors, two for Nova Scotia and one for Ontario. New Brunswick has a town or rather a village, with a population equal to that of one ward of New Glasgow, which has a pretty creditable record in this regard. We have reference to Gagetown the county seat of Queens. Gagetown was the birthplace of the late Sir Leonard Tilley, a gifted statesman and father of Confederation, who was twice Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick and it was also the birthplace of Hon. G. H. V. Bulyea, the first Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Alberta.
