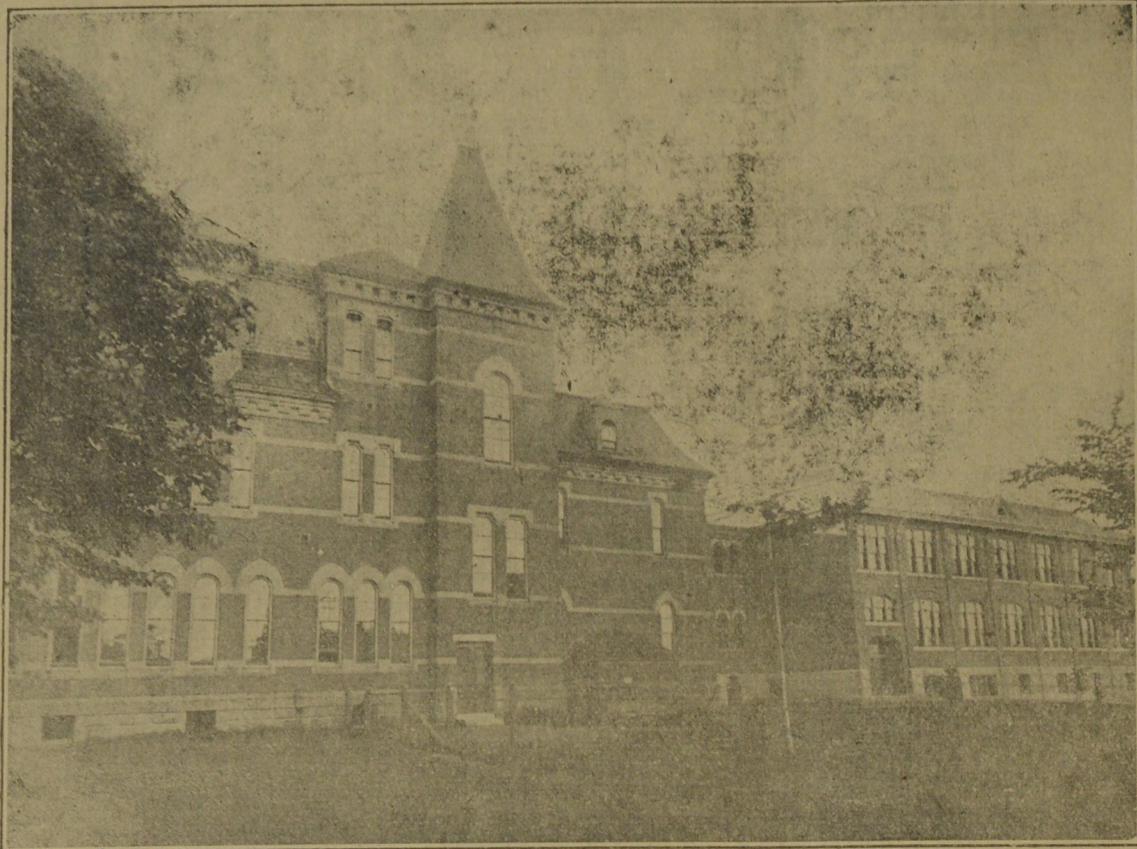

## THE HISTORY OF THE ROTARY MOVEMENT; WAS STARTED IN CHICAGO IN 1911 AND TOOK HOLD

(From John O'London's Weekly.)  
In 1905 a certain lawyer, Paul P. Harris, who is still living, found himself a stranger in Chicago with no friends beyond his clients and few opportunities of becoming acquainted with men of interests other than the law. On discussing the matter with three of his clients, a mining operator, a coal dealer, and a tailor, he discovered that each of these men, while thoroughly conversant with all branches of his own business, was lamentably ignorant of, though eager to become acquainted with, the various aspects of the other man's job. At this early stage these four men realized that a fuller comprehension of other spheres of business and professional life, if developed on a basis of mutual help, would be a great asset to each of them. Thereupon it was decided that a series of meetings should be held in turn at each of the men's places of business, when the host for the day would discourse briefly and clearly upon his own trade or profession, bearing in mind that each of his listeners followed different callings from his own, and that therefore any secrets of process, product, or development that he might divulge would not be given to trade rivals.

This was the germ of Rotary, which gained its name from the fact that its early meetings were held in rotation at each of its members' houses. The original four had held only a few such gatherings before applications arrived from representatives of other trades and industries in Chicago. At the end of the first year a membership of 50 was attained, and by this time it was found impossible to visit each of the members' houses; so, instead, a weekly luncheon was arranged at a Chicago hotel. This luncheon arrangement persists in all clubs today.

### A Proud Motto.

Three years after the inception of the Chicago club, a second was formed at San Francisco, an example rapidly followed by other towns in America. Canada also adopted the scheme, and in 1911 two businessmen from London and Manchester who had visited America brought Rotarianism to this country. Soon afterwards Dublin, Belfast, Glasgow, Edinburgh, Liverpool, and Birmingham became scenes of Rotary activity, and, together with London and Manchester, were the eight original clubs in these islands. In 1921 there were 50, while today this number has increased to 220, with a combined membership of nearly 15,000. Altogether the movement has spread to 33 nations embracing 2,230 clubs, and this growth is progressing steadily every year.

One of the benefits made possible by the international character of the movement is that a member of one club is automatically a member of them all, and if he visits a foreign town where Rotary exists, he is sure of a welcome and of such assistance as the club affords.

The objects of Rotary are epitomized in the official motto, "Service above Self," its chief aim being to show the way to a higher ethical standard in business and professional dealings. The cheating shopkeeper, the politician who places personal ambition before the welfare of his country, the manufacturer who profits from shoddy goods, anyone, in fact, who does not give the general community a fair deal, is foreign in outlook to the Rotary movement. By a close study of business ethics, Rotary strives to build up a non-political, non-sectarian, and international fellowship for business. During the last few weeks this element of the movement has been recognized by the League of Nations, with which Rotary is now in active co-operation, towards cementing a world peace by fostering honest ideals in international trade.

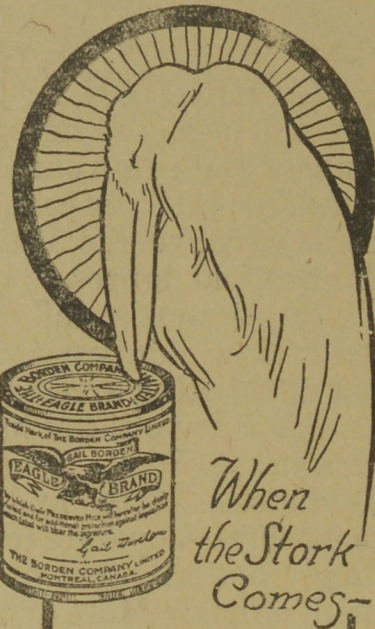
### Useful Work.

An example of the community service achieved by Rotary is to be found at Bristol, where the local club has organized the Repertory Theatre, whose performances of first-class plays have earned it a place among the foremost theatres in England. In other parts of the country Rotary clubs have founded boys' homes, arranged committees for the help of ex-Servicemen, and called meetings of employers and employed to settle industrial grievances.

Once a week throughout the year every club holds a luncheon, after which a chosen speaker deals with a subject on which he has some special knowledge. The lunch hour was originally selected for this function as being the time most conveniently spared by all members. The subjects discussed cover a very wide range, a natural consequence of the diverse interests of the members.

Among scores of recent titles the following are representative: "How I Earned My First Shilling," "Arts and Crafts of Old Japan," "The National Milk Supply," "The Garden City Movement," "A Short History of Dentistry," "Literature and Journalism," "My Experiences as a Political Agent," "My Experiences as a Test Match Player in Australia" (by Herbert Sutcliffe), "Caliban on Strike" (by Sir Frank Benson), and so on and so on.

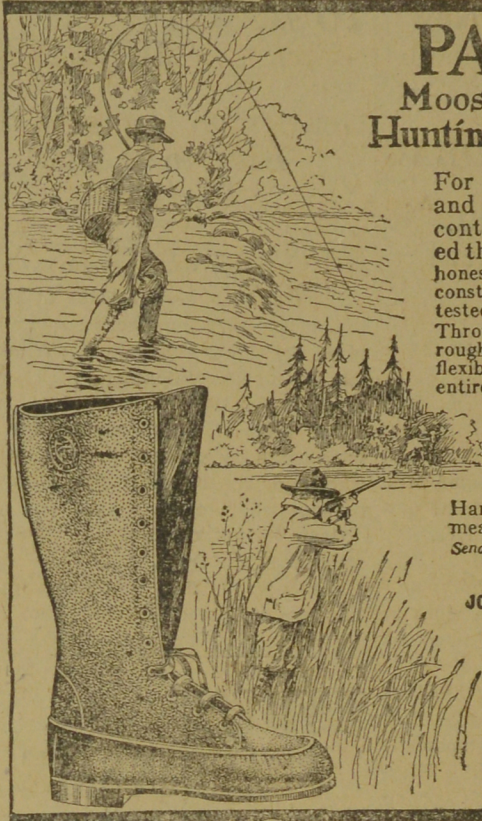
