

Municipal Council Elected New Warden at First Session

Coun. John Cowperthwaite Succeeds Coun. J. T. Christie—Special Committee on Bright Election Protest—Standing Committees Named and Other Routine Business Done.

The Municipal Council of York at the opening session Tuesday afternoon elected Coun. John Cowperthwaite Warden. The new warden who succeeds Warden J. T. Christie is senior councillor for the Parish of St. Mary's and has sat at the Council for a long period of time. In addition to electing a warden the Council heard an address by the Chaplain, Rev. G. C. Warren, pastor of the Brunswick street Baptist Church in this city and referred the matter of the protest election on the Parish of Bright to a special committee to investigate and report. Standing committees also were named by the Warden and the report of the County auditor received and referred to the proper committee.

Tuesday Afternoon.

The Council opened its annual session at two o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Warden J. T. Christie presided. Rev. G. C. Warren, Chaplain to the Council, conducted the customary devotional exercises.

On the invitation of the presiding officer Rev. Mr. Warren addressed the Councillors on the topics of the day. He referred to the recent Provincial general election and to the result in York which placed Dr. B. H. Dougan and Ex-Warden Grant, both valued former members of the council being placed in the Provincial Legislature. He considered that their municipal activities qualified them well for a wider sphere.

The Federal election had resulted satisfactorily to no one. Progressives

had emerged at the small end of the horn. Liberals had been disappointed. Conservatives had failed to achieve their expected victory. It was a matter for regret that the result had been indecisive as capable leadership was urgently needed.

There was pressing need for improved conditions. It was true that there was increased expenditure being made on education but the exodus to the United States had reached a point as serious as in the "nineties."

Concerning world politics the speaker said that a new day had dawned in Europe as the result of the Locarno Treaty. In religious life most significant facts has been the formation of the United Church of Canada, the observation of the Holy Year by the Roman Catholic Church and the Universal Conference at Stockholm. The latter he considered a grand demonstration of the Christian spirit.

New Warden Elected.

The election of the new warden was in order. Coun. Clarkson placed in nomination his colleague Coun. John Cowperthwaite saying that he was senior to himself by four years and had given the Parish of St. Mary's and the County of York long and faithful service.

Coun. Tilley Bird seconded the nomination and Coun. Cowperthwaite was elected by unanimous vote.

Warden Christie who was retiring from office thanked the councillors for the support and assistance which he had received from them during his term as Warden. He then escorted the newly elected Warden to the chair.

Address of Thanks.

Warden Cowperthwaite then addressed the Council. He said he must express his thanks for the confidence evidently reposed in him in his unanimous election to the Wardenship. He realized his inability to perform the duties as they should be performed but with the help of his fellow members he would succeed. He noticed that at the present session, as a result of the recent election, many new faces were before him. Each bore a look of intelligence and he believed that the present Council was the equal of those which had preceded it. He had listened to the remarks of the Chaplain with interest and all must recognize that Rev. Mr. Warren had a good grasp of world events.

Auditor's Report.

The interim report of the County Auditor, Robert Carter, on expenditure since November 30th, was read by County Secretary-Treasurer J. S. Scott.

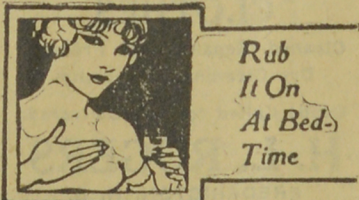

When agate ware, sheet iron and tin dishes become burned brown and unsightly they can be renovated by using a solution of concentrated lye. Put the solution into an iron pot or an old kettle. Submerge the dishes to be cleaned in the solution adding water enough to cover. Set aside, out of the way of children, for several days. Remove and test with a little piece of cloth and an abrasive powder. The burned surface should have either disappeared or can be rubbed off without trouble or effort. If not, put back and leave a while longer.

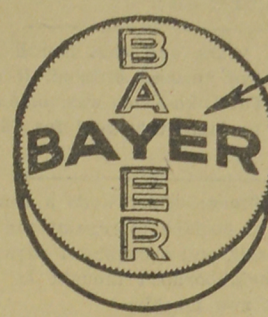
