Ottawa, Jan. 5.—A new development in parliamentary circles is the proposal of the Conservatives to oppose the re-election of Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux as Speaker of the house, so that it is possible that the first test vote of the house will be on the first day, Thursday of this week, when this preliminary to the opening of the parliament on Friday must be disposed of. If the Conservatives carry out their present threat, it is likely they will propose some English-speaking member of the house, which would precipitate a division.

"Matters are proceeding in a satisfactory manner and the result of today's conference will be the subject of an announcement to be made in a day or two," said Premier MacKenzie King tonight at the conclusion of the cabinet meeting, part of which was occupied with an interview between the federal ministers and Premier J. E. Brownlee and Hon. V. W. Smith, of Alberta on the question of the return to that province of its natural resources.

**Brownlie Satisfied.**

When Premier Brownlee emerged from the conference earlier in the afternoon he expressed satisfaction with its outcome, but intimated that whatever public statement was made as to the details of the arrangement made would come from Premier King. Premier Brownlee and his colleague left early this evening for Montreal, where tomorrow they will consult with officials of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways on the disposition of the Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia Railway. They will go from that city to Toronto tomorrow night.

**King Sees Byng.**

Following the cabinet meeting Premier King went to Government House for a final consultation with His Excellency the Governor-General regarding the speech from the throne and matters relating to the opening of Parliament. Another meeting of the ministers will be held tomorrow afternoon to make further preparations for the business of the session.

Tomorrow morning there will be an informal conference of prominent members of the Conservative party, to be followed in the afternoon by a caucus.

London, Jan. 6.—Fashions somewhat topsy-turvy. Wrist watches among the smart set are becoming are being worn at present above the elbow on all sorts of colored ribbons, and a very few "knee watches" have been seen tucked into garters worn just above the knee. **TO EXCAVATE SITE OF CITY OF MISPAH****Is Hopeful of Finding Some Key to the Hittite Language.**

(Special to the DAILY MAIL by the British United Press)  
New York, Jan. 6.—Dean William Wade of the Pacific School of Religion and Professor of Semitic literature, will organize an expedition to excavate the site of the city of Mizpah in Palestine, in hopes of finding some key to the Hittite language, he declared before sailing for Egypt today.

The history of the Hittites is one of the greatest gaps in ancient history. Prof. Wade declared the people who came to Palestine before them, the Egyptians and those who came afterward having given up the task of deciphering the many inscriptions the language.

**EEL CATCHERS IN NOVA SCOTIA MAKE MONEY**

Liverpool, Jan. 5.—The season's catch of eels on the river above Milton has been very satisfactory and a large catch was taken. Following are the amounts taken by the different parties:

Mnithorne Bros., 3½ tons; H. B. Freeman, 4 tons; Jas. Combs, ¾ ton; Leslie Croft, 1,360 pounds; Fred Braine, 1 ton; Clifford Dexter, 1 ton; Ernest McKenna, 1,390 pounds; John Francis, ¾ ton.

The catch is about the same as last season, and most of the eels were shipped to the United States, where they brought on an average of 13 cents per pound. Some of the eels taken were very large, weighing as high as seven and eight pounds, and averaging about 1½ pounds each.

Each year, an increasing number of inhabitants go eel fishing, and find it very profitable work. Many of the other rivers and brooks in Queens County are found to have large eel beds, and large catches were taken this year at Broad River.

**RUMOR OF ENGAGEMENT IS UNFOUNDED**

Copenhagen, Jan. 6.—Replying to an enquiry, the master of ceremonies of the Swedish court telegraphed the United Press that rumors of the engagement of the Prince of Wales and Princess Astrid of Sweden were unfounded. A report of a forthcoming visit of Princess Astrid to England had recently given rise to rumors that this might foreshadow her marriage to the Prince of England.

**GLOBE ROBIN PAID VISIT TO FREDERICTON**

The Globe Robin seems to be making a transcontinental flight over Canada. Sighted in Fredericton, N. B., Dec. 28 he has been reported since in various Ontario localities and yesterday was "cited in despatches" from Winnipeg.

Writing to The Globe from the New Brunswick Capital, under date of Dec. 31, W. E. McMullen says: "On Monday, Dec. 28, I saw perched in the mountain ash tree just outside our kitchen window what I certainly took to be 'The Globe robin' on his way westward. (It is a most unusual thing to see a robin at this time of the year, particularly in our latitude of 46 degrees north.)"
