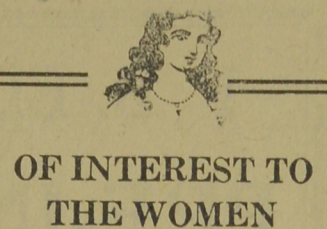

HOMEMAKING IS A GIFT AS WELL AS A HARD JOB—HERE'S THE SECRET.

Learn From Others' Experience How to Make Good Sauce—Iron Linen—Clean Agate Ware.

The next time you make apple sauce and wish to give your family something especially appetizing and delicious try the following plan: When you put the apples over the fire to cook add a good pinch of salt. Cook and sweeten in the usual manner, lastly adding a small piece of butter. Beat into the apple sauce. The amount of butter will be in proportion to the number of apples cooked. An ordinary amount for a family of four or five will call for butter the size of a nutmeg. Season with either nutmeg or cinnamon as preferred.

Clean napkins, snow white and freshly pressed, add so much to the appetizing appearance of any table that the wonder is any one ever uses a soiled one. The extra laundry work entailed is usually the excuse for using linen beyond its first freshness. However, by following this simple plan clean napkins are available with a very few minutes' work every day in the week or every other day at farthest.

Buy one of the small washboards to be had in the house furnishing department and sometimes found in the 5 and 10 cents stores. These are for washing handkerchiefs and other small articles. Use a little oval pan. A small bath pan or an agate ware dish of good size will answer.

Just when the breakfast dishes are finished wash out the napkins any tray cloths or dories, in the pan, using the little board. Three or four minutes will do it. Soap and put on to scald in the little pan. By the time the kitchen is swept up the linen pieces can be rinsed, blued and hung in any convenient place. This may be on a side porch or in the basement, if the weather is cold, or on bars in the kitchen. While lunch is being prepared iron these small pieces.

There are two secrets to be learned in having linen look its best at all times. The first secret is to press until thoroughly dry, fold and press until shining—then lay the pieces singly upon a clean newspaper in a warm place for an hour or so. If the articles are piled up they will be lost and the ironing will look like a piece of hasty cheap work.

The other secret is to have a small ironing board and an iron right at hand to use without any special effort every day and at any time. The old plan of putting the ironing things away for the week is relegated to the past, when people only took one bath a week and only shaved for church on Sunday. The standards of a family may be distinctly raised and its manners improved by immaculate linen seven days in the week.

Valedictories in Order At Meeting of City Council

The mayor and five aldermen of the present City Council said farewell to their terms of office Tuesday night at the City Council meeting. They will be candidates for reelection next Monday, R. L. Phillips for mayor, W. L. Jennings for alderman for Wellington Ward, F. L. Cooper for alderman for St. Ann's Ward, David McCaughy for alderman for Carleton Ward, W. E. Farrell for alderman for Queen's Ward, D. W. Olts for alderman for King's Ward. Each is opposed.

All present gave their valedictories. His Worship stated that it had been his intention to retire but that the attacks on the administration of the Council had caused him to change his mind with regard to retiring.

Statement re Taxes.

A statement on the collection of taxes following up what already had been published, was made during the meeting evidently as campaign material. Reference also was made to the public meeting to be held by the candidates on Friday night and by resolution moved by Ald. Smith it was decided to request the Assessment Commissioners to hold a public meeting Saturday night for the purpose of explaining certain parts of the proposed new Assessment Act.

In regard to tax collections statement was made that on January 1st, 1925, arrearages outstanding for 1924 and preceding years had totalled \$77,448.87. During 1925 arrearages to the amount of \$53,838.50 had been collected for 1924 and preceding years and \$2,109.46 had been written off leaving outstanding arrearages for 1924 to the total of \$21,500. During the year 1925 total collections had been \$280,124.06. The assessment for 1925 had been \$276,500 so collections in the year had exceeded the assessment by \$3,624.06. This is claimed as a record.

Municipal Home.

Ald. McCaughy for the Municipal Home Committee reported that total expenditures for December had been \$290.58 of which \$148.08 had been at the Home and \$142.50 for outside relief. On his motion a cheque for \$250 was ordered to issue in favor of Commissioner Niles.

The appointment of the city's representative on the Board of Revisors was deferred until the February meeting.

The offer of Standard Clay Products Limited to supply pipe for the proposed surface sewer on Northumberland Street was laid over until the February meeting.

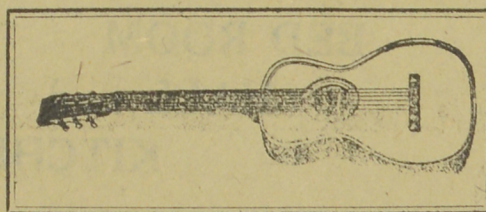
