PRINCE ALBERT.

The Federal by-election yesterday in the constituency of Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, resulted in the return of Premier King, by a majority which when all returns are in, may run over the 8,000 mark. His opponent was Captain D. L. Burgess, M. C., who ran as an Independent. While the defeated candidate naturally had the sympathy of many Conservatives, it is known that the party leaders were not in favor of a contest and refrained from participating in it. The Premier commanded a solid Liberal and Progressive support and no doubt many Conservatives cast their ballots in his favor. If the result of the by-election is the means of bringing to an end the deadlock at Ottawa it will have served a useful purpose. As the constituency is a very large one it will be some days yet before the Premier is able to take his seat in the House.

THE THINGS YOU EAT.

ROBBERY OF WHISKEY ON HIGH SEAS

Lunenburg, N. S., Feb. 15.—The schooner Arthur J. Balfour, Captain Arthur Whynot, arrived here today from Mahone Bay with a tale of piracy on the high seas. While off Rum Row the schooner was boarded by a hoard of modern pirates who came alongside in a ship disguised as a coastguard cutter. The Balfour's crew was over-powered and 1,100 cases of Scotch whisky, comprising half its cargo, transferred to the "cutter" which forthwith departed leaving to schooner in the hands of a number of "the buccaneers" for nineteen days. According to Captain Whynot's report, he and his men were kept prisoners while the schooner cruised in the vicinity, evidently waiting the return of the pirate craft, which was too small to take away more than half the Balfour's cargo. Finally the pirates brought the ship within a few hundred yards of the shore and rowed ashore.

B. C. MEMBERS HELD FLOOR IN PARLIAMENT

Ottawa, Feb. 15.—For the most part, British Columbia members held the floor in further House debate today on the Conservative amendment to the address, and for the first time since last Tuesday, a Liberal participated in the debate.

The Liberal was Hon. Dr. King, Minister of Public Works. Dr. King charged that "disappointed and destructive" Conservatives had been blindly seeking to gain possession of the treasury benches. For party advantage, continued Dr. King, Conservatives had sought to prevent Premier King from coming into Parliament, and to this end had used the cumbersome machinery of the election act.

Dr. King asserted that during the period of so-called "blue ruin," Canada had set her house in order changed unfavorable to favorable trade balances improved the financial position of her National Railways and was turning the Canadian grain to Canadian ports. On the Australian treaty surely, said Dr. King, Conservatives could allow a treaty with a sister dominion to run for a year without talking of abrogating it.

Minister of Agriculture Hon. Lewis Smith, Minister of Agriculture, arrived here this morning and is engaged in departmental business. Hon. Mr. Smith was the first minister to reach the city for the meeting of the government which will take place tonight.
