Aldermen in Clash Over West End Surface Drainage

Ald. Ross Moved for Construction of Sewer for Argyle and Victoria Streets—Ald. Mitchell Moved Amendment to Refer to Roads and Streets Committee—Amendment Carried—Account of Principal Assessor Held Up—Calcium Chloride for the Streets.

The City Council last night appointed the Roads and Streets Committee to consider the matter of furnishing surface drainage to the section of the city lying in the western part of the Old Racecourse. Residents of that section applied several times for improved drainage alleging that the water from the hills south of the city lies on the surface. It was suggested that a four-foot or five-foot sewer would be necessary. Ald. Ross and Ald. Mitchell clashed over the matter the former moving for immediate action and the latter moving an amendment that the Roads and Streets consider the matter and report. The amendment was carried.

A change in the experiment in treatment of gravel streets was made calcium chloride being selected instead of crude oil.

An account of Principal Assessor Peter Farrell for extra services in connection with the Assessment Commission, amounting to \$100 was held up. It was referred after discussion to the council in committee.

Matter of Surface Drainage.

Ald. Ross brought up the matter of surface drainage in the section of the city in the vicinity of Victoria and Argyle streets near Northumberland. He moved that a four-foot sewer be installed.

Ald. Smith seconded the motion.

Ald. Mitchell objected to so heavy expenditure at this time. He realized the necessity for surface drainage but believed that their should be further information. He moved in amendment that this matter be referred to the Roads and Streets Committee.

Ald. Currier seconded the motion.

Ald. Ross said the amendment was a red herring across the trail. It was urgent that this drainage be supplied. The amendment was merely delay.
Ald. Mitchell said Ald. Ross might be able to tell what was a man's physical condition by looking at him, but he hardly could tell what were his thoughts. His amendment was for the purpose of having the matter properly considered. There was likely to be difficulty in getting a grade and possibly the four-foot sewer which Ald. Ross had suggested would not be sufficient. A five-foot sewer might be necessary.
Ald. Ross replied explaining his views and belief that action should be taken at once.
The amendment was carried.

Repudiate Account.

It was decided on motion of Ald. Mitchell to notify Canadian Fairbank's Morse Limited that the city did not consider itself liable for the expenses of Mr. Lang and Mr. Matthews, experts sent here in connection with the installation of the oil-engined unit at the Pumping Station. The company was requested to furnish more detailed information.

On motion it was decided to arrange to have P. J. Hughes, K. C., City Solicitor, to appear before the Municipal Council in connection with the city's claim for rebate on the Administration of Justice.

To Use Calcium Chloride.

On the motion of Ald. Currier it was decided to experiment with calcium chloride on gravel streets instead of crude oil as at first suggested.

Bill of Principal Assessor.

Ald. Thompson presented a bill from the Principal Assessor, Peter Farrell, for services in connection with the Assessment Commission. The amount was \$100. He moved payment.

Ald. Goodspeed objected that the services should be rendered as part of the duties of office.

Ald. Smith said this was for extra work.

Ald. Thompson said that the Assessment Commission had recommended the payment of \$100 to Mr. Farrell.

Mayor Clark ruled that the bill would have to be before the Council in committee.

In amendment Ald. Mitchell moved that the bill be laid on the table for consideration by the council in committee at the next meeting.

The amendment was carried.

SPANISH ARMY TURNS AGAINST THE DICTATOR

Paris, July 5—Travelers arriving over the Franco-Spanish frontier declare that the Government of Premier Primo de Rivera has been abandoned by the army and that it is maintaining itself only with the aid of the police. They assert that grave political events are imminent. Four hundred army officers now are said to be in prison as well as a great number of civilians among them Senor Melquiades Alvarez, former President of the Chamber of Deputies and Republican leader. Another of those held is the daughter of Dient. Gen. Augustin Luque former War Minister and High Commissioner in Morocco. Gen. Luque who is now in Hendaye was ordered to return to Madrid. He refused saying he was too ill to travel whereupon, it is stated his daughter was arrested.

Dispatches from Hendaye say Count Romanones former Premier of Spain, has taken refuge there to escape arrest in connection with the recent military movement against the Primo de Rivera Government. He crossed the frontier in an automobile.

CLAIM THAT CONFERENCE IS ONLY A FARCE

Geneva, Switzerland, July 6—Military experts of the United States as well as of several other countries who once hoped for practical results from the present preliminary disarmament conference which resumed its sessions today are convinced that it will be impossible to accomplish anything tangible.

When France and Italy, marshaling their usual contingent of rowboat admirals representing nations with navies, forced the subcommittee of alleged naval experts to declare that tonnage could not be used as one of several standards for comparing types of ships, the final farcical touch was given to the war of words raging here for the last five weeks. The committee by a vote of 11 to 6 rejected the method used by Washington and used since navies existed.

Among the nations obeying the orders of France and Italy in this decision were Czechoslovakia, without a seacoast and without a navy; Poland, Bulgaria, whose single coast guard tug sank of old age a year ago, and half a dozen others whose combined navies would not equal the fleet of a typical American city yacht club. The experts of Great Britain, Japan and the United States, representing 90 per cent of the world's naval strength, insisted that tonnage was a factor as well as gunpowder, armour, horse power and personnel.

After deciding that the tonnage standard should not be applied to separate classes of ships, the French delegation forced a vote upon the question whether such a standard was accurate and fair. The vote was as follows: Yes—Argentina and Japan, 2. Not voting—Chile, Germany, Great Britain, the Netherlands, the United States, 5. No—Belgium, Brazil, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Finland, France, Italy, Yugoslavia, Poland, Roumania, Spain and Sweden, 12. Absent—Uruguay, 1.

Rear-Admiral Hilary P. Jones, U. S. N., with veiled sarcasm, in commenting on the work of the alleged expert committee, objected to voting the tonnage standard. He announced his intention of reviving the question before the plenary commission. Rear-Admiral Aubrey Smith of Great Britain called attention to the fact that the twelve nations had denounced as unfair a standard used from time immemorial and which was used at the Washington conference. The French and Italian delegates insisted that while possibly the standard was adaptable to certain types of ships, it was not applicable to others.

The session adjourned with the members in an unamiable mood, with the discussion of the land armaments already groping in a hopeless haze of words, the latest vagary of the naval armaments committee completes the sabotage of the present disarmament movement in the opinion of the American delegates.

Water Extension for C. N. R.

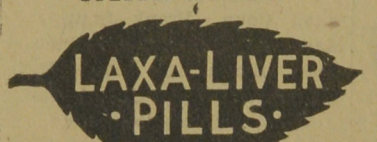

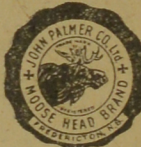
