**EX-PREMIER KING HAS ISSUED
ANOTHER STATEMENT; DENIES
HIS PLANS WERE FOLLOWED**

Ottawa, July 6—In a statement issued today Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King again takes issue with Premier Arthur Meighen on the legislative status of the present government. A recent statement by what he describes as the "temporary government," to the effect that the procedure followed at dissolution of parliament last week was exactly the same as that prepared and proposed by Mr. King himself when he sought dissolution four days earlier, is not true, says Mr. King. And, he adds, if it were true, it would not alter the fact that it was Mr. Meighen's duty himself to advise the Governor-General that he had now taken office.

The late King government, says the statement, fully intended that there should be dissolution only after proper prorogation had been made of both houses of parliament, and after all the usual formalities had been observed.

Guthrie's Statement.

The recent statement of Hon. Hugh Guthrie, acting Minister of Justice, deals chiefly with the formation of the present government and very little with the fundamental question of the appointment of ministers of the crown for the purpose of carrying on government and administering public departments in accordance with recognized legislative practice and law, says Mr. King.

"It was presumption," says the former premier, "for Mr. Meighen to continue to advise the governor-general after his adverse vote in the House of Commons the night before. This unwarranted violation of rights, practice and law, if permitted to continue," says Mr. King, "cannot fail to undermine the whole fabric of constitutional government in Canada and the fundamental principles of self-government under British constitutions in whatever quarter of the globe they may be held in honor today."

July 1 Statement.

Mr. King makes reference to a

statement made by him in the House on July 1, in which he said that when he was counselling dissolution he never contemplated that the business of the session would end there. His next step would have been to consider when dissolution would be taken and he would have advised His Excellency to arrange immediately for the prorogation, and in the Speech from the Throne to announce dissolution.

The former premier proceeds to quote authorities on parliamentary procedure who affirm that the rule is the same in Canada as in Great Britain, where he says, the practice with respect to dissolution being necessarily preceded by prorogation when both Houses of Parliament are in session is established beyond all question.

Regarding the legality of the situation, Mr. King quotes Anson's "Law and Custom of the Constitution," which sets forth that "common law governs all that relates to the prerogative of the Crown * * * and it follows that if unconstitutional or illegal methods are adopted with respect to prorogation or dissolution * * * such unconstitutional methods may affect the validity of any parliamentary proceedings or touch any public or private right."

With regard to the legal and constitutional questions raised by the constitution of the present Prime Minister one with regard to the formation of the present government and the other in regard to dissolution on Friday last," Mr. King says that the major portion of Mr. Guthrie's statement is concerned with the former question, and is comprised in a recitation of communications, "is related to considerations respecting privy councillors and acting ministers in certain circumstances, but neither of which communications pretends to deal with the question of the appointment of ministers of the crown for the purpose of carrying on government and administering public departments in accordance with recognized constitutional practice and law."

**HUME CRONYN
MAY ENTER THE
NEW CABINET**

Some New Names Included in Proposed Lineup—Three Ministers From Quebec.

Ottawa, July 6—A high temperature is rather retarding the preparations for the coming election, although there was another meeting yesterday afternoon of the Liberal Party. Tomorrow night the executive of the Conservative Party will meet, and some time next week Premier Meighen is expected to announce his Cabinet and the date of the election. In the meantime Mr. Meighen will refrain from any important political appointments.

As the time approaches for the announcement of the Meighen Ministry speculation has become more active as to its composition. It is persistently rumored that Hume Cronyn, prominent Toronto and London, Ontario financier, will be made Minister of Finance. Also the continued presence here of Hon. Robert Rogers suggests his inclusion in the Cabinet.

As a western man it is expected he will be given the portfolio of Interior, Mines and Indian Affairs. It is understood he was offered the Lieutenant-Governorship of Manitoba, but that he refused this post.

Another difficulty will be that of Quebec representation in the new ministry. It is confidently predicted by the Liberals that the Conservatives will only elect one man from that Province but at least three men are mentioned from that Province for places in the Meighen Cabinet. It is regarded as probable that Hon. Andre Fauteux will contest the only safe Conservative seat—Mount Royal—and now held by Robert S. White, former editor of The Montreal Gazette, and that Mr. Fauteux will be given the office of Postmaster-General. Two others also to be included are Hon. Rodolphe Monty and Senator D. O. L'Esperance, campaign manager for the Meighen party in the last election.

LEARN TO SWIM**

Stockholm, July 6—All Swedes must swim. The Government has grown tired of having so many drownings every year, and has started a drastic campaign to force everyone to learn to swim.

Hereafter nonswimming school teachers will not be employed and boys who cannot pass swimming tests will not be passed in their other examinations. Nonswimmers will not be named to official positions.

For years the Swedish sports organization has not permitted sportsmen to participate in any sort of contests if they did not have certificates of swimming ability.

For 50 years there has been a campaign to teach all Swedes how to swim but heretofore there was no actual compulsion.

The average number of deaths annually from drowning in Sweden is about 340 and the authorities are determined to bring this down.

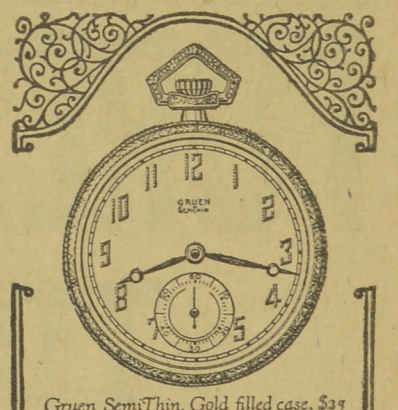
