## WEEK END CABINET MEETINGS AND PARTY CONFERENCES; THE HOUSE RESUMES THIS AFTERNOON

Ottawa, June 28—Bitter fighting lies ahead of the House. After a week-end of cabinet meetings and party conferences, the situation remains uncertain, and the upshot in doubt. The Conservatives state frankly that if the government escapes censure on the customs report, this will be only the first stage of another struggle. Much supply remains yet to be voted before Parliament prorogues and the present supply bill expires on Wednesday. The voting of supply, it is stated, among Conservatives, will offer further opportunities for attack with the object of forcing the government to resign.

Among Liberals, the belief is current that they would not be defeated on the Customs report.

Not Government Motion.

They take the ground that the three divisions of Friday's hectic sitting, while the Government supported the losing side, were not defeats for the Government, inasmuch as the motions before the House were not Government motions. Throughout the crisis Premier King himself, in fact, has taken the view that so far the Government has not been defeated.

The result of the coming crucial vote lies largely in the hand of Miss Agnes MacPhail and G. G. Coote, of MacLeod. Both are Progressives and neither voted in the division on the Woodsworth sub-amendment.

May Be Challenged.

It is stated that they were both expected to be challenged and required to vote. But no challenges were forthcoming and no votes on their part were recorded. Should they vote in the next division for the Government and the House divide as it divided on the Woodsworth sub-amendment, the House would break even, with the casting vote lying in the hands of Speaker Lemieux, who is a Liberal. Should they vote against each other, or both with the Opposition, the Government would be defeated unless there is a change in other respects from Friday's vote.

Cancelled Trip.

Before the House rose on Saturday morning, Miss MacPhail left Montreal on her way to Europe. She actually went aboard the steamer but decided to return, and is now in Ottawa.

There is much talk of the imminence of dissolution. Reports have been current during the week-end that Premier King has advised the Governor-General to dissolve Parliament, but of such reports there is no official confirmations.

Among Parliamentarians the view is widely held that general elections are not far distant.

An Electrified Atmosphere.

The Ottawa correspondent of the Toronto Globe in writing of the situation at Ottawa says:

An atmosphere electrified with anxious expectation has enveloped Parliament Hill for three days. It grew more intense with the steady approach of the decisive moment when the division bells rang.

Long before 8 o'clock tonight when the sitting of the House resumed, parking space around the Parliament Building was at a premium; scores upon scores of people from that hour up until midnight vainly clamored for admittance to the galleries; long queues marked as arrows the location of the doors to the galleries, while the House police throughout the day and night were harassed with requests and demands for extra chairs, or for permission to stand, both of which means of hearing the debates are forbidden.

Galleries Packed All Day.

In the House itself the galleries have been for two days past, aged perhaps for two days past, aged persons showing their keen and sustained interest in the course of events by remaining in their seats, eagerly at attention, for four hours without interruption.

The two party lobbies present scenes just as animated, there being a continual going and coming of members seeking further light on the situation, which for most of this week has been a kaleidoscope baffling the ken of the wisest. The same whispered conferences, the same significant gatherings in corridors and the same vociferous receptions in lobbies as members of the respective groups emerged from the Chamber after having delivered important contributions to the debate.

Cheers rang out in the Liberal lobby this afternoon as Hon. Charles Dunning stepped from the Chamber following one of the most spectacular performances of the present debate, while a similar reception was given last night to Hon. Lucien Cannon, and in the Conservative lobby to

Hon. H. H. Stevens, A. J. Doucet and others of that party.

In every respect today's scenes are almost identical with those of the first week of the session. There has been, though, more tenseness today, with the exception of a closer vote than five months ago.

Two days ago A. M. Carmichael, Progressive member for Kindersley, Sask., was called to his home, where his daughter is gravely ill, while two other members of the House, and present in Ottawa are too ill to attend the debate today, but will be in their seats to vote.

Then there is the pathetic case of Thomas McMillan, Liberal member for South Huron. Called home yesterday, he suffered bereavement last night in the death of his wife. Inability to obtain a "pair" made it necessary for him to return to Ottawa today to be present for tonight's division.

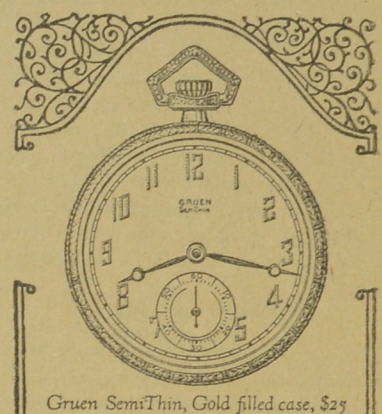

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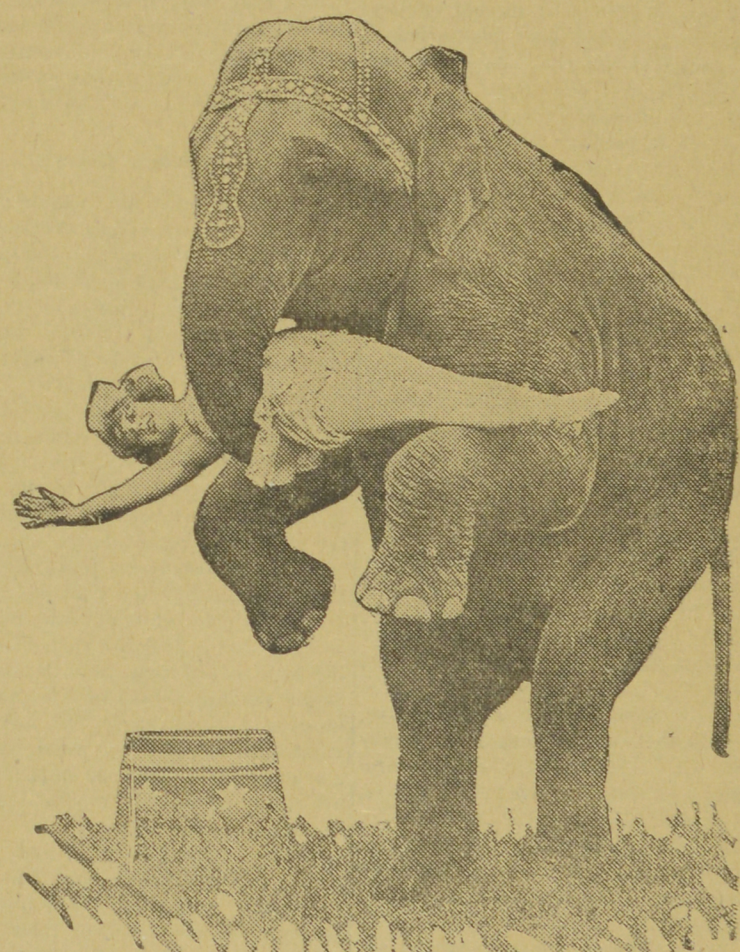
