

OLD VETERAN OF C. E. F. PASSED AWAY SUNDAY

George Styran Aged 72 Years—Overseas with 4th Pioneer Bat.—Imperial and R.C.R. Veteran.

George Styran, one of the oldest men in this section of the province who served overseas in the Great War died Sunday night at his home, Victoria street, aged seventy-two years. He had been ill but a few days. The deceased was a native of England and had been a soldier from early life. He served for some years with the West Riding Regiment in the Imperial forces and with that corps was stationed at Halifax when Imperial troops formed the garrison there. Later he enlisted in the Royal Canadian Regiment at Fredericton and completed twenty-years' service with that corps. At time of the outbreak of the war he was in civilian life but in spite of advanced years he was accepted for service in the 4th Pioneer Battalion, C. E. F., and went overseas with that unit. Thomas Styran one of his sons had a long period of overseas spending some time as a prisoner in Germany. Another son Walter also was overseas.

Surviving Relatives

The deceased is survived by his widow, three sons Thomas and Harry of Fredericton and Walter with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in the Province of Quebec and one daughter Miss Georgie Styran at home. There also are one brother Walter in England and one sister Mrs. Emery Walter also in England.

Funeral Tuesday

The funeral will take place Tuesday afternoon leaving the home at 3.30. Service will be conducted at the Parish Church at 3.45 by Rev. A. E. Bate. Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery.

YOUNG GIRL LURED FROM HOME AND ATTACKED

Escaped From Man and Went to House on Forest Hill—Had Expected to be Employed.

Shortly after six o'clock Saturday evening a young girl giving her age as fourteen and her residence in a street near the shoe factory, entered the residence of William Tims, Forest Hill Road, and in an excited manner told a startling story to the members of the family who were assembled for the evening meal. The main facts were that she had been engaged by a man giving his name as Smith, at her own home and with the knowledge and consent of her parents, to act as companion to his wife who with her child was to be left alone by the husband who was going away. The location of the dwelling was described as near Regent street beyond the C. P. R. tracks and the girl set out to walk with the man to the house. They did not go to that locality, however, the man explaining that he had been misunderstood. They went up the hill to the first cross road and along that to the College road. There they left the road the man stating that his house was "beyond the pine trees" when the girl remonstrated. Soon after they entered woods where the man attempted to assault the girl also threatening to choke her if she made an outcry. She resisted and said that her uncle lived near at hand. She then escaped and made her way toward Forest Hill road. The man when last seen by her was making his way toward the river.

Description of Man

The man was described by the girl as being young and of medium height dressed in blue with a light colored cap. At her home he had described himself as a railway employee and talked for some time. His story was accepted as correct by the family as he made a good impression. He offered \$4 a week for the girl's services as maid.
