



STEWED KIDNEY.

1 beef kidney
2 tablespoons drippings
2 tablespoons cut onion
2 tablespoons flour
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon powdered mace
Pepper to taste.
Slice the kidney into thin slices remove all fat and veins, put into bowl, cover with warm water and a little salt; let stand 1 hour; drain and cover with cold water, put on to boil and boil slowly 30 minutes; then drain. Put the drippings, onion and kidney into frypan and fry until onion is cooked, but not brown, sprinkle with flour, stir until each piece of kidney has some flour on it, then add 1 1-2 cups cold vegetable stock or water stir until it thickens, add salt, pepper to taste, lemon juice and mace; let simmer 15 minutes.

APPLE SURPRISE

3 cups grated raw apples
¼ cup sugar
1 cup whipping cream
Cinnamon or nutmeg
Whip the cream until stiff; then add the grated raw apples and sugar. Mix lightly. Serve in ice cream or parfait glasses, sprinkled with a little cinnamon or nutmeg. This must be cold.

CRANBERRY AND CHERRY SALAD

2 cups finely cut celery
2 cups diced cranberry jelly
1 cup mayonnaise or dressing of choice
6 stuffed olives
Shredded lettuce
Cover individual salad plates, or salad bowl, with shredded lettuce; put in a thin layer of celery then a layer of the diced cranberry jelly; then sprinkle celery over the top and in the centre put a spoonful of mayonnaise garnish with the stuffed olives cut into rings.

QUEEN OF ALL PUDDINGS.

2 cups soft breadcrumbs
2 cups milk
2 eggs
½ cup sugar
¼ teaspoon salt
½ cup chopped raisins
2 tablespoons red jelly
1 teaspoon butter
Pour the milk over the soft bread crumbs. Separate the eggs add the yolks to the crumbs with the salt, sugar and chopped raisins; mix well butter custard cups, pour in the mixture and bake slowly 45 minutes. Remove from oven and spread with the jelly. Beat the whites of eggs until light and dry; add 1 tablespoon of sugar and spread over the tops; dust liberally with powdered sugar and dry in moderate oven.

BAKING POWDER STICKY CINNAMON BUNS.

2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1-2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons shortening
1-2 cup milk
1-2 cup brown sugar
1-2 cup seeded raisins
1-2 cup currants or seedless raisins
2 tablespoons melted butter
1 teaspoon cinnamon
Sift the flour baking powder and salt into bowl, add the shortening and rub in very lightly; add cold milk enough to form a dough that can be rolled out 1-4 inch thick on floured board. Brush the dough with the melted butter, sprinkle with the sugar and cinnamon, cover with the raisins and currants; roll the same as jelly roll. Cut into two-inch pieces and put into pan which has been well brushed with butter cut side down. Bake 35 to 40 minutes in moderate oven. For sticky cinnamon buns, brush the pan with butter and sprinkle liberally with brown sugar before put-

ting in the buns. Bake in slow oven and turn out as soon as they are removed from the oven.

JURY SYSTEM IS PRAISED BY N. S. LAWYER

Yarmouth, Dec. 27—At the Rotary luncheon at noon today County Court Judge E. H. Armstrong, who, with Mrs. Armstrong, is visiting Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Hood for the Christmas season, and C. R. Smith, K. C., of Amherst, who, with Mrs. Smith, is the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Lawson, were the guests of the club. Both addressed the club.

The Jury System.

Mr. Smith was the speaker of the day and his subject was "Jury system or trial by jury." In his opening remarks he referred to the Magna Charta granted by King John in 1215 by which trial by jury and proceedings in habeas Corpus were granted. The speaker very concisely traced the system from that time until the present. Concluding his address Mr. Smith pointed out that so far as trials are concerned in this province both in county and supreme courts, unless notice was given asking for a jury cases were tried before a judge alone. In criminal cases if the accused were tried in supreme court the trial took place before a jury, every one of whom had to agree in the verdict, but, except in capital and one or two other cases, the prisoner had the right of election to go before the county court judge as criminal court and there be tried by the judge without the intervention of a jury. As a result the jury trials in Nova Scotia have been boiled down to a narrow compass.

The speaker stated that inasmuch as Great Britain, the greatest Empire in the world, had retained trial by jury for the past 700 years and that the great republic of the United States placed a paragraph in their constitution preserving the right of trial by jury which had been retained ever since it was sufficient evidence of the wisdom of retaining this law and particularly advantageous usage.

MANY SEEKING CIVIC HONORS IN MONCTON

Moncton, Dec. 27—There will be contests in the mayoralty, at large and for all ward aldermanic seats in the Moncton civil election which will take place on Monday, Jan. 3, according to the papers filed with City Clerk S. B. Anderson at nomination day proceedings here today.

Fifteen candidates in all filed papers and there is a straight fight only for the chief magistracy, while three-cornered contests will be waged for each of the two seats in the large field, in ward one and in ward three, while ward two gives the electors a choice of four candidates for the two seats.

The following are the contestants for honors: Mayorally, Ald. Budd, A. Taylor and ex-Ald. M. A. Hutton; alderman-at-large, Ald. R. A. Frechet, G. Foster Perry and C. Hanford Blaney; ward one, Ald. Telephone Cormier, ex-Ald. W. E. Marks and ex-Ald. F. P. Murphy; ward two, Ald. A. J. Taylor, H. D. Buchanan, Fred W. Copeland and ex-Ald. James E. Wetmore; ward three, Ald. Robert Nickerson, Ald. J. D. Rushton and Lew P. Stratton.

Of those in the field, six of them sat as alderman at the board last year, while the remainder of the present council not offering again are Mayor Ambrose Wheeler, Alderman-at-large W. P. Hutchinson and John Humphrey.


