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## NEW BRUNSWICK FORESTS

### ARE GREATLY DEVELOPED

Perhaps the chief feature of the pulp and paper industry in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia is the shortage of power sites which would produce sufficient power for further expansion in the newsprint field. With the conclusion of development projects which are already planned or underway, such as those of the International Paper, Fraser and the Bathurst Companies, it seems probable that future expansion in the pulp and paper field in these provinces will be confined more to the manufacture of chemical pulp, which requires a considerably smaller power supply per ton of output than does the newsprint industry.

In the province of Nova Scotia, about 90 per cent. of the timber lands are held in fee simple; thus, further pulp and paper development in that province may perhaps be accomplished by the consolidation of various companies at present engaged in cutting and selling pulpwood. Indeed, at the moment, plans are in the making for further pulp and paper development in this province, but present real advances in the newsprint and pulp fields are confined to the province of New Brunswick.

#### Several New Mills

Here, the development of Grand Falls by the Saint John River Power Company will provide more than sufficient power for two new newsprint mills with a total capacity of 250 tons a day each; these mills will be erected by the International Paper, and the Fraser Companies, at Campbellton, N. B., where both companies, it is understood will be able to utilize in part, their timber holdings lying in the province of Quebec, and located near the interprovincial boundary line. This brings up an interesting point; while the province of Quebec boasts of cheap labor, it is New Brunswick's claim that her labor is more efficient, and thus, while these and other companies hold limits in Quebec, New Brunswick has claims of New Brunswick, and perhaps of the operators that, whenever possible, they draw timber from their Quebec limits to feed New Brunswick mills. At any rate, these are the claims of New Brunswick, and perhaps the present projected newsprint developments there substantiate these claims.

#### Bathurst May Expand

There is another projected newsprint development also in the province of New Brunswick. This is that of the Bathurst Company, which, it is understood, may obtain further power supplies from the Nepisiquit River, and thus be in a position to build another 250-ton mill.

These projected developments in New Brunswick represent practically all which may be anticipated in the newsprint field, for they will utilize most of the bigger power resources of the province, and the smaller power sites would not provide the great amount of power which is required in

newsprint development. What, then, is the outlook for the province as a possible greater factor in the Canadian pulp and paper field? To attempt to answer this question requires primarily a brief survey of the forest resources of the province of New Brunswick.

#### Forest All Held

In the first place, practically all New Brunswick's vast areas are either held in fee simple by individuals or corporations, or else these areas are under lease to pulp and timber operators; there remain a few sites in the province which may be leased, but most of these are unsuited for immediate forest development. From this it might perhaps be thought that there will be little future development in the forest industries of New Brunswick; this is not the case, for, with the keen competition which exists in the trade, it seems probable that, for the future, the trend of the industry may be toward the merging of existing timber operators, with a view of establishing pulp developments.

In any consideration of the pulp or forest development in New Brunswick it must not be forgotten that the province is in many ways happily situated, for it has many rivers, and thus practically all its timber can be floated to the mills. Not only, then, is the pulpwood accessible, but it also has another advantage, namely, it can be brought to the mills with a one-year drive, as opposed to a two, and even a three-year drive in many places in central Canada. Then, again, at some points at least, it is possible to load from the mills directly into ocean-going vessels—all of which makes for lower cost.

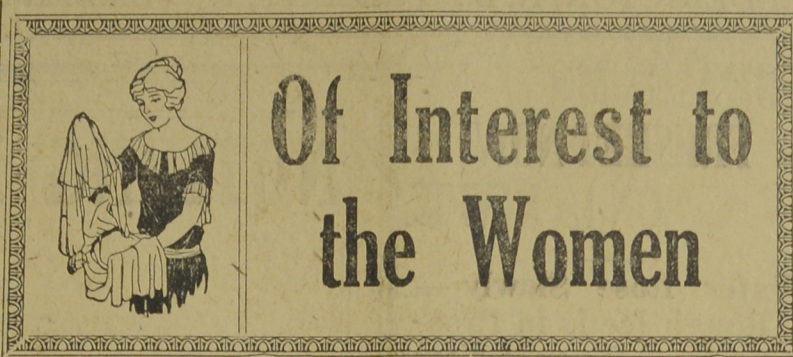
#### Ships by Boat Always

One chemical pulp mill in New Brunswick obtains all its raw material, such as sulphur and all its supplies, direct by boat, which unloads at its own deep-water docks.

However, much of the expansion in the future probably depends on the ability of the timber operators to combine to form larger units for operation. And thus, such consolidations would be in a satisfactory position to consider the possibility of pulp developments—even now such consolidations in some parts of the province are being worked out.

That such mergers will take place seems assured, for the timber operators of New Brunswick have been experiencing the keenest competition from lumber from the Pacific coast; this is sold in eastern markets, due to the cheap transportation cost which the Panama Canal affords. At the moment there is another handicap under which this industry labors. This is the fact that, due to the coal strike in England, ships which formerly carried timber are now employed in the coal-carrying trade. Moreover, shippers of coal are willing to pay freight rates considerably higher than the timber operators can afford. Thus, for some time past, the timber operators of New Brunswick have been anything but happily situated.

## Of Interest to the Women

#### MY NEIGHBOR SAYS.

To keep butter sweet and good make a brine of salt and keep the butter in it.

When hashing cold meat add a little chopped parsley. It will improve both the taste and appearance.

Worn table linen may be made into slip covers and put over magazines. These make excellent mats for hot dishes and the covers may be washed easily.

To bleach white goods that have become yellow, dip them in strong blue water after washing let them become very blue and then hang out to dry. They will be thoroughly bleached.

Save all apple cores and parings stew them down put in a salt bag and hang up over night. The next morning measure the juice, take half as much sugar as juice boil the juice a minute, for each tumbler of jelly put in the sugar boil up once and put in tumblers.

To remove iron stains from woollen articles, dip the stained part in a saucer or bowl containing a little warm hydrochloric acid. Allow it to soak for a minute, then wash the article and rinse in strong soda and water to remove all traces of the acid.

Faded shabby carpets can be freshened and improved if after first brushing to remove the dust, the brush be dipped in a pail of hot water to which a few drops of turpentine have been added and the carpets brushed vigorously with this.

#### GOLD CAKE.

½ cup butter or shortening  
1¼ cup sugar  
Yolks of 6 eggs  
2-3 cup water  
1 tablespoon vanilla or flavoring to taste  
2½ cups flour  
3 level teaspoons baking powder  
Cream the sugar and butter until light. Beat the yolks of eggs until light and lemon color, then add to the butter and sugar; mix well; add the flavoring then the water and sifted flour and baking powder alternately. Brush tube, pan or brick pan with shortening and dust with flour; put in the mixture and bake in moderate oven 45 to 50 minutes.

#### BOSTON CREAM PIE.

1½ cups flour  
2 level teaspoons baking powder  
¼ teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons sugar  
¾ cup milk  
1 egg  
2 tablespoons melted shortening  
Sift the dry ingredients into bowl add the milk, beaten egg and melted shortening; mix well. Brush two lemon cake pans with shortening dust with flour; pour in the mixture

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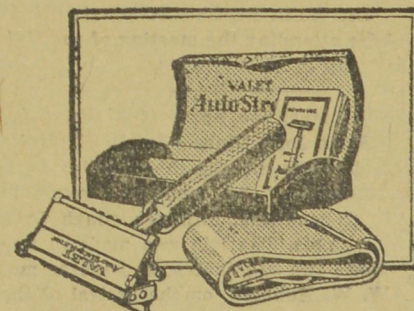
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
