A PLOT AGAINST THE LIFE OF PRESIDENT MOTTA OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS FOILED

Geneva, Sept. 10.—At a reception which the Swiss government gave to the delegates of the League of Nations today, President Motta of the League of Nations' assembly, was warmly congratulated by all on the failure of the plot against his life.

It appears that a Russian named Solomon Greenberg, arrived here last Monday. He was arrested. According to the newspapers, the prisoner has confessed that he had wished to assassinate Dr. Giuseppe Motta, former president of Switzerland, to avenge the killing of M. Vorovsky, Russia's representative, during the Lausanne Conference in 1923 by Maurice Conrad, a Swiss, who was acquitted.

The prisoner will be sent to Zurich, where he is wanted on another charge. The police think he is mentally unbalanced.

Peace Faith Felt.

Faith that loyal co-operation will keep Europe far from war and safe in the path of permanent peace and happiness continued tonight to be the dominating note of this memorable day when Germany was received into the League of Nations with the assent of thousands.

Dr. Gustave Stresemann, the German foreign minister, in a striking address before the Assembly, prayed that the destiny of the League of Nations be fulfilled on the basis of its lofty conception of peace, freedom and unity, and Foreign Minister Briand of France, in moving language pledged the support of France in policies that would thrust war aside forever.

Problem of Disarming.

The outstanding feature of the day

was the rather gingerly manner with which both Dr. Stresemann and M. Briand approached the problem of disarmament, giving the impression that both statesmen realized that this is the most difficult problem of all confronting Europe.

Dr. Stresemann counselled "tactful work" in achieving disarmament while M. Briand practically gave notice that Europe could not shake off her burden or armaments until equilibrium was restored both economically and morally and until people were convinced of their security.

Statesmen Confer.

Tonight the statesmen of various nations are conferring on how best to treat problems still outstanding which might prove to be possible menaces to complete concord.

Dr. Stresemann told newspapers at a banquet in honor of the council at which he clicked glasses with Mr. Briand, M. Vandervelde and Sir Austen Chamberlain, that they must bear in mind that every day is not a Saturday or a holiday, and "daily effort is necessary to make peace security."

Touched By Assertion.

Dr. Stresemann said that nothing in M. Briand's speech before the Assembly had touched him more than the assertion that the peoples who had shown such heroism on the battlefield should not seek other and constructive outlets for their energy.

Sir Austen Chamberlain, warning against excessive optimism, told the German journalists tonight not to forget that the path ahead is long, for suspicions must be allayed and wounds of the past more fully healed.

BEATTY SEES APATHY OVER THE ELECTION

Montreal, Sept. 10.—In an interview here today, E. W. Beatty, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, discussed his impressions of conditions in Western Canada and he reiterated his previous statement that the country west of Fort William was looking better than he had ever before seen it. He, however, declared that he had found a general condition of apathy regarding the election campaign now nearing a climax.

"It is disconcerting to see so little interest shown, as to my mind, this is one of the most important elections ever held in Canada," he declared. "It is imperative that some party goes back to Ottawa able to carry on the affairs of government as they should be carried on, as the time has gone by when we should drag behind, and the moment has arrived for a decided forward movement."

Wants Decided Swing.

Mr. Beatty expressed his alarm lest a condition should arise after the elections similar to that which had arisen after the 1921 and 1925 elections, with neither of the major parties in a position to formulate policies and give some promise of stability for the next few years.

Although carefully refraining from supporting either the Liberal or Conservative party, he expressed a wish to see a decided swing one way or the other in the closing days of the campaign so that stability in business could be restored and Canada generally placed in a position to "go ahead."

Apathy in Quebec.

The condition of apathy did not confine itself alone to western Canada, he said, as in his own province a similar lack of interest was being shown by the general public. Mr. Beatty predicted that if a stalemate did occur, there would be a re-organization of both the old line parties, but in the meantime, the opinion must necessarily suffer.

"It would be manifestly unfair to plunge Canada into another election with all the expense that would entail," he said, "but something would have to be done."

"Coalition government means a government of compromise," he said, "and that is not what Canada needs at the present time. We are standing on the threshold of one of the greatest periods of development at this time."

HOLY LAND MAY SOON BE ELECTRIFIED

Paris, Sept. 11.—French and British engineers have completed a project which it is hoped will be put into execution very soon for the electrification of Palestine by causing the waters of the eastern Mediterranean to flow over a 250 foot ridge bordering the coast, thence through a canal cut out of solid rock, whence the waters would hurl themselves down in an almost sheer drop into Lake Tiberius and the Dead Sea, more than a 1000 feet below the level of the Mediterranean.

It is estimated that the electrical energy capable of being thus developed would be sufficient for Palestine, Syria, Asiatic Turkey and Egypt. The total cost is placed at about \$75,000,000. Able scientists have calculated the net energy at 426,000 horsepower.

"Palestine is the classic land of miracles," said Edouard Imbeaux, the french expert, chief author of the plan, to the correspondent of the United Press. "I firmly believe modern science will accomplish miracles there in its turn."

M. Imbeaux has sent to the Academy of Sciences a long detailed statement of the geographical and other conditions favoring the plan for the electrification of Palestine. He emphasized that between the Mediterranean and the enormous depression in which are situated the valley of the Jordan, Lake Tiberius and the Dead Sea, there is only a low ridge less than two miles wide. He proposes therefore:

WOULD BUILD A CANAL

1 Construction of a Maritime canal from Haifa with 12 locks gradually rising to the summit of the ridge near the Zerin peak, the Jizreel of the Bible.

2 Piercing the peak a distance of about 3300 yards and construction of an artificial river on the other slope of the ridge leading to the commencement of the depression.

3 Construction of a viant that would receive the falling torrent about 1200 feet below, just above Lake Tiberius. Another plant would be constructed farther south permitting a further drop of about 400 feet into the Dead Sea.

"We have calculated," continued M. Imbeaux, "that the gross energy derived would be 617,000 horse power, but 190,000 horsepower would be needed for the lifting of the sea up to the peak, leaving a net product of 426,000 horsepower, or 240,000 kilowatts, sufficient for all Palestine's railroads, industries and agriculture."

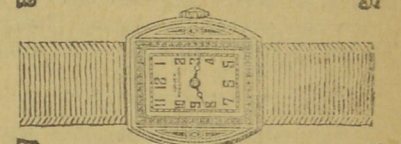
