REGISTRATION
AT UNIVERSITY TO
SURPASS RECORD

Forestry and Electrical
Engineering Attract-
ing Many Students —
Several Will Come
From Outside N. B.

Examinations in connection with the opening of the University of New Brunswick, matriculation and supplemental, will be written at the University next week beginning Thursday. Lectures will begin on the following Monday, September 20th.

Dr. C. C. Jones, Chancellor of the University, stated today that the expectation was that the university would have a registration greater than that of last year which was the largest in its history. This will be due to a large incoming Freshman class. A year ago eighty registered in the new class and this year according to Dr. Jones the new class will be at least as large and probably larger.

Applied Science Popular.

Applied Science courses continue to be popular. Forestry which fell off for several years but recovered last year again will have a large number of students. Some fifteen or more are expected. Electrical Engineering also will have a large list probably on account of hydro development in the Province. This section of the class of 1930 is expected to be the largest with the exception of the Arts.

From Other Provinces.

A number of intending students from other Provinces already have communicated their intention of registering. Several are from Quebec and others from Nova Scotia. A number of natives of the Old Country who have been living in Canada for some years will enter in the Forestry courses.

In addition to the Freshmen there will be a number of students who will enter in the other classes. These will help to make up the losses caused by students dropping out during their course.

LOCAL MILLS
HAVE MONTH'S
SAWING AHEAD

Average Season's Run
at Victoria and Doug-
lass Mills — Planing
Mills Will Have Win-
ter Run.

The sawmills which are operating in this vicinity will have somewhat more than a month's run before finishing the season's cut. The middle of October is expected to see the close of the sawing at both the Victoria Mill operated in this city by Fraser Companies Limited, and the mill operated in Devon by S. Douglass Company Limited. The planing mills which are part of both plants will continue to run and will operate during much of the winter.

The season's cut at each mill has been about an average and the plants have been of great value in giving employment to a large number of men.

To Clean Up Logs.

The season's sawing at the Victoria Mill will about clean up the logs available for that mill. It is not expected that any will be carried over. The Douglass mill also will pretty well clean up the logs at the mill.

The lath-market is reported quiet at the present time. Last winter there was a large cut of lath in the Province.

Lost a Big One.

Mr. O. J. Fraser of Saint John, manager of the N. B. Telephone Company, spent yesterday whipping the Hart's Island pool. He hooked a big salmon but it fouled his line and broke away. Today Mr. Fraser is trying his luck on the Miramichi.
