THE LEGISLATURE OPENED WITH IMPOSING CEREMONY

who, for personal gain, have persistently set the law at defiance.

Grand Falls Power.
My Government in conjunction with the N. B. Electric Power Commission has made a study of the development of power at Grand Falls. More complete surveys than heretofore existed have demonstrated that the expense of storage facilities in the State of Maine will be greater than anticipated. It has been decided that the contract entered into between the Commission and the International Paper Company by which the Province was to contribute the capital required for the development, purchase the rights of the Company and give it practically an exclusive right to take such power as it pleased without obligating it to the use of such power, shall be abrogated. It is necessary that the Province should be protected against possible loss in such an enterprise while at the same time the development should be proceeded with. An arrangement by which the power will be made available for existing as well as prospective manufacturers of pulp and paper, to the extent of the capacity of the Falls will be submitted to you for your approval. Besides this an opportunity will be provided under public control for users of power for other purposes.

Financial Relations.
In view of the negotiations between the Government of the Dominion and the governments of the Western Provinces for the transfer to those provinces of their natural resources my Government will press upon the Federal Administration the fairness of a readjustment of our financial relations.

My Government feels that the interests of Labour would be promoted by committing them to the care of a Minister and for that purpose will enlarge the Department of Health to include Labour.

The Public Accounts for the past year will be laid before you together with Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure. The latter must necessarily be based upon the upkeep of the services which the Province has already instituted and for the provision of adequate revenue will be a matter for your serious consideration.

Measures will be submitted to you for the improvement of the law.

I ask your most earnest co-operation for the best interests of the Province under the guidance of Divine Providence.

Business of House.

The Speaker resumed the chair and the House proceeded to the appointment of Clerk and Clerk Assistant also of chaplain.

The independence of Parliament was displayed in the customary manner by the introduction of a bill by Premier Baxter to amend the act respecting electoral districts and sub-districts. This is done to demonstrate the rights of Parliament to legislate on matters not laid down in the speech from the throne.

The Address in Reply.

The Address in Reply to the Speech from the Throne then was moved by Mr. A. J. Brooks of King's and seconded by Mr. Frank Laviole of Northumberland each of whom acquitted himself well in this task which is a formality of the opening session which reflects honor upon the mover and seconder who make speeches.

The adjournment of the debate was moved by Hon. P. J. Veniot leader of the Opposition.

Night Session Monday.

As announced last week the first caucus of the supporters of the Government took place Wednesday night. J. L. Peck of Albert County was elected chairman. The caucus discussed sessional business.

The Opposition also was in caucus at noon today and considered matters relating to the session.

A TIE VOTE IN THE N. S. LEGISLATURE

Halifax, March 10—For the first time in many years the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Nova Scotia was this afternoon called upon to cast a deciding vote on a division of the House.

The members were giving second reading to a measure introduced by W. L. Hall, Conservative, Queens, providing that a certain pharmaceutical clerk in Yarmouth may register as a full fledged pharmacist, without having to take the regular examinations, he having qualified in New York and worked as a certified drug clerk in Nova Scotia for seventeen years.

Mr. Doull, Conservative, Pictou, moved a three months' hoist, objecting to the principle of the House passing special legislation for an individual.

The House divided, 18 to 18 on the motion and Hon. Mr. Parsons, Speaker of the House, ordered that the bill be sent to committee.

OLD COGNAC SOLD BY REDS

Tiflis, Georgian Republic, March 10—Considerable quantities of 150-year-old cognac, presented by Napoleon to the Russian Grand Dukes of the early 19th century, are being sold in Russia for \$20 a bottle.

Ports, sherries, liqueurs and champagnes of the rarest vintages, the gifts of Kings and heads of states to the Romanoff family, are sold for as little as \$10 a bottle. Hundred-year-old Chateau Yquem of the most delicate bouquets, brings only \$8 a quart.

Most of these wines come from the huge cellars of the former Russian viceroys in the Caucasus.

QUESTION OF INTEREST TO N.B. UP IN QUEBEC

Quebec, March 11—There must be no restrictions in trade between the different provinces of Canada, declared Hon. Honore Mercier, Minister of Lands and Forests, in the Quebec Legislative Assembly today, when the question of wood cut in this province and manufactured in New Brunswick was before the House.

The matter arose on a motion by Jules Langlais, Conservative, of Temiscouata. Mr. Langlais said that most of the wood cut in Bonaventure and Temiscouata counties went across the Baie des Chaleurs to be manufactured in New Brunswick, and he wondered whether something could not be done in the matter. Was it not possible, asked Mr. Langlais, that the leases granted to companies could be redrafted with a provision that in the event of the wood being sent to other provinces the leases should terminate? In this way, said Mr. Langlais, the wood cut in the province would be manufactured here.

Hon. Mr. Mercier said the question raised was not a new one. The idea advocated by Mr. Langlais did not carry weight, he felt. It was much too difficult a remedy.

To adopt the idea of an embargo between provinces as suggested by Mr. Langlais would lead to disastrous consequences, said Hon. Mr. Mercier. It would be much better, he said, if former Premier Drury and his government, Mr. Drury had the courage to stand out against Sir Adam Beck and the powerful Hydro political machine with a display of courage shown by no other prime minister during the period of domination of the Hydro's forceful founder. When things are considered in their true proportions and values are correctly weighed the saving of Ontario from what might have easily proven financial disaster will be remembered as an outstanding accomplishment of Mr. Drury long after the mistakes of some of his associates in the government are forgotten.

NIGHT BUSIEST TIME IN THE BORNEO JUNGLES

In all places there are lovely interesting things to listen to at night, it one is not sleeping, but the night noises in Borneo are different from those elsewhere. There are deep jungles of closely growing vines and ferns just off any road. The jungle climbs up and down very steep hills. There are great trees and small trees.

Many have varieties of orchids and other air plants in them. And there are many monkeys. So there is the drip, drip of the gentle rain and perhaps the roar of a little stream over full. Then a great chatter with rough shrieks drowning out every other noise for a while. Then as all the gentle noises begin broadcasting again, groan, swelling to a deafening crash.

Other smaller groans and crashes follow. A great tree, not too well rooted has gone down, taking all the other tangled trees along. Things quiet down you will hear a few tentative bird calls and just as you begin to feel sleepy, the gun in the village is discharged.

This means business and for the time to get the work done when you live in Borneo is while the night's coolness lingers in the air.

FORTUNATE THAT RADICAL SCHEME WAS KILLED

(Financial Post.)

A few years ago when Sir Adam Beck was proposing a network of radial lines to cover old Ontario at a cost of a couple of hundred millions of the people's money the endorsement of the provincial newspapers was practically unanimous and the criticism of The Financial Post, of a scheme which lacked endorsement of technical experts, was as a lone voice in the wilderness. Today a distinctly different attitude is taken by those newspapers which do not lend their support blindly to public ownership in all its phases.

The Ottawa Journal says that "it is becoming clear that it was a very fortunate thing for the province of Ontario when the elaborate scheme of electrical radial railways on which the provincial Hydro Commission was embarked was checked." The Journal adds that the idea had already made considerable headway and points out that in nearly every case the radials acquired have either been working unsatisfactorily or have been showing deficits. Details of the Hydro's difficulties are also reviewed by the Toronto Star which remarks that "in its radial activities the Hydro faces nothing but trouble and deficits."

Credit for the defeat of the dangerous Hydro radial program goes to former Premier Drury and his government.
