Bathurst High Take Grip On High School Hockey Title

Got Away From Fredericton in Third Period and Won 5 to 3—Fastest School Team Seen Here in Long Time—Fournier the Diminutive Centre and Captain Smallest Player Ever Seen Here in Interscholastic Game—Locals Led 2 to 0 in Second Period.

Fredericton High School has a severe handicap in the final match for the Provincial Interscholastic hockey title which will be played at Bathurst, Friday night for the team was beaten here 5 to 3 by Bathurst High last night. Total goals counting make it necessary for the Yellow and Black to win by three goals to take the title. Against a team as fast as Bathurst High showed themselves to be the task is hard. Fredericton High did not play at the top of form and possibly may be on better at Bathurst.

Very Smart Team.

In Bathurst High which was accompanied by Principal D. R. Bishop, a U. N. B. Graduate the Fredericton fans saw one of the best school teams that ever played on Fredericton ice. The speed and stick-handling was excellent and the condition was superior to that of the home team as was shown in the fatal third period when the Fredericton High lead was lost and later the game. The visitors depended to quite an extent on individual effort when that counted and Luce who was the outstanding scorer of the game went through alone for his goals penetrating defence and shooting so close in that Haines had no chance to stop. In Fournier Bathurst High put on the ice the smallest and youngest interscholastic player ever seen here but he was there at all stages and also captained the team. In defence the team also was good Bond being steady in the net and the players in front of him playing well. The defence was superior to that of Fredericton High which let Bathurst forwards through with disastrous results. The Fredericton forwards had a bad night of it being up against a fast-skating and tricky trio and they failed to stand the pace. "Buck" Miles is capable of playing better hockey. Scoring chances

were missed by all forwards.

Too Easy Goals.

There was one easy goal for Bathurst High on Fournier's shot which went in the net after striking a Fredericton High man. There also was one against Bond when he partially stopped Keenan's shot only to have the rubber hop over his stick and roll into the net.

The game kept the fair sized crowd on its toes and was better than the great majority of senior games seen here this season. Until the end of the second period the home team looked like winners and even in the third took a one-goal lead for a very brief time.

THE GAME.

Even First Period—Second Fredericton High's—Third Bathurst High's by Big Margin.

The first period was very even. Fredericton High did the attacking and had the territory by a big margin. Bond was right on and no goals were notched against Bathurst High.

In the second period Fredericton High kept right after the visitors and Bond was on the jump. The first goal was credited to Miles from a mixup in front of the Bathurst High goal. The visiting team then opened up and the crimson and black uniforms were all over the ice. "Mose" Haines was right on and there were no goals in the attack. Once a half dozen players piled up in the Fredericton net and the goal was displaced. Fredericton High carried the play back to the Bathurst end and kept the visitors penned in there for some time. Chances with the net wide open were missed. Thompson finally scored the second and the crowd went wild for it looked like Fredericton High's game. Bathurst came

back like a flash and Arthur Aubie went through and scored in quarter of a minute.

Deciding Period.

The Yellow and Black went into the last period leading one goal. Bathurst High were keeping up their fast pace. Luce tied the score two minutes after period began. Good defence would have kept him out. Fredericton High went right back at it and hammered the Bathurst goal. Bond showed his value. Keenan finally put his tear ahead with a long shot from centre ice which hopped over Bond's stick. The Yellow and Black retained the upper hand for some time but Fournier tied the score, stick-handling through and scoring on a wing shot which struck a Fredericton player and glanced into the net.

With the score tied the two teams went at it hard. Bathurst was last night better. Both Horncastle and Neill were getting through on long rushes but could not beat Bond with their shots. The poke checking of the Bathurst players also was troublesome. It was when the defence was not in the best position to stop him that Luce got through and scored from well in. Half a minute later he duplicated the feat. The period was almost gone and Fredericton High drove in a five-man attack but without avail.

At the end of the first period the score was 9 to 17 in favor of the Trojan-Rovers and throughout the second period the only scoring by the Woodstock girls was from one basket and one foul. Ronald Shaw refereed and handled the whistle most satisfactorily.

(Rideaus beat Saint John Trojans in 1925 in the Dominion finals.)

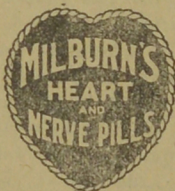

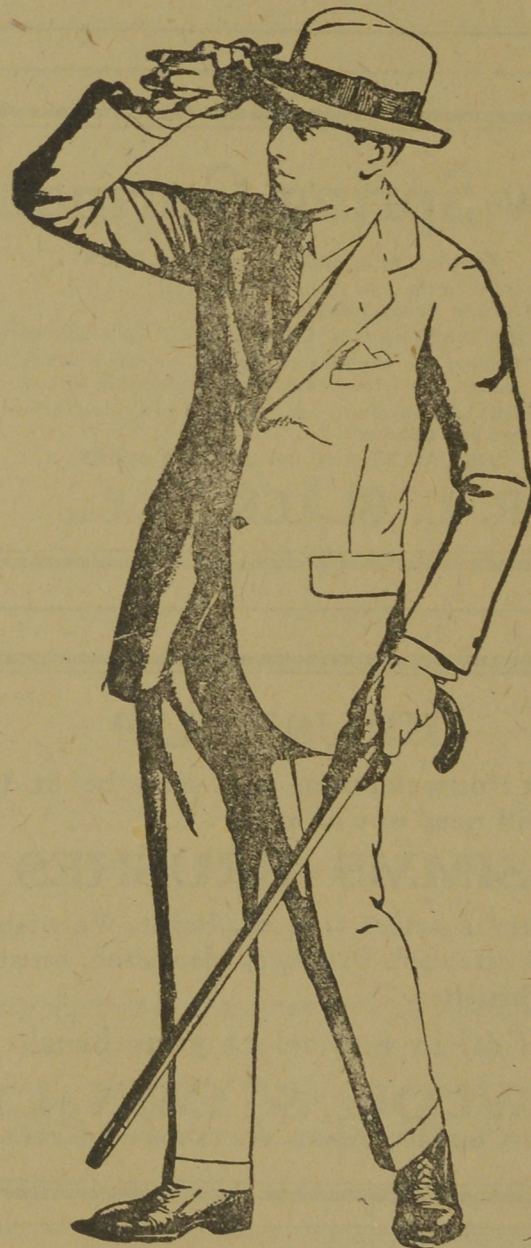
