HELEN WILLS  
TO CARRY GAME  
TO SUZANNE

**American Girl is Taking Hard Course of Training in South of France—Wimbledon Match.**

Paris, May 16—After two weeks of the hardest training she has ever put in, Helen Wills feels that she will give Suzanne Lenglen, the hardest battle of her career when the two meet at the Racing Club of France in the Bois du Boulogne the end of this month.

Miss Wills, her friends say, realizes that she didn't carry the fighting into her enemy's territory enough in the match at Cannes last Winter and that anyone who expects to displace the crown of Suzanne must be prepared to carry the fighting at crucial moments.

If Miss Wills is to realize her life's ambition and bring the tennis title of the world for women back to America she must adopt an offensive that knows no let down and her training has been directed with that in mind.

This style of attack is what Mile Lenglen most fears as it would cut off the brilliant rallies with which she is accustomed to finish her games.

Suzanne, it is reported, believes that in the next match with Miss Wills she will face the game of her life and she is prepared to enter the lists without finding the soft spots in Helen's game of which she was able to take advantage in the Cannes meeting.

The final battle of course will be fought out in the British championships at Wimbledon but a victory by Miss Wills at the Racing Club courts would give her an even break going into the British event and a victory in the latter would give her undisputed right to the women's tennis crown.

When Mile Lenglen arrived from Nice she was asked as to the coming battle.

"She is my rival as you call her," the French woman replied "and we expect to meet on the courts twice this Summer."

HEINIE GROH'S  
TRICK KNEE  
IS HANDICAP

Under the ten-year service rule of the major leagues, Third-Baseman Heinie Groh of the Giants was given his unconditional release. Groh had practically all of his "Big Time" experience with the Cincinnati and New York National League teams. He was in the International League with Rochester in the ante-war days. He may catch a place with some major league outfit, but all have waived on him. Groh is unlikely to perform again as a major league regular, having slowed up in the field at bat. He has a "trick" knee, which has a way of becoming dislocated at the most unexpected and inopportune moments. With his well-known "bottle bat" a stubby model not used by other players and his dashing work around third base he became one of the most picturesque players in the majors and was in several World Series with the Giants.

CROCKER MAY  
QUIT DAVIS CUP  
TEAM OF CANADA

**Business May Force Dominion's Premier Tennis Player to Drop Out of Play in 1926.**

Montreal, May 16—The Montreal Star, in its news columns says:

"Willard F. Crocker, holder of every Canadian tennis title, may quit tournament and Davis Cup play this year, according to a well-known report going the rounds here. 'It appears that unless something extraordinary happens between now and approaching tournaments, Canada will lose its leading racquet wielder.'

'According to information received by The Star Crocker has spoken to President John M. Miller of the Province of Quebec Lawn Tennis Association and told him that business reasons might force him out of the game this summer. He has not definitely decided to drop out, but some matters will have to be adjusted right away to permit him to go ahead in the game as before.'

BUBBLING OVER  
WON THE DERBY

Louisville, Ky., May 16—Bubbling Over carried the E. R. Bradley colors to victory in the 52nd Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs yesterday.

His stablemate, Bagenbaggage, finished second, marking the first time that any stable's entry had finished one-two after having won and placed in a previous Derby. Rockmar was third and Rhinock fourth in the field of 13 colts.

Bubbling Over's time for the mile and a quarter was 2:03 4-5, within two-fifths of a second of the Derby record set by Old Rosebud in 1914.

ONE OF THE  
BEST RIFLE SHOTS  
IN THE EMPIRE

Two years ago Desmond S. Burke of Ottawa then a youth of nineteen years, drew the eyes of the world up on Canada by carrying off the King's Prize at the Bisley competition. On that occasion he won the coveted honor of being acknowledged the best marksman in the British Empire. That it was a steady hand, a good eye and sound judgment that contributed almost entirely to his success was demonstrated by the fact that in addition to the King's Prize he won nearly \$2,500 in other competitions at this rifle meet. This money with a judgment which indicated good mental capacity, he decided to invest in an education; and it is apparent that in pursuing his scholastic course he has given his attention to his studies with the same zeal that marked his enthusiasm in the domain of sport, and was a success similarly gratifying.

On Monday he was awarded the Sanford Fleming Scholarship in science by Queen's University. Burke was a member of the Bisley team from Canada last year, and will be a member again this year. His good work at Queen's will further attract attention to him, and the public will not be displeased if he should repeat this year in Britain his successful performance of 1924. He has set the youth of the Dominion the best kind of example, and he is the type that makes the most desirable citizen.

**Harry Batstone May Return to College—Canadian Football College Champs Building Up Team.**

Kingston, May 16—While there is nothing definite to the story, and neither player will discuss the matter, it is said that Harry Batstone will return to Queen's University next fall to take a post-graduate course while Thomas will probably be seen playing either for Ottawa or M. A. A. in the Interprovincial Union. The star backfield player is again in the city and will be at third base for the C. O. B. L. team. He declines to talk about football.

Batstone would be a great aid to Queen's senior team next fall. With Voss and Chantled on the backfield, Batstone would form the nucleus of another championship team.

To take the place of Thomas Queen's will have Wright the star Hamilton player who held down the outside wing place a year ago when Walker was in Hamilton.

Dr. Karl Quinn, formerly of Queen's and for the past couple of years the outstanding star of the Hamilton Tigers, signed a contract when he was married to Miss Evelyn Cooper daughter of Mrs. H. A. Cooper, of this city. Dr. and Mrs. Quinn left on a short honeymoon trip, after which they will reside in Attleboro, Mass. Thus the Toronto Argonauts who have been claiming Quinn for their Big Four team, will be without him. (Queens won the 1925 Intercollegiate Canadian title but lost the Dominion.)

DEMAR WON  
MARATHON AT  
BALTIMORE

Baltimore, Md., May 16—Clarence R. Demar, of Melrose, Post No. 90 American Legion, Melrose Highlands Mass., won the National A. A. U. Laurel to Baltimore Marathon today. He finished a mile and a quarter ahead of Albert Michelson of the Cygnat A. C., of East Port Chester, Conn. Demar's time for the 26 miles and 385 yards was 2 hours 45 minutes 5 1-5 seconds.

Michaelson finished in 2:53.05 3-5. He reported at the finish that he had had cramps after the 20-mile mark, which slowed him up. His second position, however, was not endangered.

The record was the course is 2:41.39 2-5 made by Frank Zuna in 1924.

Demar finished running strongly and seemed fresh. William Agee of the Emory Wood A. C., Baltimore, finished third, a mile behind Michaelson in 2:58.15 3-5.

Harvey Frick, Melrose A. A., New York was fourth.

Frank Zunt, unattached of Newark N. J., finished fifth. William Kennedy of the Cygnat A. C., East Port Chester, Conn., placed sixth. None of the Canadian entrants finished among the first 12.

TEN CLUBS IN  
N.H.L. ARRANGED  
FOR AT PRESENT

**New York Rangers, Chicago and Detroit Must Have Rinks Finished in Time to Play.**

Montreal, May 16—Provided work has advanced far enough on the rinks to assume a home for the clubs to start scheduled games in November, Chicago and Detroit will have teams in the National Hockey League next season.

The major pro-hockey circuit will be a ten-club loop, the New York Rangers, Tack Hardwick's Chicago club and the Townsend-Seyborne Detroit club having been granted franchises in the major professional league at the concluding session of the semi-annual meeting held here Saturday.

Col. Hammond's New York Rangers are officially in and the Chicago and Detroit clubs are definitely in provided their building plans next September satisfy the league directors. Paddy Harmon's application for a franchise for Chicago was considered and after some discussion it was resolved that, if it was in the best interests of the league so to do a second Chicago franchise would be granted for 1927-28 with the Harmon-Hall interests getting the first consideration.

Thus ended the semi-annual meeting, which has met on three different occasions since the middle of April, and which at one stage became so stormy that an impasse was reached which threatened dire results. However, the path has apparently been fairly well cleared and the final session ended with all clubs in apparent harmony; all signing an agreement to be binding for 15 years that they would stand together for their mutual benefit and cooperation, and would not flirt with proposed new circuits.

Stockholm, May 14—A new project in Swedish education enabling working men and public school children to see the natural sights and historical remains of their own country at little cost, has been announced here.

Though co-operation among the department of education, the Swedish Tourist Association and the State Railways, school children from the plains will be taken around in the mountains and vice versa and while travelling they will live exclusively in special railroad cars, called "train homes."

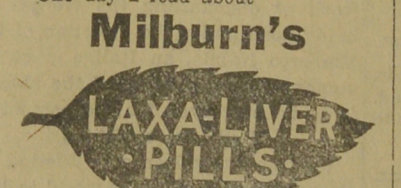

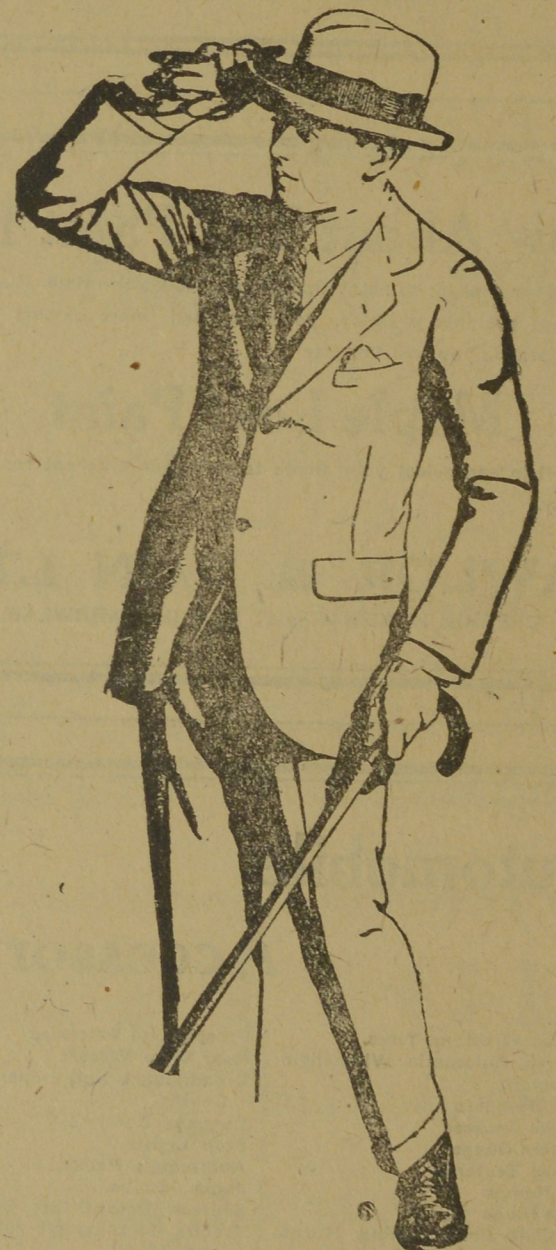
