Mansfield, O., June 18—Circling the track fast, Peter Dillon won the 2.18 trot, carrying a purse of \$1000, winning all three heats. The track was slow and the time a surprise to the spectators.

Favonian, favorite in the 2.09 trot, was nosed out on the stretch in the initial heat by Christie Mac, but came back and took the event by capturing the second and third heats.

Gales Ferry, Conn., June 18—There will be no Harvard-Yale freshman boat race on the Thames this year. Six members of the Yale freshman eight were placed on probation for "cribbing" in their examinations which have just ended here.

The Yale academic authorities announced at New Haven, in a statement which did not arrive at Gales Ferry until 10 p. m., that the freshman race had been cancelled.

BIG ROW IN ONTARIO TOWNS OVER HOCKEY

O. H. A. Broke Up Several Teams when Banning Tourists—Minor Pro Organization Threats.

The locking horns of the O. H. A. authorities with tourist hockey has played havoc with some hand-picked teams.

The Toronto Globe comments as follows:—

Several Western Ontario and other hockey clubs who have been threatening and bluffing the Ontario Hockey Association got their answer from the big league yesterday. As was expected of the association, it stood right up and hewed to the line and a lot of chips fell in spots where they were unwelcome. But the O. H. A. is not being conducted for the benefit of clubs who would play fast and loose with its regulations, heap contumely and ridicule on the amateur definition and the spirit of sport for sport's sake. Jumping-jack hockey players have been warned and warned and warned again of what they might expect, yet they chose to assume an attitude of defiance. Now listen for the useless recriminations. The pity is that no punishment is visited upon those primarily responsible for the condition which forced the action of the association in suspending or refusing certificates to no less than thirty-six players and in withholding its decision on the application of five others. London, Woodstock, Brantford, Hamilton, Stratford, Galt, Windsor, Preston, Milton, Port Colborne, St. Thomas, Toronto, Kitchener and other towns and cities are affected by the ukase of the big league, so that the punitive methods, not only invited, but practically made compulsory if the association is to retain its self-respect and authority, are not applied to restricted groups or localities. Disgruntled clubs and individuals will now proceed to "show the O. H. A." and we may expect to hear of independent and pro leagues. That's fine and no doubt the O. H. A. will give its sympathetic support to those who may decide to come one in the open, renounce O. H. A. affiliation, proceed to operate "on the up and up," and relieve the officials of the necessity of making clubs and players understand that they must comply with the regulations or get out and stay out. Sportsmen worthy of the name everywhere will commend the O. H. A. for its adherence to principle and its emphatic and sweeping refusal to make a mockery of the decencies of clean sport and fair play.

FIRE ALARMS SOUGHT TO BREAK BALL HOODOO

Pittsfield, June 18—Three false fire alarms, one from a box and the other two by telephone messages have been turned in during the past few days, and Fire Chief W. C. Shepard says that the losing streak of the Pittsfield baseball club of the Eastern League is responsible for the mischief.

On Saturday, May 29, the Fire Department had a call and did not have another for nearly two weeks. The Pittsfield club, on May 29, started a losing streak and dropped 14 games in succession. In fact, the losing streak has not been broken. Many persons had a hunch that the club would win when the Fire Department was called. Still three false alarms and a new honest-to-goodness call have failed to get the Hillies started in the right direction.

Chief Shepard wants persons, who are anxious to have the baseball club win telephone Manager Neal Ball of the Pittsfield baseball club and not the Fire Department.

If the new claimant can't prove he is Charley Ross, perhaps he ought to be asked anyway where he was the night Billy Patterson was struck.

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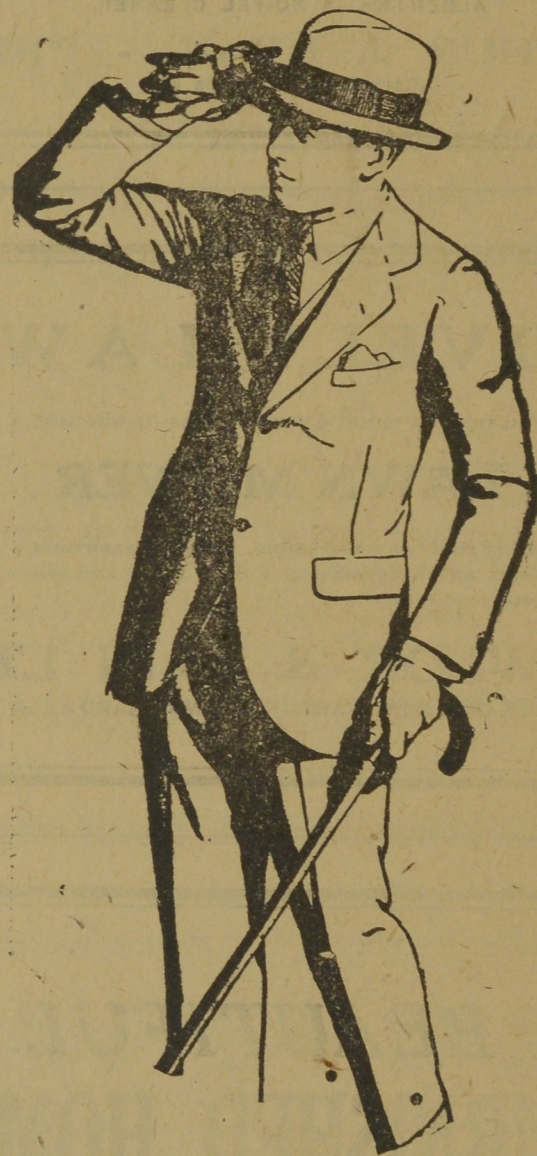
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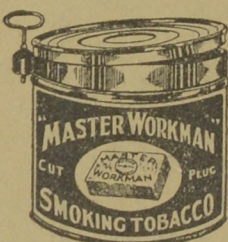
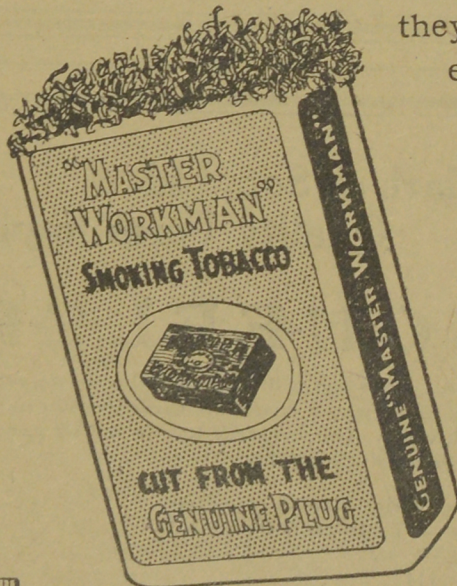
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
