

HEAVIEST THUNDER STORM OF SEASON

Lightning Struck Marysville Cotton Mill and Started Fire—Part of Mill Not Operated Today.

The heaviest thunderstorm of the summer swept across the Province Friday evening having its greatest intensity in this section just about seven o'clock. The same storm was violent in Charlotte and Saint John Counties. A downpour of rain occurred with the storm. The rain was beneficial for forests and farms. About the city there was no damage and merely temporary inconvenience from plugged catch-basins.

Gibson Cotton-mill Struck.

At the height of the storm lightning struck the Gibson cotton-mill at Marysville. The bolt did some damage and also started a fire in the mule-room of the mill. Two mules were destroyed by the fire. The automatic sprinkler system went into action at once and took care of the fire. Employees also returned to the mill and saw that the fire did no greater damage. The damage was on the third floor of the main mill which is of four floors.

Partial Operation Today.

Today there was only partial operation of the cotton-mill all but the picking-room and the napping-room, being in idleness. This was because of the wetting which was received by the belting of the mill. It was feared that operation with wet belts might result in trouble so the day was taken to make things right.

Electric Lighting Affected.

The electric lighting in Barker's Point also was affected by the storm; the lights being out of commission until repairs were made. The storm had like effect on lighting systems at other places in the southern part of the province. Telephone communication with St. Stephen and other places in Charlotte County was interrupted for some time.

Papers to be submitted by other prominent teachers will be "Examinations," "The Country Teacher and Her Work," "School Sport in New Brunswick," "Bilingual Schools," "What Shall We Do For the Super-normal Child," "Nature Study Observations," and "The Inequality of Assessments."

Question of Ownership.

The decision of the Saint John Branch of the G. W. V. A. to remain outside membership in the Canadian Legion, British Empire Service League, brings up the question of the ownership of the G. W. V. A. property in Wellington Row, Saint John. The Provincial Command G. W. V. A. by trust deed had a proprietary interest in the property and that is said to be transferred to the new organization. A holding company the stock in which is held by the City of Saint John now has charge of the property.
