WOODSTOCK SPORTSMEN WANT ILLEGAL FISHING STOPPED ON MIRAMICHI; WILL HELP INSPECTOR

(Woodstock Press.)

The Carleton Branch of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association met at the Court House at 8 o'clock on Tuesday evening. This Branch has 100 members and is the parent of the provincial association which has 2,100 members. The object of the Association is the good and better fishing and hunting in New Brunswick. The motto is: A quitter never wins and a winner never quits. Dr. McIntosh of Hartland presided and P. S. Marsten of Woodstock was secretary. The principal subjects discussed were the efforts made to stop illegal fishing on the lower Miramichi and assist the new hatchery proposed at Bristol. An effort will be made to hold the July meeting at Juniper and hopes are entertained of establishing a branch there.

A communication was received from Francis Kerr, secretary of the provincial association, giving a list of officers of the ten branches which has now over 2,000 members and the work is only beginning.

Dr. Grant said that this branch should be congratulated on the success of the Fish and Game Protective Association as Woodstock was its birthplace which falsifies the charge sometimes made "that nothing good ever comes out of Woodstock."

Moved by Dr. Grant, seconded by Mr. McKenzie, that this branch acquiesce in the suggestions made by Mr. Kerr that in order to retain the services of James Catt, that he be given an increase in pay. Carried.

It was stated that Mr. Catt was an authority on fish growing and that he was at all times anxious to stock all streams that were possible.

Dr. McIntosh said that this branch should let Harry Harrison know that we have confidence in him and that he should see that good wardens are appointed.

Mr. McKenzie—Mr. Harrison is a hard working man and should have a stenographer for the summer to enable him to visit the wardens. Sometimes the wardens do not report everything they see. As the father of the Association, the branch here is well thought of by the other branches.

Dr. Grant—All we can now do is to write to the department stating that we are willing to let matters go as at present for this summer. If Mr. Harrison does not get results, we will demand an investigation by the department and furnish proof under oath of illegal fishing on the lower Miramichi.

A resolution along the lines suggested was prepared by the secretary and will be forwarded to the department.

Dr. Grant—Mr. McKenzie bought a place and established a hatchery. There was good fishing there until a few years ago, and there is hardly any salmon on the upper Miramichi now. The whole fault is with the wardens on the lower Miramichi. Of course we know that Mr. Harrison is a very busy man.

Mr. McKenzie—It looks as if we might have a new 3,000,000 hatchery of 16 ponds in our territory. The government promised this in 1923 and it may be in readiness for spawn this fall. Mr. Catt has just returned from Lockhart's mill and took a 30 days option on a place near Bristol. It will have a short flume and will be a beautiful spot for a hatchery.

Dr. McIntosh and Dr. Grant felt like congratulating this branch on the success of its efforts in connection

with the proposed hatchery. It certainly will continue to jog things along.

Dr. McIntosh referred to the dam at the mouth of the Meduxnakik. He understood if the fishway was not put in by July 1st the department would dynamite the dam.

Col. Dibblee—A new company has now taken over the leases. The dam must be open so that salmon can get up the creek. In the early days it was the very best salmon stream, in which Indians got their fish for the tribe. It should be opened right away.

Mr. Marsten—There is really no objection there now—the salmon can get up the creek.

Col. Dibblee—This week there were some nice salmon trout and good sized grise caught at the mouth of the Meduxnakik.

Joseph Nixon—Hiram Biggar is helping me as warden. There were only 37 or 38 grise and four salmon caught from Juniper to Bill Brook last year. The salmon never get up the river. Between the alder ground and the Forks is the best fishing ground.

Mr. McKenzie—There is a good spawning place about a mile above Bedell Brook, if the salmon can get up. The upper part of the river is the ideal spawning ground. The eggs in my hatchery are about half hatched now. I will keep them until the oil sack is dissolved and then the fry will be active. About 95 per cent comes to maturity through the hatchery; only 7 per cent in the natural state.

Dr. Grant—Only for the fry you put in from your small hatchery there would have been no salmon on the upper Miramichi. I think we should apply for rainbow trout for the Gulae and Meduxnakik.

Mr. McKenzie—These trout cannot be lured and will not take the fly till three years old.

Mr. Marsten—We have better fish in the Atlantic salmon.

BRIGHT OUTLOOK FOR TOURISTS THIS SEASON

Saint John, June 8—That the grant made by the New Brunswick Government to the Tourist Association for advertising the province was justified is evident from the large number of enquiries coming into the tourist office from all parts of the United States.

The illustrated Sunday editions of the larger papers through the New England States and New York State are carrying large display advertisements picturing New Brunswick as the big summer playground of the continent. Accompanying these advertisements in the same papers are illustrated stories telling of our fishing, scenery and climate, and the many natural attractions all parts of New Brunswick offer the tourist.

For the past week enquiries have been reaching the tourist office at the rate of thirty-five to fifty per day, which proves that it pays to advertise.


These enquiries are for all manner of information regarding the province. Requests for a supply of literature dealing with New Brunswick are being received from transportation offices, information bureaus and travel bureaus in California, Louisiana, Oregon, Texas, Washington, Cuba, Wyoming, New York, New England States and Florida. These offices are being supplied with booklets dealing with the various parts of the province.

The special tourist edition of the Montreal Star of May 29th, gives some idea of the interest aroused in New Brunswick Tourist travel, and that paper carried ten separate stories of better than half column length, dealing with Tourist attractions in this Province.

Branches of the New Brunswick Tourist Association have been organized in Fredericton, Moncton, Woodstock, St. Andrews, St. George, Grand Falls, Chatham, Newcastle, Bathurst, and Edmundston, Campbellton and Dalhousie will be organized within the next few days.

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
