## PREMIER BAXTER AND HON. C. D. RICHARDS URGE REDUCTION IN FREIGHT RATES ON MINTO COAL

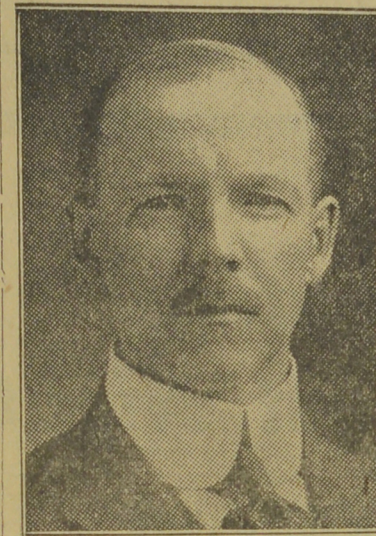
Ottawa, June 9—Recommendations to provide fuel for the people of Canada from the coal mines of the Dominion, instead of importing the commodity, were made this afternoon before the special coal committee of the House by provincial premiers and representatives of provincial governments.

Premier J. B. M. Baxter, of New Brunswick, urged that a way be found whereby coal from the Maritime Provinces would obtain a larger home market in Canada. If coal from the Maritimes was enabled to find an extension of its market, this would help alleviate conditions in the industry.

Premier Baxter believed that if coke ovens were established in large centres, the worth of soft coal produced in the Maritimes, as compared with the present American anthracite now used, would be proven to the people of Central Canada. By the adoption of this process of turning coal into coke, a market for New Brunswick coal in Ontario would result.

### Rate Reduction Asked.

Premier Baxter quoted rates from Minto mines and other New Brunswick points to Sherbrooke, Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa. Hon. Dr. Baxter asked for a reduction of 50 cents per ton in these rates. He understood

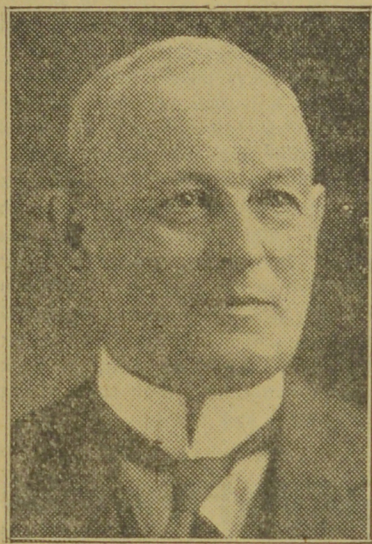


HON. C. D. RICHARDS

ple of many millions and that the national interests demand that the coal industry should be stabilized and further developed to ensure the use of the Canadian product, is of opinion that the government of Canada take immediate steps to ensure the establishment of coking plants in the large centre of population, and the adoption of such other measures by the Dominion as will enable Dominion coals to be marketed in the central parts of Canada, thus aiding in the development of inter-provincial trade and utilizing to the fullest possible extent one of our most important national resources."

Hon. C. D. Richards, minister of mines, in New Brunswick, supported the views earlier expressed by Premier Baxter, of that province.

The committee adjourned.

that if such a decrease were granted, it would enable the Minto mines to compete at Montreal with American coal. Was it not worth doing? he urged. Was it much to ask?

New Brunswick, said Premier Baxter, should be given the opportunity to sell more coal. There was something wrong with a policy under which a railway imported American coal and "beat our own coal."

Premier Howard G. Ferguson, of Ontario, said that Alberta coal had been found "eminently satisfactory." The last shipment received at the \$7 rate had been distributed to some 240 points in Ontario with satisfactory results.

### Transportation Cost.

An investigation of the cost of transportation had been undertaken by the Ontario government. It had been found that out of pocket cost was about \$7.04 per ton. The question of transportation costs would be heard before the Railway Board by December. Ontario was anxious to encourage trade East and West and keep money in Canada rather than import coal.

The people of Ontario, he believed, were prepared to bear a fair and reasonable share of the extra cost to bring in coal from Western and Eastern Canada.

Attorney-General J. C. Douglas, of Nova Scotia, said that a maximum subvention of 50 cents per ton had been in effect, which applied only to railway borne coal. Mr. Douglas strongly urged on behalf of Nova Scotia that this subvention should be renewed and increased to 75 cents of \$1 per ton and apply to coal transhipped to vessels at the port of Montreal. In this way, declared Mr. Douglas, the field for Nova Scotia coal would likely be materially extended into central Ontario points.

Attorney-General Craig, of Manitoba said that the experience of Manitoba with Alberta coal had been highly satisfactory. Manitoba was prepared to do its share in supporting a national fuel policy.

### Resolution Presented.

Mr. Craig presented the following resolution passed at the present conference here of provincial premiers:

"This conference, recognizing that the coal fields of the Dominion are capable of producing ample fuel for its domestic and industrial purposes, that Canada imports annually 15,000,000 tons of coal at a cost to our peo-

(Continued from page eight.) province. Members of the Normal School staff assist him. The examinations are written in the Normal School building, 362 candidates being ready for examination for Grammar School, Superior, Class I and Class II teaching licenses.

The examination papers were kept in a room opposite the Assembly Hall where the majority of candidates write. The door was locked and the papers were in a strong chest locked by two Yale padlocks. Wednesday morning when issuing the examination papers for the morning Mr. Wallace noticed that the sealed envelopes containing the papers were not in the box in the order in which he had placed them there. This showed that three locks on door and chest had been unlocked in an attempt to get at the papers. After conference with his assistants Mr. Wallace decided that although the chest had been opened the envelopes had not been as the wax seals were all intact. For that reason the examination proceeded on Wednesday.

### Cut Around Seals.

Later in the day an examination of some of the envelopes showed that the seals had been cut around and a rigid examination of the others showed that all had been opened in the same way but so carefully that the flaps had been reclosed in a manner that practically defied suspicion. The envelopes contained the examination papers for the balance of the week.

### Must Have Taken Hours.

The cutting of the envelopes around the seals must have taken hours to accomplish and the guilty persons, for more than one is believed involved, must have laid careful plans to accomplish the theft. The change in the program of examinations will make it necessary for many candidates to remain in Fredericton over the weekend, instead of getting away Saturday.

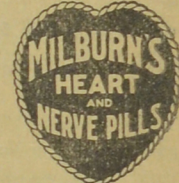

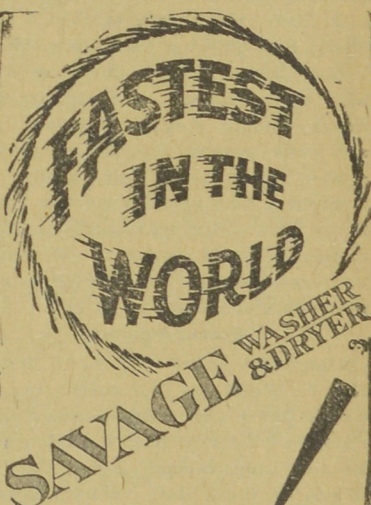

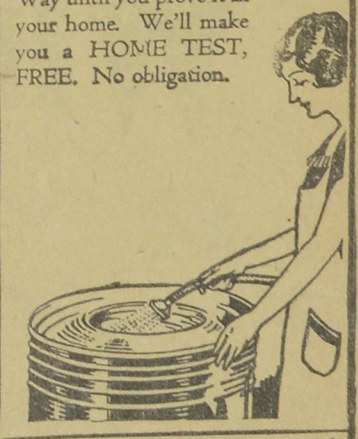
