Marysville made it two straight last night on their own diamond in the York County Amateur Baseball League when Bob Estey erstwhile Devon pitcher, supported by air-tight fielding on the part of his team-mates, applied the kalsomine brush good and plenty to the Fredericton team to the tune of seven to nothing. Estey deserved a no-hit no-run game for the only hit made off his delivery was by Jerry Myshrahl Fredericton outfielder, and helped along by a bad hop went for two-bases.

### Bad Fourth Inning.

It was good baseball for three innings, Marysville not breaking into the scoring until the fourth, when everything that could happen in a ball game did. A. ### Scored Again.

Marysville added two more in the fifth L. White the first batter was hit by McGinnis and stole second. A. McPherson flied out, Bailey singled and he also stole second, and pushed L. White to third. Both runners scored on Earle McPherson's clean single to left-centre field, McGinnis error let him reach second. H. White flied out to Clark and the inning ended when Babbitt the Fredericton catcher threw McPherson out trying to steal third.

Fredericton at no time of the game looked dangerous, as they never got a man past second base, only twice did a man reach second, once in the first inning and again in the second.

The Fredericton players need much practice and must get down to hard

work-outs and lots of batting practice which they showed they lacked badly.

### Hall Fredericton Captain.

At a meeting of the team Tuesday evening Harold Hall was elected captain, and the team is expected to make a better showing later in the season.

Devon plays the Fredericton team at the Queen Square Diamond on Friday evening and both teams will battle hard to keep out of the cellar position. ## JOAN FRY IS ENGLAND'S BEST TENNIS EXPERT

Beat Elizabeth Ryan at Paris in Three-Set Match — Displayed Wonderful Court Form.

Paris, June 9—The women's singles in the international hard court tennis tournament furnished three of the most keenly contested sets seen in many a day.

The semi-finals brought together Joan Fry, a young English girl who had her first test in tournament play against Suzanne Lenglen at Wimbledon last year, and Miss Elizabeth Ryan, veteran Californian.

The English girl won in a gruelling three-set match, 7-5, 3-6, 11-9, and thereby has the privilege of meeting the French champion, Suzanne Lenglen, in the semi-finals.

Both players gave a wonderful exhibition, but after two sets had been played, rain interrupted the battle. When they met for the third set, it was a keen struggle all the way, with Miss Ryan leading at 9-8. Then the English girl broke through Miss Ryan's service and made it even. The 19th went to deuce four times, and this Miss Fry annexed, as she did the 20th, where she broke through Miss Ryan's service after the game went to deuce, and took the two winning points and the set.

## HOFF, AFTER \$50,000 FROM AMERICAN A.A.U.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 9—The Los Angeles Times will say that Charles Hoff of Norway, world's pole vaulting champion, who was barred by the U. S. Amateur Athletic Union from further competition in the United States after he had refused to compete at San Francisco this spring, is planning a suit against the athletic body for \$50,000 for alleged defamation of character.

The Times expresses the belief that Hoff is low financially, having received no money from the A. A. U. since his refusal to compete at San Francisco.

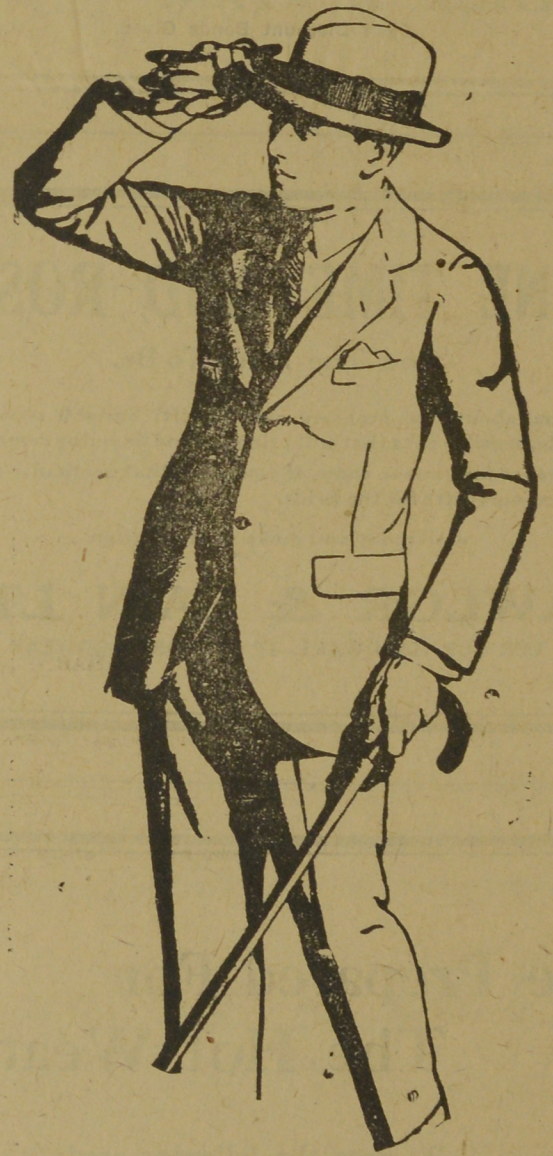
