

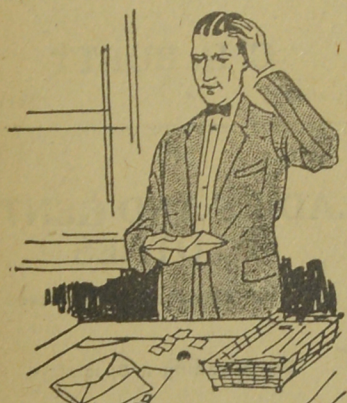



DON'T BE AFRAID OF WATER! IT WON'T SPOIL YOUR FACE.

What is the best way to cleanse the face? There is one great natural cleanser of which we should not deprive our skins—and that is water. Safe water will not hurt the face and, too, the right sort of bland soap exists for practically every type of skin. Soap and water need not be feared; but because of certain conditions in which we live and because of the various forms of makeup that we use on our faces, there is also a distinct place for the cosmetic cleanser.

There are three forms of this cleanser generally speaking: the cream, the oily or creamy emulsion and the clear liquid.

The cream—most commonly known as "cold cream"—is perhaps the commonest and most widely used form. And yet it frequently imperils beauty. In choosing a cream, avoid the one that seems thick, heavy, dense, that does not readily dissolve on the face. It may have wax or lard as its chief ingredient and is therefore more liable to clog the pores than to cleanse them. There are creams made on a mineral oil base that are to be preferred for cleansing the face. They liquefy upon application and can be readily removed. It is not the function of a cleansing preparation to stay with the skin.

Whatever cream you use make it a rule always to remove every bit of it after it has done its work.

BACON, RICE AND EGGS.

1 cup boiled rice
3 eggs
3 tablespoons cold milk
1-2 teaspoon salt
Dash white pepper
1 tablespoon chopped celery top
6 thin slices bacon
Put the bacon into pan and fry until crisp brown; remove and place on hot plate. Put the rice and grated onion into frying pan in which the bacon was fried and beat thoroughly then add the eggs which have been beaten until well mixed but not light, and stir until the egg is set. Put on hot platter and the bacon curls around the edge of the eggs; garnish with sprigs of parsley or sprinkle with 1 tablespoon chopped parsley.

BIG ROYALTIES FOR A BOOK

Moscow, June 9—Mikhail Sivachey, struggling Russian author, recently found a way to doubling the starvation royalties paid to soviet writers by selling simultaneously the same manuscript to two publishing trusts. One trust published his book with the title "Yellow Devil" and the other under the less lurid title of "Rural October." When it was discovered that the contents were identical both publishers protested to the local committee of the writers' union. The latter decided that while the practice was unethical such methods were forced by the publishers who compelled the writers to accept unfair contracts and refused to pay them the minimum royalties specified by the Association of Revolutionary Writers. The union assured the publishers that the practice would continue.

POACHED EGGS FLAVORED WITH DRIED BEEF.

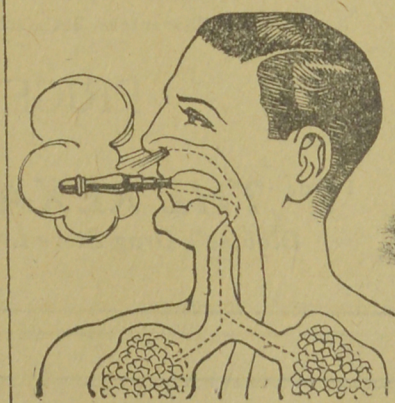
4 eggs
4 slices toast
1 cup white sauce
4 tablespoons dried beef
1-2 teaspoon salt
Dash paprika
Sprigs parsley
Put the toast on hot platter and cover with the white sauce to which the minced dried beef has been added. Poach or steam the egg and place on top; dust with salt and paprika. Should the cream sauce not be used, dip the bread in hot milk, sprinkle with the meat and cover with the egg. This makes a very pleasant change and no matter how little meat there is, it will add to the dish.

EGG LUNCHEON SALAD.

6 hard-boiled eggs
4 cups shredded lettuce
1-2 cup mayonnaise
1-2 cup French dressing flavored with onion
Salt and pepper
Line shallow bowl or salad plates with lettuce. Separate the eggs, slice the whites into narrow strips and put on the lettuce; rub the yolks through coarse strainer or fruit press over the whites. Sprinkle with salt, and pepper to taste; put the mayonnaise or boiled dressing on in two or three mounds then put a tablespoon of French dressing on

LISTING FARM HOUSES AND PRIVATE HOMES FOR TOURISTS

As a result of the extensive advertising campaign which has been, and at the present time is being, carried on by the Canadian National Railways throughout the United States and Canada, along with the efforts of the various Tourist Associations and Publicity Bureaux, it is expected that a large number of tourists will visit the Maritime Provinces during the coming season, which will tax the combined hotel and resort facilities to their utmost. But there would appear to be an almost unexploited field of opportunity as regards farm houses and private homes of the Provinces in which vacationists would be welcomed as paying guests, that may, with advantage, be opened up, and which will bring in visitors who, for some reason or another, are not attracted to hotel and resort accommodation. It is essential, of course, that such places be equipped with reasonable sanitary conveniences.

To have available a reserve of tourist accommodation and to provide for this class of visitor, your co-operation is asked and any of those who may be desirous of accommodating paying guests this season are requested to send in to the General Passenger Department of the Canadian National Railways at Moncton, N. B., their names, with Post Office address and information as to rates per day and per week, number of persons that can be accommodated, distance from railway station and mode of conveyance from and to railway station with rates charged therefor, whether room and meals or room only can be furnished, and particulars as to any exceptionally attractive features in the district, such as boating, bathing, fishing, golf or tennis and the like. This information will be listed and kept available for the information of prospective visitors.
