SEVENTY PER CENT OF GATE IS THE OFFER

Wanderers Generous in Their Offer to Caledonia Club for Match in Halifax Saturday.

The Halifax Wanderers take an independent attitude with regard to the McCurdy Cup playoff and incidentally are generous in their offer to Caledonia for a match in Halifax. The Halifax Chronicle says:

Wanderers, Maritime English Rugby football champions in 1925, and holders of the McCurdy Trophy the Caledonia, champions of Cape Breton, and winners over Mount Allison, winners of the New Brunswick League, may clash here Saturday afternoon at the Wanderers Grounds in the final game for the trophy.

Officials of the Wanderers met last night and discussed the matter. Late last evening they informed C. R. Chipman, trustee of the trophy that they would play Caledonia here or not at all. The Wanderers have offered Caledonia a substantial offer to meet here and as the game is expected to attract a large crowd it is quite probable that the contest will be staged Saturday.

Late last evening Mr. Chipman sent the following telegram to the manager of the Caledonia team at Glace Bay:

"Wanderers refuse to play except in Halifax. They made trip to Fredericton this season and will do no more travelling. They offer you seventy per cent of the net gate to play in Halifax at the Wanderers' Grounds, Saturday, November 27."

Mr. Chipman expressed the opinion last night that the Cape Bretoners would accept the offer. He expects a telegram from the Caledonia officials today.

Providing the game is staged, Wanderers may not be able to place on the field the team that defeated University of New Brunswick and Dalhousie Tigers this season.

Richie MacCoy, the "Mighty Atom," whose educated toe was one of the outstanding features of the season, is at present in New Brunswick, and may not be here for the game while "Timmy" Hunter is still nursing a sore shoulder a sprained knee and two badly battered hands.

MacCoy's injuries are still painful but if he happens to be in the city Saturday he will be expected to play. Following the final game with U. N. B. the Reds broke training but they are all in fine shape still and will be ready to show their best against the Cape Bretoners.

Mrs. C. F. Adams, Wedgemore Farm Framingham, has bought the highly regarded trotter, Silk Aubrey, by Bingen Silk, 2.07¼, out of Sweet Aubrey, 2.08¼.

Ribbon Cane, 2.01¼, will go to the sale ring looking a bit tough, as before her owner decided to close out his racing stable, Gene Hays had blistered her legs.

MONTREAL WON HARD GAME AT BOSTON

Boston, Mass., Nov. 23—The world champion Montreal Maroons defeated the Boston Bruins in a National Hockey League fixture here tonight, 2 to 1. It was a rugged battle, with honors even, and the tide was turned late in the third period, when Nelson Stewart, Maroon centre, sent a soft shot over Doc Stewart's shoulder for the deciding tally. Stewart had scored Montreal's first goal in the first period. Cooper shot in the Boston counter in the second.

From outset it was rough going and after a hectic first period, in which six minor penalties and one major were inflicted, Referee O'Hara harangued squads, at midice and ordered better behavior. The improvement was noticeable thereafter. Cleg-horn, captain of the Bruins, drew the major penalty. He cut down Phillips with his stick in a mix-up near his goal and the Maroon was out for rest of the game. Boston had seven minor penalties, of which two went to Shore, while Montreal had six. Dutton played a hard game for the visitors.

Although Herberts was missing from the Boston line-up through illness, the forward line was formidable. Shore, Keats, Galbraith and Cooper displayed a dangerous attack and gave promise of team work later in the season.

Nelson Stewart, leading the Maroon attack, was ably assisted by Punch Broadbent, Babe Seibert and Dutton.

GERMANY WILL ENTER IN DAVIS CUP CONTEST

New York, Nov. 24—Germany's admission to Davis Cup competition and membership in the International Lawn Tennis Federation is forecast by the attitude and action of United States Tennis officials.

Julian S. Meyrick, chairman of the international play committee has sent a letter to Secretary R. Gallay of the I. L. T. F. recommending Germany's re-admittance.

There are some good tennis players in Germany who would be strong contenders in Davis Cup competition. When "Vinnie" Richards and Howard Kinsey paid a flying visit to Berlin last summer, the American stars met unexpected defeat. Dr. Heinz Landman, F. W. Rahe, Baron Bela de Kehrting, Otto Froitscheim and Oscar Kreuser are some of the leading German stars.

New York, Nov. 23—Gene Tunney world's heavyweight champion has made a pass at George Bernard Shaw. The erudite boxer admits that "Shaw is the possessor of one of the greatest minds among living men—possibly the greatest," but he deprecates Shaw's story of "Cashel Byron's Profession."

THIRTY SECOND OLD GLORY SALE THE ATTRACTION

Ivory Hunters Busy—Walter Garrison by Spending \$2,300 Last Year Won 37 Races.

Boston, Nov. 23—Reading will be the major occupation of men interested in the light harness horse for the next few days and the subject matter that will be thoroughly absorbed is not between the pages of one of the "10 best sellers."

The volume they will read with much interest contains much of fact and some fiction. It is the catalogue of the 32d Old Glory auction.

The demand for racing material has never been as strong as right now, and with next week's sale having more horses ready for immediate campaigning than any auction of the past dozen years, it is natural that the present catalogue should receive more than ordinary attention.

Valuable Colts.

The feature auctions have of late been quite generally accepted as the place to secure future racing material. In other words the colts have been the offerings counted worth while. Ready-to-race horses, unless from an estate or a known genuine dispersal, have been as a rule rather carelessly considered.

The 1926 success of Walter Garrison, trainer extraordinary in gaining first place in the list of race winning reinsmen has sullied the oft repeated comment of owners and trainers as they talked of the auctions "nice lot of yearlings but nothing much else."

A Good Buy.

The New Jersey trainer went to Squadron A Armory last December and by the expenditure of less than \$2300 secured four head with which he won 37 races this past season. Club Ortolan 2.08¼; Berry the Great, 2.07¼; Peter Leonard 2.13¼ and Gwyn Worthey 2.12¼.

Garrison bought only the four and his success with them at the races completed a feat that will probably go down unequalled. For Club Ortolan he paid \$400 and won 12 races with him, including the Trotter and Pacer Futurity. Berry the Great cost \$500, won nine races and was sold for \$10,000; Peter Leonard cost \$1000 won 11 races and was sold in mid-summer for \$7000.

Little wonder that the "Ivory hunters" are going to delve deeply into the contents of the 1926 Old Glory catalogue.

The ready-to-use horses are more numerous than in years and the number of horses with demonstrated speed, which look to have a chance is also much greater.

CANADIENS BROKE INTO THE WIN COLUMN

Forum, Montreal, Nov. 23—Canadiens scored their first victory of the National League season here tonight when they defeated New York Americans by the score of 2 to 0.

Outskating the Americans for two thirds of the contest the Canadiens fully deserved their margin though it was not until halfway through the final period that the local team finally clinched the game. New York finished with a vicious attack, but superb goaling by Hainsworth blocked possible tallies. The net guarding at both ends was spectacular throughout the contest.

New York lost much of their punch when Charlie Langlois was knocked out in the second session. Langlois collided with the Canadiens goal post, head on, and had to be assisted in a dazed condition to the bench. He returned to the play, however.
