

SHIPPING STRAWBERRIES TO NORTH MAINE

Local Price Kept up by That—Rain Expected to Shorten the Season.

There have been heavy shipments of strawberries to Northern Maine towns from Fredericton during the past day or two with the result that the price of the berries has been kept up in the Fredericton market. Strawberries do not yield as well some miles north of this district and Edmundston and neighboring places on this side of the line as well as places in Aroostook County each season take local berries in increasing quantities.

Two days of fine weather this week following a heavy storm put many strawberries on the market. The rain today may have the effect of curtailing the yield. The expectation is that the crop will be lighter than usual owing to the late spring.

Berries were retailing by the box at fifteen cents today. In the mid-week market the same price was asked. By the crate the price was lower and eleven cents was taken in some cases. The height of the strawberry season should be reached the latter part of this week or early next week.

REMOVAL OF PLANT OF MARITIME ELECTRIC CO. TO DEVON IS FORECAST

R. D. Donaldson of New York, Vice-president, in Conference With Committee of City Council Tuesday Night — Vibration Complained of Can be Reduced but Blowers Must Operate— Interested in Hydro Possibilities — Coal-pro- duced Current Can Compete.

There was a conference Tuesday night in the Mayor's office at the City Hall, between the special committee named by the City Council and Roderick D. Donaldson of New York City, vice-president of The Maritime Electric Company which furnishes the electric current used in Fredericton and vicinity. The subject was the complaint on the part of various residents of King's Ward concerning vibration caused by the plant in Shore street and also the operation of the blowers. Ald. Parker H. Currier had taken up this matter with the company previously on behalf of his constituents. Mr. Donaldson arriving here yesterday opportunity was presented for a conference.

Impossible to Eliminate All.
Mr. Donaldson discussing the complaints of vibration said that it was

Distribution of Hydro.

Mr. Donaldson said that he company would not wish to complete with the city should the latter decide to undertake distribution. The city's representatives did not commit themselves on the matter. If the city did not enter the field the company could act as distributors. If they received hydro current the company would extend its system through adjoining country.
