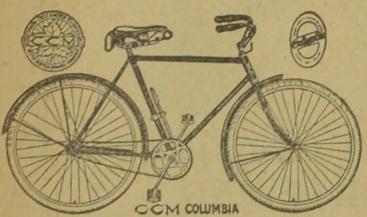

JAMESON AND LAROCHELLE OF THE CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION TENDER THEIR RESIGNATIONS

Ottawa, April 29—Revelations before the parliamentary committee investigating the administration of the Customs Department have resulted in the resignation of two members of the Civil Service Commission, Clarence Jameson and M. G. Larochelle submitted their resignations to Premier Mackenzie King tonight. The resignations are contained in two brief letters.

Mr. Jameson states that in the discharge of his official duties he was not in any way influenced by occurrences referred to before the parliamentary committee.

"I have scrupulously accomplished my duty for nearly 18 years and my conscience is absolutely clear," Mr. Larochelle states in his brief letter of resignation.

Motion Submitted.

Ottawa, April 29—"Having regard to the evidence given before this committee showing that they displayed gross disregard for the discipline which they should have been the first to maintain" such are the words of an amending motion submitted this afternoon to the special committee investigating the customs administration in regard to the cases of Messrs. Larochelle and Jameson of the Civil Service Commission.

The evidence to which the committee's resolution refers is that the two commissioners received gauger's liquor from R. P. Clerk, inspector of customs and excise, at the port of Montreal.

The motion came in the form of an amendment by D. M. Kennedy of Peace River to a previous motion by Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative, of West Calgary.

Boivin Mentioned.

Mr. Bennett had moved: "That this special committee appointed to investigate the administration of the Department of Customs and Excise reports to the House of Commons as follows: 'Several witnesses who have appeared and been examined under oath have given testimony reflecting upon the action of Hon. George H. Boivin, Minister of Customs and Excise, in connection with certain legal proceedings against one Moses Aziz of Caraque, N. B., for breach of the Customs Act of Canada and of Clarence Jameson and M. J. Larochelle, commissioners of the civil service. Your committee having regard to the practice of Parliament and the provisions of the Civil Service Act, respectfully report the relevant evidence and proceedings in this above matters to the House of Commons for such consideration and action as may seem meet in the premises.'"

Boivin's Name Cut Out.

Liberals objected to the coupling of the name of the Minister of Customs with that of the two civil service commissioners, and Mr. Kennedy then moved the amendment which cut out the reference to Mr. Boivin.

Mr. Bennett objected that the amendment was out of order. Chairman Mercier ruled that it was in order, and the motion, as amended, was carried. Mr. Bennett gave notice that he would appeal to the House of Commons against the ruling of the chair.

The effect of Mr. Bennett's appeal will be to bring both motion and amendment before the House.

The examination of Captain J. D. Zinck, of Lunenburg, N. S., was continued in the afternoon.

Capt. Zinck Questioned.

A. J. Doucet questioned Captain Zinck closely in regard to a number of schooners, supposed to be rum-runners, some of which, the witness said, belonged to William Duff, deputy speaker of the House of Commons and member for Lunenburg county. Captain Zinck proved a reluctant witness and C. W. Bell threatened to appeal to the chairman to declare the witness in contempt of the committee.

This occurred after Mr. Doucet had questioned Captain Zinck in regard to his evidence at a trial in Lunenburg in connection with the seizure of a vessel called the "Ellis B." Mr. Doucet said that he was informed that Captain Zinck had sworn that he made regular returns to Ottawa of the surplus money collected for watchmen stationed on liquor vessels in Lunenburg harbor.

The witness admitted that he might have said this.

Reply Insisted On.

"If you did, your statement was

false?" asked Mr. Bell, referring to contradictory evidence given by Captain Zinck this morning. The witness did not reply and the question was repeated with emphasis.

Mr. Bell insisted on a reply, and finally the witness admitted that if he had made the remark, it was false.

S. E. Mack, collector of customs at Lunenburg, told the committee that he was surprised when he learned that Captain Zinck had not made returns of the money collected by him to Ottawa.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE FOUND CHARGES

Committee also find that the recommendations made from time to time by the Chief Scaler were over-ruled by the then Minister of Lands and Mines and that the charge that the Chief Scaler's hands were tied is fully borne out. The Committee also finds that if the budworm-killed lumber and defective lumber had been cut as represented when the classification was received by the River Valley Lumber Company and the regulations observed so far as the cutting of undersized and green lumber and defective lumber had province would have received a much larger amount of revenue therefrom.

Commission on Crown Lands.

A recommendation for a more complete and accurate record of value of the Crown Lands of the province also is made by the Committee in the report and to this end a suggestion is put forward that a committee of five competent men might be selected and empowered to take evidence from all the holders of Crown Lands of full and complete information respecting the areas held by them. The Committee believes this to be important not only from the standpoint of giving to the department valuable information but also because of the transition through which this industry is now passing and to enable the Government before the time arrives for the fixing of the rate of stumpage.

The committee notes that it was impressed with the vast amounts over-expended without the consent of the Legislature and calls attention to a resolution adopted condemning this practice.

Queens and Charlotte.

Respecting the charges preferred by J. S. Lord, member for Charlotte, of irregularities of the road accounts of Charlotte county involving J. M. Scovil, of St. Stephen, the Committee declares it has not had time to go into these matters and they are referred to the Government for such action as it might deem necessary in the public interest. Criticism is made of expenditures in Queen's county by Supervisor McCrea and the Committee finds that sufficient care was not taken in checking up accounts before payment had been made.

Health Department.

Touching on the Department of Health the Committee recommends the following suggestions for reduction of expenditure in this department:

1. That printing expenditure be curtailed.
 2. That the medical school inspectors be required in future to observe closely the wishes of the parents in regard to vaccination.
 3. That every precaution be taken against incurring extraordinary expenditures for and that the Health Act be amended re-medical school inspection with a view to having the local doctors carry on this duty.
- Respecting agriculture the Committee desires to impress upon the Minister and the Government the necessity during the coming year of a thorough re-organization. The report says: "Your Committee believes that a small staff in Fredericton with a careful selection of district representatives, say five or six in number, located at various points throughout the province and prepared to demonstrate in a practical way to the farmers would be much more effective than under the present system."

WILD GEESSE ARE DESTRUCTIVE IN THE WEST

White Salmon, Wash., April 30—Defying tradition and wearing the patience of wheat growers to a frazzle, 25,000 or more wild geese refuse to migrate north this spring, according to news brought here from the Big Bend country of the Columbia River.

Last winter this gigantic flock of honkers violated the semi-annual custom of traveling south and remained in Southern Washington during the season. An organized effort by wheat growers drove them over the river into Oregon for a time, but they soon returned to feast on the young grain in Washington.

Now the geese refuse to depart, although the time for their long pilgrimage to the Yukon delta is past due. Ray Steele, United States game warden, has just returned from the goose-infested country. He declares the flocks hold contempt for the farmers' shot-guns and "stay put" in spite of all attempts to frighten them away, except for a brief period.

Each morning at break of day geese arrive from the misty islands and congregate on the fields where wheat, barley and oats planted last fall now are about five inches high. The geese graze through the fields like cattle, eating the tender blades clear to the ground.

Clarke also of this city. The funeral will take place Sunday afternoon with service at the late home by Rev. F. H. Holmes. Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery.

COMMUNISTS PLAN GREAT PARIS STRIKE

Paris, April 29—The Communists are preparing to utilize to the utmost the fact that Labor Day, May 1, falls on Saturday and to organize a series of Bolshevik demonstrations through the country. They are counting upon the verdict in the trial of two of their members for murder when the monarchist demonstrations were fired upon to swell the numbers.

Calling on all other labor organizations to show a united front with the Communists against capital the Communists hope to bring about a complete stoppage of work for twenty-four hours. The appeals have had a disconcerting success at any rate in one quarter.

The printers and typesetters of the official Communist organ, L'Humanite, conscious of their proletarian duty, have refused to bring out a paper on May 1, saying that it is up to them to lead the way. They reply to all arguments intended to show them the necessity to the success of the movement of the publication of the paper that the leaders may be able to incite the proletariat of Paris by saying:

"Yet you yourselves tell us we would be traitors to our class if we work on May Day. Therefore, as convinced artisans of the revolution, we will not do so."

Capt. Treint, Moscowite dictator of the French Communists, shrugs his shoulders despairingly over the attitude of the printers who are the fiercest members of the party. He says:

"These fellows will never know how to revolt."
