DALHOUSIE BEAT ACADIA FIVE AGAIN

Close Game at Halifax Not Decided Till the Final Whistle — 34 to 28 Score.

Dalhousie Tigers basketball players repeated their feat of last week, yesterday, when they defeated Acadia by a score of 34-28. The score is a fairly good indication of the play and it was only when the game was finished that the Tigers were sure of their victory.
Acadia went right after the locals from the start, and secured several shots at the Tigers' net. Wild shooting, however, prevented them from scoring. Langstroth got the first basket for the locals on a shot from centre. Dalhousie's lead was of short duration for Noble netted the ball for the visitors a minute later. Both teams had many shots at their opponents basket but because of poor shooting no score was made. About the middle of the period the players seemed to strike their stride and become more accurate in their shooting. The period was fairly evenly divided, the score standing at the close 13-12 in favor of Acadia.

Dal Penalized.
The locals took on a new lease of life at the opening of the second half and rushed matters from the start. They played better combination than in the previous frame with the result that they secured twenty-two points. Shortly after the start they secured the lead and urged on by their supporters they increased it to three. Acadia tied up matters once again and the spectators were kept on the qui vive. McLellan, who was playing a great game for the locals, ran in three baskets in quick succession, giving them a six point lead which they held until the finish.
Acadia had two fouls only called on them to their opponents' eight.
A. T. Bradshaw refereed to the satisfaction of both teams.

University of N. B. Tied With Acadia on Goals In Western Section

Lost by One Goal to Mt. Allison at Sackville Last Night 4 to 3 — Conference Last Autumn Decided Two-Cornered Tie Must be Played Off.

Playing the first game in foreign ice and the second of the season, University of New Brunswick lost to Mt. Allison 4 to 3 in the third game of the Western Maritime Intercollegiate Hockey Section at Sackville Thursday night. Fred McLean of this city who is coaching Mount A. turned out a team which won its home game in the section thus making a three-cornered tie. The rule adopted at the Truro conference last autumn dealing with three-cornered ties states that total goals are to count and in that case Mount A. is out by the narrow margin of one goal, and U. N. B. and Acadia are tied.
In scoring the local college is equal in offense to Acadia and shades it in defence. The difference among the three teams is very slight however.
About the Same as Last Year.
U. N. B. is now about in the same position as last year except that instead of losing one game a tie was played in the first game of the season. Mount A. was the team which had to be met in a playoff. This year it is Acadia.
There is some speculation as to the place in which the playoff with Acadia will be held. Saint John is considered the most likely.

Still Chance to Come Through.
The followers of the Red and Black were disappointed when the word came through last night but it is recognized that the team is weak in certain points because of academic qualification rules. The team has had no opportunity of playing together except in the college games and may pull together as did the 1924 squad which after a poor start went through to a Maritime college title.

SECOND PERIOD MOUNT A'S U. N. B. Took Early Lead But Lost It — Game Close Throughout.

Sackville, Feb. 18—Playing a brand of hockey seldom seen in local intercollegiate circles, Mount Allison stepped into the University of New Brunswick squad here tonight and clinched last year's Maritime intercollegiate champions by four goals to three.
Play was fast from the initial face-off with U. N. B. having a territorial advantage in the first period. Steen took the first shot of the game but Jamieson saved. Rogers got in some good rushing, but Carten was doing some good net minding. The U. N. B. forward line came through with some nice combination, but it was broken up by the Mount Allison defense. Jamieson was making some fine stops. Keenan and McLellan got in a nice combined rush but Carten saved. Fraser replaced Doddridge toward the end of the period. The only score of the period came a scant five seconds before the bell, when Keenan put U. N. B. in the lead, for the only time during the game, with a hard shot from the wing.
Second Period.
The second period was hardly well under way before Wilson McLean sent the Mt. A. fans wild with a nice rush down centre ice, scoring on a long shot. Keene took the rubber from the face-off, but Jamieson came out to

A. rushing the play; score 3 to 1.

Final Session.

The final session opened fast with U. N. B. playing a four-man forward line. Jamieson saved finely from a mix-up in front of the net. Play was very even at this time, with both teams checking well. Oliver and McLellan got through, but Carten saved. Ten minutes from the bell McLean poked in Mt. A.'s fourth and winning tally.

A few minutes later Chalmers got U. N. B.'s second, batting in a rebound. Jamieson had no chance to save. McLean was penalized for alleged tripping and during his absence Bud Steen pulled one of his sensational rushes, notching up the final score of the game, two minutes before the contest ended. The bell found Mt. A. desperately trying for the goal that would have tied up the section, and U. N. B. battling equally hard for the single tally that would have given them the championship of the Western Intercollegiate League. As it now stands the league is a tie in games played, each team having won and lost a game, but Acadia and U. N. B. are tied at the top with eight goals each, while Mt. A., victors in the final struggle, has seven.

For Mt. A., McLellan, McLellan and Rogers were good with McLean starring. Jamieson, playing his first game for hockey, turned in a splendid game in the nets. Keene, Steen and Keenan were the pick of the U. N. B. squad. Joe Payne refereed.

MONTREAL KEEPS UP WITH THE LEADERS

Maroons and Ottawa Both Won in N. H. L. — The Boston Bruins Stepped up Into Third Place.

Montreal, Feb. 18—Montreal came through with an unexpected victory here tonight when they trounced the Toronto St. Patrick's, 5 to 2.
But the Maroons did not clinch the game before being given a fright by the Irishmen. Montreal were smart in team play in the first period and rounded the Irish defence for three goals within the first 23 minutes. Then they became careless. Babe Dye, Jack Adams and Mike Neville opened up an attack to save their team from a whitewash and their efforts brought two goals and left the team contending strongly for the tying count as Montreal were short-handed. But the local team took a grip on themselves and that startling goal sniper, Nelson Stewart, went on the rampage. Before he was through he had once again pulled a game out of the fire for the Maroons, counting his second and third goals of the match in the last five minutes of the game to clinch the struggle for the Maroons and kept them in the running with Ottawa for first place in the league standing. The defeat practically ended any chance St. Patrick's had of getting into the coveted first three positions.

Ottawa Won Again.
Ottawa, Feb. 18—For the sixth time this season Montreal Canadiens went down before the Ottawa Senators when the locals defeated Montreal Frenchmen 4 to 2 here tonight.
The defeat was a sad blow to the Canadiens hopes by the league leaders made no mistake about the verdict, outplaying the Canucks for the greater portion of the playing time.
New York Lost Again.
New York, Feb. 18—The Boston Bruins battled the New York Americans with every known means of hockey attack tonight, afflicting them with a defeat of 7 to 3 and used their prostrate forms to step into third place in the National Hockey League.
The Bruins now hold a half game lead over Pittsburgh for the "show" position in the league standing.
