## SUZANNE SAYS SHE WILL NOT PLAY IN U.S. A.

**Denies Any Agreement ment to Appear—Also Says Her Features are Not Suitable for Motion Pictures.**

Rome, May 2—Mlle. Suzanne Lenglen, French lawn tennis star who is visiting Italy, denied that she had any intention of going to America.

When asked concerning the agreement said to have been reached calling for her appearance in the United States, she said:

"I haven't the slightest intention of going to America. I play for my own pleasure and am completely free to do so when and where I desire."

Asked regarding the report that she intended to go into the motion pictures, she declared her features were not suited for such work.

### Tell of an Agreement.

New York, May 2—Mlle. Suzanne Lenglen's apparent disavowal of tentative arrangements for coming to this country this year to appear in motion pictures and play exhibition tennis evoked from Charles C. Pyle the comment that the French star "has merely decided to make no formal confirmation until her status as an amateur player is cleared up."

William H. Pickens, Pyle's European representative, declared that signed agreements which he got constitute Pyle's best indorsement of his good faith.

"These agreements," said Pickens "are signed by Charles Wilen, Mlle. Lenglen's business representative. Mlle. Lenglen herself introduced me to Wilen after I had come to terms with the player."

"Owing to the fact that her requirements called for a revision of the contract which had been drawn by Mr. Pyle final papers were not signed because the latter's approval was necessary. Mr. Pyle agreed to the conditions at once and we so called Mlle. Lenglen. Later cables from France indicated their acceptance by Mr. Wilen."

"This agreement calls for Mlle. Lenglen's appearance in this country this summer the final articles to be signed in June at which time we will fulfill the first condition of the contract by depositing \$25,000 in a French bank."

"As for her not filming well we will be the judges of that. Our producers and scenario writers have already looked over her photographs and they are satisfied."

## GRIP OF CHIEF INSPECTOR DISAPPEARED

## HALIFAX WANDERERS AGAINST M. P. B.

**Want Nova Scotia Branch of A. A. U.—Rugby Football the Big Sport in Halifax.**

The Halifax Wanderers the oldest of the athletic organizations in the Maritimes, are desirous that Nova Scotia be represented directly in the A. A. U. of Canada instead of through the Maritime Provinces Branch. They also want a Nova Scotia Amateur Hockey Association. Incidentally rugby football was the big sport of the Wanderers during the year. The Halifax Chronicle has the following on the club's annual meeting:

### Thoroughly Discussed.

During the meeting the club placed itself on record as being favorable of the formation of a Nova Scotia Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada which would make provincial clubs totally independent of the rulings of the M. P. B. This matter was discussed from every angle and some time was taken before the club decided to lean favorably towards it.

### Hockey

The Wanderers also regarded with favor the formation of a Nova Scotia Amateur Hockey League next season, to replace the several leagues in the Province. It was suggested that two teams from Halifax, one from Truro, Kentville, New Glasgow, Windsor and other points complete the proposed circuit.

### Lost on Basketball.

Wanderers will not enter the Halifax Amateur Baseball League if that association attempts to reorganize. The club lost heavily in baseball last season when the local league turned into a regular fiasco.

Although there have been no propositions before the club regarding using the grounds for professional baseball this coming season the Wanderers would not be opposed to the pros. using their grounds. It was also stated that members of the club would have the privilege of using the grounds at any time and that A. T. Bradshaw, Athletic Director last season had been re-appointed for this year.

### Rugby the Big Sport.

During the past seasons rugby football proved to be the most successful sport. The club lost heavily in baseball and did not quite break even on hockey. Soccer, which is fast becoming a big club sport, had a fine season.

During the meeting the club passed a resolution advocating Daylight Saving. This resolution was unanimously passed by the members.

## N. H. L. DECISION TO BE GIVEN ON MAY 15 OR 16

**Detroit and Chicago Each Apply for Franchise—New York Club Alone Opposed to Entry.**

Montreal, May 2—Application for franchises to operate Chicago and Detroit clubs in the National Hockey League next season must await action by the league heads at a meeting called here for May 15 and 16.

This announcement was given out tonight at the conclusion of a two-day session of the hockey moguls at which it had been found impossible to reach an unanimous vote on appeal to increase the circuit to 10 clubs, with the entry of the two United States cities.

Frank L. Calder, the league president, declared that the delegates had stood seven to one for the inclusion of the Chicago and Detroit bodies. Tom J. Duggan, representative for the New York American Club, was the dissenter. Notice of a motion had been filed, however, seeking to have a clause in the league constitution relating to the "unanimous" vote amended so as to require only a two-thirds majority necessary to admit new clubs and Mr. Calder said this would be dealt with at the meeting two weeks hence.

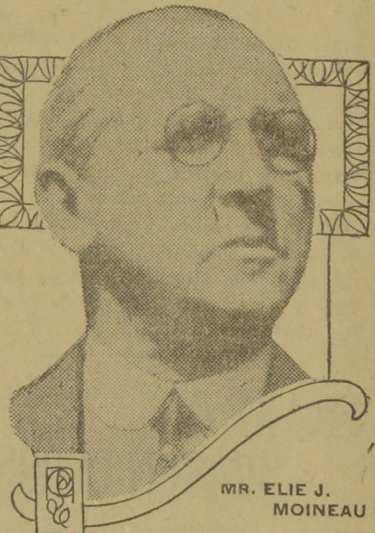
According to the opinion of a majority of the delegates to the meeting the "two-thirds" motion will leave the way clear for the admission of a Chicago club headed by "Tack" Hardwick, former Harvard football star, and a Detroit club under the control of the Bierer interests.

## WINNIPEG TOILERS WIN THE CANADIAN TITLE

**Won Two Games From Montreal A. A. A. for Basketball Championship—Losers Played Listlessly.**

Montreal, May 2—Speeding back to their prairie homes are the Winnipeg "Toilers," carrying with them the Canadian basketball championship and the Montreal Cup, emblematic of the Dominion laurels in the cage sport.

The Westerners invaded this city at the week-end for a two-game series with the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association for the Canadian title. To their five-point margin, scored in the first game at the Forum Friday night, the Winnipeg players added ten points more in the second contest Saturday night winning comfortably 30,20 and taking the round 57-42.

There was no doubt as to which was the smarter team after the second game had been under way for a time Saturday night. Playing confidently with the margin in their favor, the Toilers brought their advantage to ten points and with a safe lead to work, were never under pressure.

Despite the fact that they were trailing and that it was a life and death struggle for them, the M. A. A. quintette could not open up with a dash peppery enough to cut the Winnipeg's team's advantage.

The wheelers appeared listless and stale in their play. They were a disappointment to their followers.

## AUTO EVENT WON BY HARTZ

Speedway, N. J., May 2—Harry Hartz of Pnomia, California won the 300-mile international automobile grind here yesterday with Peter de Paolo, of Los Angeles, Calif., second and Bob McDonough of Burlingame, Calif., third. All three bettered the former world's track record of 2 hours, 19 minutes, 12.95 seconds set at Miami, Fla., February 22, 1926, by de Paolo.

Hartz flashed across the line in 2:14: 14: 18 making the rate approximately 135 miles per hour. De Paolo's time was 2:15: 12: 42 and McDonough's 2:15: 38: 59.

Hartz collected \$12,000 of the \$30,000 prize money.

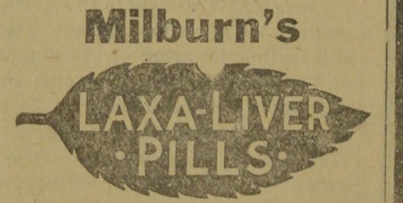
## HARPER WON ENGLISH RACE

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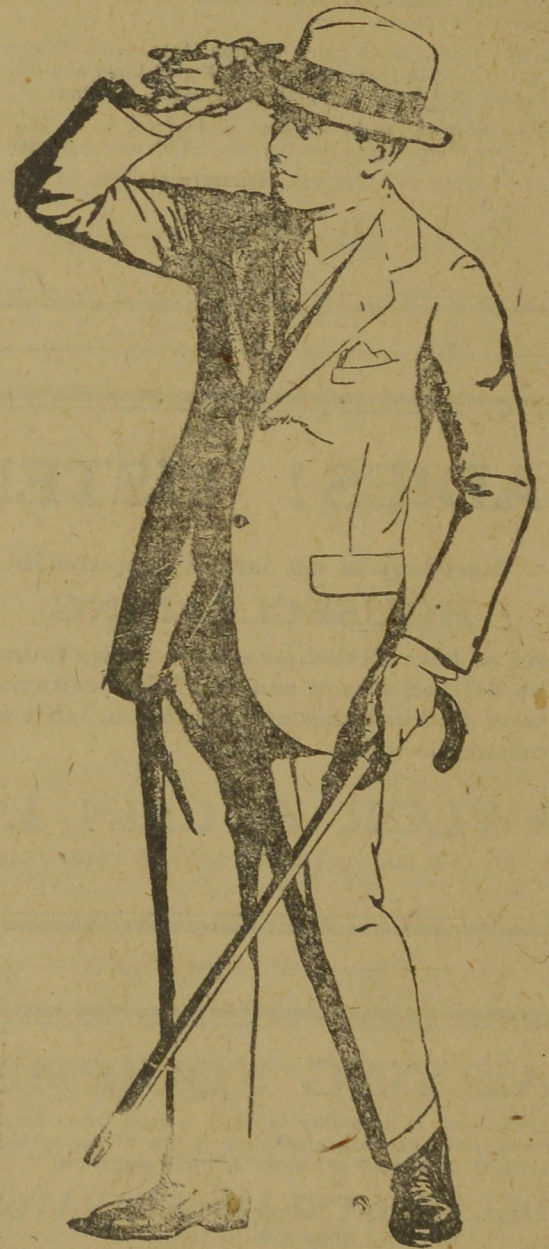
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
