## IMPORTANT LEGISLATION.

The Baxter administration is determined that New Brunswick shall wake up and get belted on to a water power which is going to bring about the greatest expansion and industrial prosperity the province has ever known in its history. The requisite power is to be developed at Grand Falls on in the St. John river and work is to be carried on under a business like arrangement entered into with the International Paper Company the largest manufacturers of newsprint in the world and is to be carried without a cent of cost to the province. The work of developing is to be begun next month and it is proposed to have it completed some time during the year 1928. Mammoth mills are to be erected, for the manufacture of newsprint, the raw material for which can be obtained in the province in abundance and there is an unlimited market for the finished product.

The necessary legislation, to bring about the development of Grand Falls is now before the House. It has been prepared with the greatest care and the interests of the province are amply safeguarded. There is no doubt that an excellent arrangement has been entered into with the International Paper Company and also with the Fraser Companies and the high reputation these mammoth concerns enjoy will assure a rigid carrying out of the agreement.

In connection with the development of the water power and the erection of paper mills there will be a capital expenditure in the province within the next few years of from \$25,000,000 to \$40,000,000 and all classes of the population will benefit from this expenditure.

Premier Baxter has for months devoted much of his time and talents to the problem of Grand Falls development; he has labored unceasingly to effect an arrangement which while saving the province from an additional burden of debt will at the same time protect the rights of the people and bring about the much sought for development of the greatest water power in Eastern Canada, and attendant industrial expansion. The Premier, the government, which he so ably leads, the members of the Legislature and the people of the province are to be congratulated on the wonderful success which has been achieved.

The decision of the Supreme Court in the case of Mr. R. B. Hanson, M. P., sustaining a charge of professional misconduct and suspending him for a period of twelve months will be gratifying to his enemies, but disappointing to his thousands of personal friends throughout the province. It is a cause for deep regret that in a matter of professional business for which there might have so easily been room for a misunderstanding and which did not benefit him to the extent of a single farthing, Mr. Hanson should be made to suffer. However, he will be able to derive satisfaction from the fact that the people of York-Sunbury among whom he has practiced his profession for a quarter of a century had previously pronounced upon his alleged misconduct their verdict was overwhelming in his favor.

Hon. Mr. Veniot spoke at some length in the Legislature yesterday in criticism of the Grand Falls power bills. He declared against private ownership and in favor of government ownership of water powers. The ex-Premier is an interesting speaker and when given a brief can always make out a good case for himself. Feeling however seems to prevail about the House this session that his heart is not in his work as opposition leader, but in the cold, cold ground along with his cause.

## THE SUPREME COURT FINDS IT NOT PROVEN

 ture of the case left Mr. Hanson open to a charge of perjury and trial in another court. In view of this it was considered that Mr. Hanson, as was any accused person, was entitled to the benefit of the doubt. The charge therefore was unproven.

**Professional Misconduct.**  
 There was no doubt, however, about the second portion of the charge that Mr. Hanson was guilty of professional misconduct.

The second offence was admitted by Mr. Hanson and he had attempted to excuse himself on a ground of over-work. The court did not think that was sufficient. The taking of advantage of the error of the registrar left him guilty of professional misconduct.

**The Penalty.**  
 The second charge was not as serious as the first involving no criminal matter. Striking off the roll or suspension were the usual punishments for guilt of unprofessional conduct. Had the first charge been found proven nothing would remain but to strike Mr. Hanson's name off the roll. However he had been given the benefit of the doubt in that. There therefore would be an order suspending Mr. Hanson from practice as barrister or attorney of this court for twelve months from date.

**Death of Well Known Citizen.**  
 John Henry Williamson died last night at his home in York street at the age of seventy-eight years after an illness of two days. The deceased was on retiring allowance from the C. P. R. with which he had served for about forty years as station-master at Fredericton. Surviving in his daughter Miss Elizabeth Williamson of this city. The deceased in earlier life was prominent in musical circles having led several bands in this city. It was the desire of a local band to secure a leader which made him locate in Fredericton. The funeral will take place Saturday afternoon at 2.30 with service in the Parish Church by Rev. A. F. Bate. Interment will be made at Forest Hill Cemetery.
