The necessary legislation, to bring about the development of Grand Falls is now before the House. It has been prepared with the great est care and the interests of the province are amply safeguarded There is no doubt that an excellen arrangement has been entered into with th International Paper Com pany and also with the Fraser Companies and the high reputation these mammoth concerns enjoy will assure a rigid carrying out o

In connection with the develop ment of the water power and the erection of paper mills there will be a capital expenditure in the prov ince within the next few years o from \$25,000,000 to \$40,000,000 and all classes of the population will benefit from this expenditure.

Premier Baxter has for month devoted much of his time and tal ents to the problem of Grand Falls ceasingly to effect an arrangement which while saving the province will at the same time protect the rights of the people and bring about the much sought for development of the greatest water power in East ern Canada, and attendant industrial expansion. The Premier, the govern ment, which he so ably leads, the members of the Legislature and the people of the province are to be congratulated on the wonderful success which has been achieved.

The decision of the Supreme Court in the case of Mr. R. B. Hanson, M.
