THE SITUATION AT OTTAWA.

With a record-breaking attendance of members, Hon. Arthur Meighen's motion of non-confidence in the Mackenzie King government was defeated in Parliament at an early hour this morning by three votes. No less than 120 members, including 116 Conservatives and five Progressives lined up for the amendment, while Liberals, Progressives and Independents to the number of 123 voted against it. There was only one absentee, Mr. Chaplin of Lincoln, Ont., who is said to be on a European trip. The speaker of course did not record his vote.

As was to be expected the result of the division was followed by the most exciting demonstrations that Parliament has ever witnessed, members of the two old parties cheering and displaying other manifestations of approval.

Of the five Progressives who voted with the opposition three were from the province of Saskatchewan. All three were opposed by straight Liberal candidates in the late election and were inclined to show resentment. Miss Agnes MacPhail, the only woman member of Parliament, recorded her vote against the amendment.

The result of the vote gives the government a mandate to carry on and will enable it to make appointments. There are two vacant senatorships and it is to be presumed that little time will be lost in filling them. There are rumors that another vacancy may soon be created in New Brunswick, and if so it will go down to the opposition.

The debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne will be commenced on Monday but it is not believed that it will consume a great deal of time. With the address out of the way, Parliament will likely adjourn for a month to allow Premier King to reconstruct his ministry.

Relief will be felt all over the country that the tense situation which has existed at Ottawa for the past week has at last been broken and the country has escaped for the time being the turmoil of another general election.
