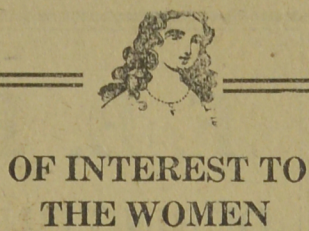

MAKING WORK EASIER AROUND THE HOUSE.

A small amount of camphor packed away with sterling silver will help keep it from tarnishing.

Ever tried a sandwich of salmon and cream cheese? It is quite delicious and the fish spread on the cheese makes the slices stay together well.

Always dip a knife into boiling hot water before using it to cut newly baked bread.

In France liver is usually prepared in this way: Cut slashes in it and thread with thin strips of fat bacon. Season it quite highly and bake for one hour.

Before cutting up candied peel place it in a warm oven for a while.

Hot chocolate or cocoa will taste much better if a dash of cinnamon or vanilla flavoring is used.

Cooking green vegetables uncovered will retain their bright color.

Young potatoes can be quickly and easily divested of their loose coats by rubbing them with tinsel cloth. Boiled beets can be treated in the same way.

Cereal which has stuck firmly onto the bottom of saucepans can be removed with half a split clothespin, which will not scratch the pan. This semi-clothespin, if kept near the sink, will often come in handy.

Whole cereals are better and taste better than the refined ones.

Potato Flour Sponge Cake.

Four eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1-2 cup potato flour, 1-4 teaspoonful salt, 1 tea spoonful baking powder, 1 tea spoonful vanilla.

Beat the yolks of the eggs till light, add the sugar gradually and continue the beating until very creamy. Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt and stir into the first mixture. Fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites and the vanilla. Bake in a sheet pan in a slow oven for about 30 minutes.

INDUSTRIAL LEADERS OFFER SCHOLARSHIPS FOR SPECIAL WORK

Chicago, Jan. 14—Industry has discovered more than baggy trousers and moaning saxophones on the college campus and, satisfied with the findings, is annually contributing thousands of dollars to Middle Western colleges and universities for specialized work in their research laboratories.

The steel manufacturer, the mining engineer, the meat packer and the chewing gum manufacturer are appropriating funds for the expenses of students wanting to do specialized work and for the maintenance of special departments, equipment and instructors. Commercial and professional organizations are joining a widening variety of industries in providing for study in their own or general fields.

In most cases, the scholarships and fellowships are given to students who will make special study in the field in which the donor is directly interested. An asphalt company contributes to study of asphalt materials, a chemical manufacturer offers financial aid for study in commercial chemistry, and the mining concern lends a helping hand to the student interested in ceramics. One big producer of railroad equipment maintains 20 scholarships for scientific training in agriculture and animal husbandry. The fellowships and scholarships vary in value from \$800 to \$150.

Research Work.

At least \$21,762 is providing for scholarships and fellowships at the University of Wisconsin. A well-known poster advertising company is contributing the largest individual sum, \$6,000, which maintains two fellowships open to graduate students only. More than \$25,000 is available to students at the University of Minnesota.

nesota, in research scholarships. Nearly every department of the university has received one or more substantial gifts.

A number of scholarships in social science and political economy are open to students at the University of Chicago. For the study of meat packing and handling processes, an annual gift of \$2,500, for three years, has been made. Approximately 35 scholarships, for study in a wide variety of subjects, are maintained at the University of Illinois. The income from a fund of \$10,000 is available to a fellow in chemistry or chemical engineering.

Fire Insurance.

Of unusual interest among the Northwestern University scholarships are a number of young men interested in fire insurance and allied lines of business. Provided by certain of the large fire insurance companies, they cover full tuition for the university's two-year course in fire insurance. Merchandising and advertising are concerned in several scholarships open to both men and women.

Scholarships at Ohio State University average \$750. Among them is a scholarship of \$150 a year contributed by a Philadelphia textile company and to go only to a disabled soldier.

Five of the 20 agricultural scholarships are allotted to agricultural colleges where the students do the most efficient work in the five lines of stock judging; a sixth goes to the college scoring highest in the five combined classes and the other 14 are distributed on the basis of total cash prizes won by the institutions on entries in the open live stock classes. They are available to 13 Middle West institutions.

LONDON IS CALLED THE MOST POLITE CITY IN THE WORLD

London, Jan. 14—By the universal consent of foreigners London is the politest city in the world, according to the Evening News.

So many people in this country spend their time depreciating themselves and their land, some out of a kind of perverted modesty, others because they think it smart, and others again because they know no better, that it is a relief to hear disinterested observers say something nice about us, comments John Blunt in the Daily Mail.

And I must frankly say that, in this case at any rate, I think they are quite right. I have been in a great many of the world's big cities, but I have never been in one in which the level of politeness and good humor was as high as it is in London.

Even Temper.

The average London crowd is the best-tempered crowd in the whole universe, and the average Londoner is only too pleased to help a stranger or to give him friendly instruction.

You can scarcely meet a man in a London street who is not prepared to render you such a little courtesies as lie within his power. He will direct you on your road, he will give you information about buildings, he will hand you a match—and all with such an air of good nature and comradeship that these small services seem to be a pleasure.

The English are said to be 'ac-turn and stand-offish,' but, though they are certainly not as volubly excitable as the Latin races, they are really very friendly when they are approached. At least, nobody who knows London could deny that this is true of Londoners.

In their very boo is the knowledge that they are citizens of the greatest of all cities. They may not be consciously proud of this fact—that is not the average Englishman's way—but it gives them all the same

a kind of subconscious feeling of calm superiority and tolerance. They don't possess the "inferiority complex" which makes people touchy.

Never Jealous.

The Londoner is intensely interested in his city and he thinks it only right that others should be interested in it too. He likes to see strangers within his gates; he is not jealous of them; he is only glad that they have the good fortune to be there.

His kindness and his politeness are indeed partly the result of his enviable feeling that nobody is quite so lucky in his place of residence as he.

But, of course, this is not the whole story. The courtesy of Londoners is an old tradition and their good humor has become proverbial. They were born and bred that way and such things have become an instinct. One can not explain it beyond a certain point; one can merely be glad that it is so.
