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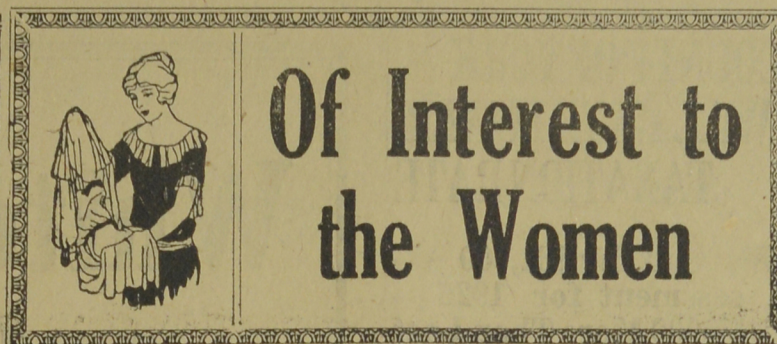

LEADING COLORS ARE TO BE HALF TONES.

London—Leading British color experts have chosen 10 shades which will be fashionable in women's dress this spring. The main tendency of the new fashion spectrum is a reaction from full colors to half tones of pastel shades with a very definite though unobtrusive brightness.

"Bright mauves," says one expert "will give way to a soft shade which has been named Foxglove. The fashionable blue will be airforce this being the color of the royal air force uniforms. Full browns, after an extraordinary vogue, will hardly be seen at all. Their place will be taken by more delicate shades, notably the tawny oak-apple and a paler sand effect, Sahara."

"The two principal greens will be yellow-green, named Chartreuse, after the famous liqueur, and palm recalling the trees on the Riviera. Cloud, the new gray is the color of clouds on a fine spring day. It will be worn during the later stages of court mourning for Dowager Queen Alexandra, but there is every indication that it also will become a general fashion."

BANANA SOUFFLE.

- 1 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1-4 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon butter or margarine
- 1-2 cup milk
- 2 tablespoons melted shortening
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 3 bananas

Sift the flour, salt, baking powder and sugar together; add the milk and well-beaten egg shortening; mix well. Brush pan with melted butter, pour in the mixture. Skin and scrape the bananas and cut into four pieces and press into the dough. Sprinkle with the sugar and bake twenty minutes in moderate oven. Serve warm.

BANANA TOAST.

- 8 thin slices of toasted bread
- 3 ripe bananas
- 1-2 glass red jelly
- 3 tablespoons powdered sugar
- 1-4 teaspoon salt

Skin and scrape the bananas, mash through coarse strainer, add sugar and salt; spread the toast with jelly, then cover with the banana mixture; garnish with a very small piece of red jelly; serve at once. A tablespoon of whipped cream over the banana mixture will make a pleasant change.

On wings of dream you wait us where

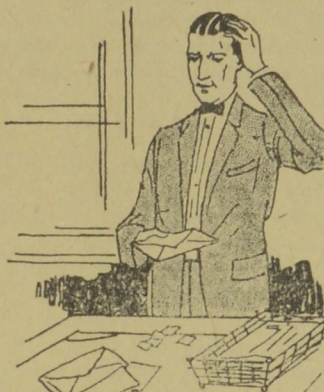
 The hills uplift like harmonies

LUMBERING OPERATIONS IN MAINE

Bangor, Me., Feb. 8.—Tabulations made here of the lumbering operations in Maine this winter show the total pulpwood cut as about 600,000 cords, equal to about 3,000,000 feet, board measure, or about 80 per cent. of the lumber cut of the state. The coming summer or peeled wood cut is expected to be about the same amount or a little more. The cut of the Great Northern Paper Company this winter is estimated 260,000 cords. The company now has on hand about 300,000 and other mills about 400,000 cords more.

Pulpwood cutters are paid \$2 a day and board or \$2.25 a cord on the stump, of \$2.50 a cord yarded, with board at 75 cents a day. The labor is largely alien, of all nationalities, with Canadians in large proportion on operations near the border.

The figures show, some forestry experts believe, that the consumption of lumber for paper is in excess of the replacement growth in Maine. No new mills are contemplated in Maine although Maine men are interested in new Canadian pulp and paper enterprises. Lumbering conditions in Maine are excellent this winter, but the expense of operations is said to be increased at least 5 per cent. in advanced cost of supplies over last year.

SUBSTITUTE FOR WORD WAITER IS WANTED

New York, Feb. 10.—The men and women who serve food to patrons in restaurants and dining rooms of New York dropped and smashed a plate apiece at a given signal today when Joseph Burger, president of the United Restaurant Owners' Association, started his campaign to find substitute terms for waiter and waitress.

Mr. Burger is the person who inaugurated the favorite dish voting contest last year, which enabled members of the association to discover that corned beef and cabbage was the favorite of the New Yorkers.

Now he asks that the public cooperate with him in an effort to find terms other than waiter and waitress to designate those whose profession is bringing food from kitchen to consumer. These terms are offensive both to the patron and the person who serves the food, he says, in his printed announcement. The designations imply that the food server is a menial and is engaged in demeaned work, Burger asserts.

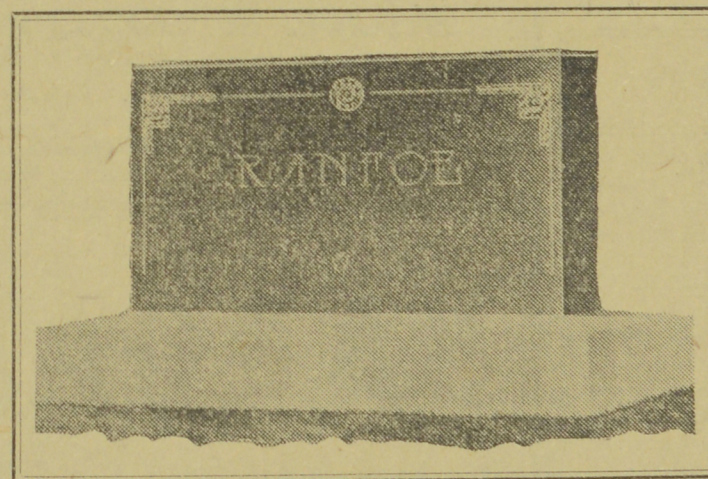
The public recognizes this and is searching vaguely for a substitute, often seeks to spare indignity to the crockery bearers by addressing them as "George," "Genevieve" or "Say," Burger believes. A general canvass of the industry is to be initiated through the Restaurant Man, official organ of the association, and cash prizes will be offered for new titles, the announcement states.
