Dropped From Rafters by Cripple in Montreal — Canadian Game Tuesday — Dandurand Makes Statement.

Tuesday's hockey match in the N. H. L. at Montreal caused some uproar. Managing Director Leo Dandurand, while ill at home gave out the following statement.

"I have fined Coutu \$100 and this is no make-believe fine either. It will surely come out of his salary. I also arranged immediately for proper protection of the referees after the match was over.

"I was advised by several prominent supporters of the club to take my team off the ice, but paid no attention to them. Up to the time of the Coutu incident the crowd had behaved itself well and the falling of the bottle was not as serious an affair as it looked. We found out who dropped it, and though I exceedingly regret that it should have happened, particularly, since I was sure that Judge Monet's warning and those of the newspapers would meet with proper response, it was again one of these almost unavoidable things that happens at times of great excitement.

"As soon as the bottle dropped I sent Captain Landriault in search of the dropper and he was found to be a small unfortunate half-wit, a ripple, who had managed to get up on the rafters, and protested, almost tearfully that he had not meant to hurt anyone. He has been a sort of a hanger-on of the Arena for years, and always was a great admirer of Sprague Cleghorn whose hand he insisted upon shaking every time Cleghorn appeared at the rink. "We gave him a severe lecture and will see that he will get no opportunity to try such tricks again, but he was so miserable about it that we did not have the heart to prosecute him. With details of the alleged assault by Referee Rodden, I am unfamiliar."

EXPERTS SAY
LENGLEN WILL
DEFEAT HELEN

American Girl is Not Showing any Remarkable Form — French Tennis Player in Height of Form.

Cannes, France, Jan. 20—Tennis experts of the Riviera, after watching Helen Wills for the first match here are convinced that the American champion will be no match for Suzanne Lenglen and many believe she will be eliminated from the present tournament by one of several lesser lights among the women players.

Miss Wills easily defeated Miss E. N. Green, a novice 6-0, 6-0 in the second round of the Metropole Club tourney, but she won only one love game, and was carried to deuce. The American champion appeared nervous at the start of the match, although Miss Green is a tennis player of the "kindergarten" variety. The latter won 10 points from Miss Wills in the first set and eight in the second.

SEES AMERICA
GALLOPING
TO HELL

New York, Jan. 21—Noah Webster Cooper, chairman of the Sabbath crusade committee of the Tennessee synod of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, believes that the "American people will gallop to hell if they do not stop Sabbath breaking."

Starting from his home at Nashville, where he is a lawyer and Sunday school teacher, he rounded out a tour of the country yesterday by foregathering here with Dr. H. L. Bowlby of the Lord's Day Alliance and Duncan J. McMillan of the New York Sabbath committee.

He said he expects to go to Washington tomorrow and ask President Coolidge's co-operation in getting legislation to stop Sunday trains and newspapers.

"Every one of our Sunday newspapers is Satan's ambassador and a decoy to ruin America," he told his northern associates. "Every one of our 2500 Sunday trains is hurrying America toward the hell of God's wrath."

Bad as Bootleggers
Cooper considers any Sunday business for profit as on par with bootlegging for "churchmen who condone Sabbath breaking are as wicked in God's sight as bootleggers, robbers, bank breakers, adulterers, drunkards, and liars who they condemn. Anybody who buys a Sunday paper is helping the devil to ruin America. God's word is my authority."

He declared that he had sought co-operation of railroad presidents by telegraphing them, but got only one favorable letter in reply from the President of the Erie railroad, who said he would like to abolish all Sunday trains because they lost money.

He challenged any editor in America to show an error in his statement that "all the virtues, freedom, and wealth of New York and America will

(New York Sun.)

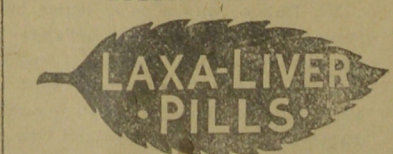
