HAVE TAKEN MOTION PICTURES OF SAINT JOHN RIVER SCENERY; WERE BUSY AT GRAND FALLS

St. John, Aug. 12—Through the co-operation of the Federal and Provincial Governments and several Saint John residents, New Brunswick's scenic beauties are to be made known to many thousands of people who have never been within the borders of the province. Views of the province particularly of sections of the valleys of the Saint John and Restigouche, including Grand Falls, are to be screened in many parts of the United States, Great Britain and other countries during the coming fall and winter.

F. C. Badgley, film editor of the Canadian Government Motion Picture Bureau at Ottawa and formerly captain in Col. Boyd Anderson's Moncton battery during the Great War, and his camera operator, S. H. Hollebhone, were in Saint John last night after a three weeks' picture taking tour of the province.

Mr. Badgley said that the great beauty of the Saint John valley was a surprise to him and he also spoke in high terms of the Restigouche country and other sections of the province. On the Restigouche pictures were taken of salmon angling, other fishing scenes and panorama.

In Saint John Valley.

During the past weeks Messrs. Badgley and Hollebhone have been making pictures of scenery along the Saint John River from this city to Fredericton, covering the ground by automobiles. All the places of interest were visited. The Ottawa men were accompanied by J. Charlton Berrie, secretary of the New Brunswick Automobile Association, in whom they found a valuable guide and affable companion.

Later Mr. Badgley and Mr. Hollebhone followed the valley above Fredericton, the Provincial Government providing a car. In all several thousand feet of film were used and it is thought the pictures will be excellent, as conditions were generally favorable. Mr. Badgley has sufficient material to produce two subjects dealing wholly with the Saint John valley.

"I have been all over Canada taking pictures," said Mr. Badgley last evening, "and I have never seen a section of greater scenic beauty than the Saint John River valley. The splendid highways which skirt the valley afford a wonderful opportunity for tourists and other visitors in their drives. Unlike other valleys, the Saint John has highways unobstructed, so that vision is clear every foot of the way. We found no bad roads and no dangerous places."

All Over World.

"The films will be exhibited all over the world. The basic idea is not only to make New Brunswick and its great attractions better known to other sections of Canada, but to the world at large. The views will be shown in the theatres of the United States and elsewhere and will be exhibited before sportsman's clubs, Rotarians and other organizations in this country, the United States and other lands. They should be of inestimable benefit as mediums of bringing to this province many more thousands of tourists and sportsmen. We already have tangible proof of the tremendous value of films."

Messrs. Badgley and Hollebhone filmed the hydro development section of Grand Falls on Tuesday, and these will also be used in the interest of further advertising New Brunswick.

The two will leave today for Nova Scotia to make pictures of scenes in the Annapolis valley and in the Margaree district of Cape Breton. Later they hope to return to New Brunswick and take pictures of Grand Manan, Campobello and elsewhere, including the Tobique game region.

Mr. Badgley is no stranger to New Brunswick. Last year he made pictures of the cities of Saint John and Fredericton.

During the war he enlisted in his native city of Ottawa and while overseas was promoted for gallantry to be captain of the battery, of which Col. Anderson, of Moncton, was in command. Mr. Badgley holds the military cross.

MANY PAY HOMAGE TO LATE HON. G. H. BOVIN

Granby, Que., Aug. 11—Through the sunlit-streets through which he had roamed as a child, and from the home—a fine old-fashioned cottage set back from the street—in which he had been born, the body of Hon. George H. Boivin, was borne this morning to the church and from there he was laid in the cemetery of his ancestors.

The town of some 7,000 inhabitants had but one thought this morning, and that was he funeral of an old friend gone long before his time, and the closed shops and offices, factories and mills. His neighbors honored him at death in a manner more striking than the most stately ceremonies could have done.

Crowds Await Cortège.

The body was at the family home, opposite City Hall square, and waited for the commencement of the procession. It was much the same only a few months ago last autumn, when friends gathered from various parts of the province at the same place to greet the member for Shefford, then called into the McKenzie King government, and when during the evening there was a public demonstration in the square.

His Excellency the Governor-General, Baron, Byng of Vimy, was represented by Col. Henry Chasse, M. C., A. A. and Q. M. G. Military District No. 4.

Message From Meighen.

The Prime Minister of Canada was represented by L. J. Gauthier, in addition to the personal telegram of sympathy sent; the leader of the opposition, by William H. Measures, private secretary of the Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, and the province of Quebec was represented by Hon. Jacob Nicol, provincial treasurer.

THE CUSTOMS PROBE.

Ottawa, Aug. 11—It is expected that investigation into the administration of the Department of Customs will be resumed at Halifax on Wednesday, Aug. 25.

It was thought that the investigation would be resumed at an earlier date, but this is now unlikely.

THE MARITIME COMMISSION AT HALIFAX

Halifax, August, 11—The Duncan Royal Commission arrived in Halifax tonight from Sydney and will resume its local sittings tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock in the Province Building.

Since leaving Halifax at the end of July, the commission has set in Saint John, in Charlottetown and in Sydney.

The second hearing here will in all probability conclude this week, after which the commissioners will visit other points in the province.

Asked tonight concerning the witnesses who will testify tomorrow and Friday, F. MacLure Sclanders, secretary of the commission, mentioned F. P. Johns, president of the Canada Cement Company, and a representative yet to be named of the Malagash Salt Company. In addition the League for the Economic Independence of Nova Scotia had asked to be heard, and Mr. Sclanders said that this body would be given a hearing as soon as it submitted, a precise of the testimony it had to offer.

ZURICH DIGGINGS SHOW HOMES OF STONE AGE

London, Aug. 12—Europe's first houses, built 7,000 years ago in the Stone Age, have been unearthed near Lake Zurich, Switzerland. These homes were originally on tree-trunk piles in the lake, with floors just above the water line of large slabs of stone bearing hieroglyphics. A combination of clay and wood was used in the construction of these huts. Stone axes, spears and domestic utensils found nearby will join the prehistoric collection in the Berne Museum.

grilse have been led, the young salmon then being scooped out. On the Saint John there has been a case of chicken wire being used to sheer salmon into nets.

GAGETOWN GIRL MISSING SINCE TUESDAY LAST

Posse Headed by Sheriff Machum Making a Diligent Search.

Gagetown, N. B., Aug. 11—Through-out a night and a day search for Miss Eva Coy, of Upper Gagetown, has been continued by large parties of men, but no trace has been found of the young woman, who was last seen about 5 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon walking across the field which slopes up to the main highway, the River Road, from her home at Upper Gagetown.

The missing girl is a daughter of Mrs. Joseph Coy, of Upper Gagetown, and although she had been in poor health recently, her disappearance is a baffling mystery and has caused very grave anxiety and concern throughout the district where she is well known and greatly liked. She is about 25 years of age, of medium height and of a very attractive personality. She has dark eyes and wavy dark hair which she wears long. When she left her home she was wearing a middie blouse and sports clothes with a long light tan coat but no hat.

On the afternoon of her disappearance she had spoken of going bathing, but had spent the time reading until about 5 o'clock, when she put on her coat and went out before having tea. She did not say where she was going. Since then she has not been seen.

When she did not return in the evening a search party was organized and during the night systematic search was made through the woods towards which she had been seen walking.

Sheriff and Posse Out.

This morning Sheriff Machum and a party of men from Gagetown went to the assistance of the searchers of Upper Gagetown and extended the area covered. Careful search was continued throughout the day, but at nightfall no trace of the missing girl had been found. Men had grappled in the river, the woods and shore had been searched in every direction, but no clue was found to indicate what had become of Miss Coy.

News Broadcasted.

In case that she had been picked up by some passing automobile party en route to Fredericton or Saint John, word was sent forward to the police in those cities. It is not thought that she was a victim of a drowning accident as she was an expert swimmer and last summer she swam across the Saint John River from the shore at her home to the Canning intervals on the other side.

Search to Continue.

The searchers have thought of getting dogs to follow her trail, but trained dogs are not easily found and as yet none have been located. The search will be continued tomorrow.

The sympathy of the community has gone out to the members of the family in their anxiety. The immediate relatives are her mother, Mrs. Coy, two brothers at home and two sisters in the United States.

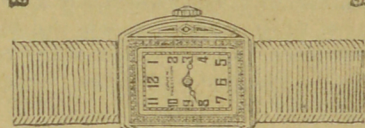
