# PARTY SPEARING SALMON CHASED BY GUARDIAN

French Village Indians  
at Chapel Bar—Took  
Fright and Escaped  
From Official—Spearing  
Illegal.

Roland Holyoke, fishery guardian on the Saint John River above Fredericton recently caught a party of French Village Indians spearing salmon at night by the light of flambeaux. He made an attempt to arrest members of the party but his approach was observed and the Indians made good their escape. The spearing was being done at Chapel Bar.

## Speared Salmon Found.

The flambeaux were made of rolled birch bark in the fashion which has been followed from prehistoric times. This spearing is illegal and is punishable by heavy fines. Recently boys swimming at the West End Beach in this city brought ashore a twenty-two pound salmon with a spear-hole in it. Charred rolls of birch-bark also were found floating. The worst feature of spearing is that at least half of the fish struck get away and die in the water or live in a crippled condition.

## Forbidden Long Ago.

Spearing of salmon in the early days of the Province was practiced on many streams and was very destructive of the fish. After the Tobique Salmon Club took control of the Tobique waters it was stopped. The Federal fishery regulations also took cognizance of the practice and forbade it. It still is carried on from time to time by both Indians and whites and spears frequently are seized. One type has more than one barbed point. Another has a single point with wooden prongs which open when a fish is struck and close on its sides.

## Wire Fencing Used.

There also are reports of the use of wire fencing for illegal fishing. In tidal waters of the Miramichi it has been used to close creeks into which (Continued on Page Five.)

# AMERICAN REGULATION CANCELLED

Tourists No Longer Can  
Take Back Goods to  
Value of \$100—All  
Must Be Declared.

Contrary to quite widespread belief there is now no regulation in effect which permits American tourists who have spent some time in Canada taking back into their own country goods purchased in Canada to the value of \$100 duty free. Such a regulation was in effect for a couple of years but was cancelled when it became observed that American residents along the border were using it to import goods in large quantities which they could buy in Canada at prices lower than those prevailing in the United States. This business assumed such proportions that American business in the border districts suffered considerably and complained.

The intention of the regulation in the first instance was to benefit bona fide tourists who might enter Canada by motor or otherwise and remain for some time. The chief benefit however was reaped by Americans who were not tourists at all but made trips daily or oftener for the purpose of evading the customs tariff of their own country.

## Statement of Vice-Consul

Vice-Consul Johnston of the American Vice-consulate here states that Americans returning to their own country after a sojourn in Canada must declare what they have purchased. It will be within the judgment of the U. S. customs officials to decide what goods are dutiable and what not. Souvenir and similar articles are not dutiable but wearing apparel even if worn may be.

Signs displayed in various places stating that American tourists can take back good duty free to the value of \$100 are misleading.
