DARTMOUTH OUTCLASSED BY TORONTO UNIV.

International College Hockey Game Showed Superiority of Canadian Team—Many Casualties in Match.

New York, Feb. 27—Toronto defeated Dartmouth 6 to 1 in a whirlwind hockey contest that brought out more than 10,000 graduates and hockey fans.

The Canadian team was wildly applauded when it came on the ice and the Green contingent which had a strong cheering section in the stands, came in for its honors a moment later.

Toronto had Dartmouth on the run throughout the game, but in the first period Dartmouth made a brave showing, and the team several times in the later periods was unfortunate in its inability to take advantage of favorable scoring chances.

Hardy was knocked out at the start of the third period when he was tripped by Porter, who went off the ice for a two-minute penalty. The battle became furious then, with penalties, mostly on the Toronto end, coming freely. Trotter made Toronto's next score, and Kirkpatrick added another Canadian tally soon afterward.

Dartmouth's one score came when Capt. Manser, on a pass from Lane shot the rubber past Sullivan.

First Period Scoreless.
Dartmouth went on the rink hailed as "Eastern intercollegiate champions" because the tickets, printed before the Harvard defeat of Saturday night, when the Crimson scored a 3 to 2 victory, pronounced this contest as an international collegiate championship match. Still smarting from their shutout defeat by Toronto of the early season the Harvard boys put up a desperate struggle from the start.

Just before the free-off, the band played "God Save the King" and the "Star Spangled Banner."

FREDERICTON HIGH FINISHED SERIES WITH WIN

Saint John, March 1—Frederickton High School on Saturday defeated St. Vincent's High School 33 to 23 in the final scheduled match of the Frederickton school in the Interscholastic Series. Saint John High defeated Rothesay Collegiate also in the same series. Saint John High has won six games and lost none and has still to play Rothesay and St. Vincent's in return games. There is practically no chance of Saint John not winning the league. Frederickton won six games and lost two in the series.

Ottawa and Montreal Maintained Their Places In Race in the N. H. L.

Boston Forced Ottawa to Win on Home Ice—
Montreal Beat St. Pats at Toronto—
Canadiens Dropped Another to New York.

Ottawa, Feb. 28—in one of the hardest fought games of the local N. H. L. schedule this season, Ottawa Senators came from behind last night to defeat the Boston Bruins 3 to 2. The Ottawa triumph marking the first reverse for the Bruins in their past 11 games, came only after the home team had waged a stubborn uphill battle against the climbing Bruins, the winning goal coming four minutes from the close of the contest.

Canadiens Slump.
Montreal, Feb. 28—Canadiens have hit the lowest depths in the National Hockey League and for the first time in several seasons are in danger of ending the 1925-26 race in the bottom rung of the ladder.

After playing against ill-fortune almost throughout the winter's campaign, the league champions of the last two years reached the climax in their warfare with Dame Fortune when they were beaten, 1 to 0, by New York Saturday night. The loss sent the Canucks to the cellar position and enabled New York to move up into a tie for fifth place with the Toronto St. Patrick's.

It was a heart-breaking loss for the local team. They had outplayed New York at all stages up to the first five minutes of the final session. The Americans had been holding doggedly on the defence and Forbes was turning aside drive after drive with the most miraculous saves.

Montreal Won in Toronto.
Toronto, Feb. 28—Montreal Maroons made their final appearance of the National Hockey League schedule at Arena Gardens Saturday eve-

ning when they defeated St. Patrick's by 4 goals to 3.

Tilts between players and arguments with officials kept the crowd in a frenzy and the excitement reached its height when Bobby Hewison one of the referees threw his bell on the ice and went to his dressing room, because the St. Pat's players refused to obey his ruling regarding a disputed goal.

Corbeau, who had been keeping the Maroon left wing flash under keen surveillance and whenever Siebert attempted to get in on Roach, he was generally met with a terrific body-check from the St. Pat's defenceman. He apparently took exception to this obstruction, for the final session had barely commenced when he rushed down the left wing and, as Corbeau stepped out to meet him, Siebert struck the Irish player with his stick, causing a gash that required five stitches to close. Corbeau retaliated by dropping his stick to the ice and striking Siebert several times. Both combatants were given match fouls which are accompanied by \$50 fines.

Not many minutes had elapsed before another scene was staged over a goal alleged to have been scored by Shay. The Irish again protested vehemently when Referee Billie Bell disallowed the counter. St. Patrick's protested the decision so strenuously that Bobby Hewison, officiating with Billie Bell, threw his bell on the ice and refused to continue until the locals were ready to play hockey. The Irish shortly afterwards formed up and the game continued.

UMPIRES BRING SUIT FOR BEING TERMED ROBBERS

Jury Failed to Reach a Verdict in \$5,000 Action Against an Oklahoma Newspaper—Unusual Case.

Oklahoma City, Feb. 27—Decision as to whether umpires Edwin P. Gaffney and Gerald Hayes of the Western League are entitled to damages against the Oklahoma City Daily Oklahoman for referring to them as "Robbers" in connection with their decisions in baseball games rests with a District Court jury, which after several hours deliberation, failed to reach a verdict.

Judge Lucius Babcock instructed the jurors that the references were libelous on their face, but cautioned them to remember that such terms as "robber" and "Hi-Jacker" are common parlance of the baseball diamond, whereas they are not in other places. The stories in which Gaffney and Hayes sued were published on the sports pages of the Oklahoman.

Gaffney and Hayes are seeking \$5,000 damages each.

PUT K. O. ON PRESIDENT'S SON

Amherst, Feb. 29—An offer of \$5,000 for three boxing bouts at the Pioneer Athletic Club in New York city was received by Matty Silverman of Brooklyn, N. Y. who last Tuesday defeated John Coolidge, son of President Coolidge in a three round battle in the 135-pound class at the Amherst College tourney where both men are sophomores.

The offer was made late this afternoon by wire. No dates were set. Silverman tonight indicated that he would probably decline the offer.

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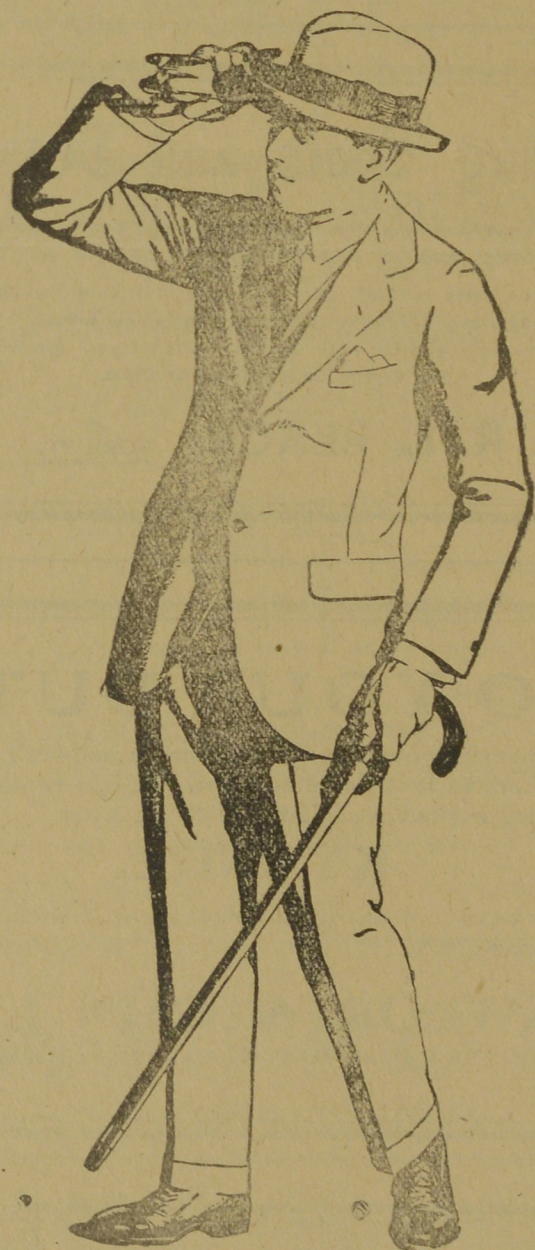
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
