

PAYMENT OF CITY TAXES BEST ON RECORD SO FAR

No Indication That Business Condition is Depressed—Discount Period Expires Thursday.

The period for obtaining the discount of five per cent. on City of Fredericton taxes will expire on Thursday next, the 22nd. The usual opportunities for eleven-hour payments will be made at the office of the City Treasurer which will remain open Thursday night.

C. F. Chestnut, City Treasurer, and his staff have been busy during the present month receiving payments from the citizens who take time by the forelock. The big rush will come next week.

Better Payment Than Ever.

The City Treasurer states that payments of taxes to date have been the best on record for the period. Since July 1st, the money paid in to his office in taxes has been about double the amount paid in the similar period of July 1925.

No Indication of Hard Times.

The ready payment of taxes is no indication of hard times. The pessimism which has existed commercially for some time does not seem to have a basis in the financial condition of the city in general. More citizens are taking advantage of the discount than before.

The opinion is expressed by those in position to judge, that business conditions are not as bad as they are painted and that money is being spent but possibly is going into channels which it did not follow a year or two ago.

Lost His Net.
A Kingsclear man while drifting for salmon near Macnaquac Island a few nights ago had the misfortune to get his net caught on some sharp stakes which were stuck firmly into the bed of the river but did not show above the surface. In his haste to get away before a guardian could put in an appearance the fisherman tore the net into three pieces. It is now up to him to either stop illegal fishing or procure another net.

Baby Moose Died.
A baby moose, which has been such an attraction at the tourist camp of Harrison, Driscoll, Blagdon, King's County, is dead, and its loss is being mourned by the children of the community. The young moose, which was found some weeks ago, developed a cold and died from its effects. Mr. Driscoll found five or six young moose dead in the woods this year, and he attributed it to the hard winter which had been experienced by the mother moose and were therefore not in fit condition to rear the young.

New Fishery Guardian.
The matter of having a special fishery guardian appointed for the Hart's Island salmon pool was taken up this week by local anglers with Mr. R. B. Hanson, K. C., M. P. Mr. Hanson lost no time in getting in touch with the Department at Ottawa and also with Inspector Harrison, with the result that Mr. Rolland H. Wheeler of Kingsclear has been appointed to the position. He was sworn in today, and will go on duty at once. Mr. Wheeler resides near the salmon pool, as a keen fly fisherman besides an expert canoe man and his appointment will give general satisfaction.

WOOL GRADING TO BE AGAIN AT LENNOXVILLE

Quality of Cooperatively Collected Product is High—Shipment to be Made in Few Days.

The shipment of the wool collected in New Brunswick through the New Brunswick Sheep Breeders' Association will begin in about ten days' time. The wool is now in Fredericton and will be shipped to Lennoxville, Que., where it will be graded. The New Brunswick wool formerly was graded here but the exhibition building which then was available, not being given for the purpose, the grading takes place outside the Province.

About twenty thousand pounds of wool from members of the Association has been received and two or three thousand pounds still is to come. James Bremner Jr., of the Livestock Branch, Provincial Department of Agriculture, is superintending the shipment.

The road to New Maryland has been a matter of complaint for several years and recently a more round about route between New Maryland and Fredericton has been in use because better for cars.

Not in Repair.

The property through which the road runs for much of its distance in the city is that of the University of New Brunswick and as Crown property is not subject to assessment. On that account the City of Fredericton never has been very anxious to make heavy expenditure on the road and its repair has been neglected particularly for the past few years.

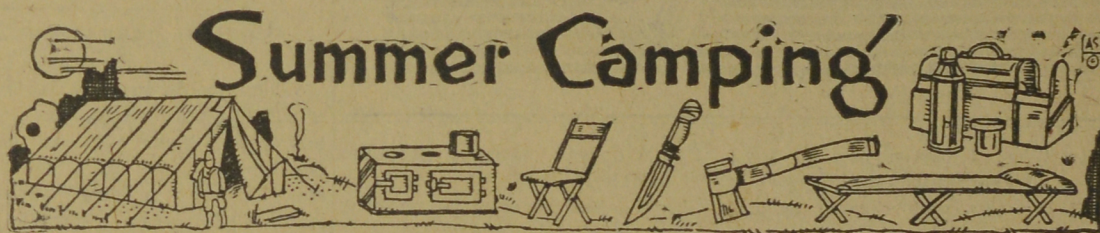
