## CHINESE HATRED OF FOREIGNERS IS GROWING

Shanghai, China, Dec. 3—Hatred of foreigners grows rapidly in China. Planted widely and lavishly cultivated, the seeds of malevolence find a fertile soil in this great people's poverty and distress.

The commonest of all plans of disseminating hate is to use the terms "imperialism" and "anti-imperialism." Although many who use them cannot explain accurately what the words mean, they are effective slogans. Generally anti-imperialism means righteous warfare against whatever the foreigners are doing and so the tendency increases to make foreigners, especially the British and Americans, scapegoats for China's many woes.

**Insulted in Streets.**

These circumstances help to give a tinge of adventure to life in China. To walk through the crowded streets of a provincial city, especially where the Cantonese have recently established their power, is a thrilling experience. To be called "a foreign devil" is nothing extraordinary. If the foreigner cannot understand the native dialect, so much the better. His ignorance is bliss. Otherwise in addition to bad names he will probably have muttered suggestions of "beat the foreign devil," or even "kill the foreign devil." Sometimes it is "foreign dog."

All this comes from grownup men and not children. It is true that foreigners are not often beaten or killed in China, but it is no exaggeration to say that the spirit of the Boxer riots is being resuscitated after these twenty-six years and nobody knows what the result will be.

Acts of violence develop occasionally. For instance, Dr. Paul Wakefield of the Rush Medical College and Mrs. Wakefield were assaulted in Hankow the other day by a crowd of young hoodlums waiting for a chance at foreigners. The Wakefields had gone down to the waterfront to take a sampan to Wuchang across the Yangtze and while the doctor was discussing the amount of the fare with the owner of the sampan the youth began throwing rocks and dirt. Mrs. Wakefield was hit repeatedly before she could enter the sampan. Only quick action on the part of the boat man rescued them. As the sampan was escaping, a grownup longshoreman made a vicious drive at Mrs. Wakefield with a boat hook and she narrowly escaped serious injury.

**Hankow Streets Barred.**

In Hankow, many observers believe that the growing hatred of the Asiatic toward the occidental will bring the first clashes that are likely to cause the powers to take notice. There the bitterness is less disguised and the sandbag barriers and barbed wire are never removed from the streets. Foreigners are obliged to be in a constant state of watchfulness. The steps taken by the British, French and Japanese are the more necessary because of the fact that the foreign area is now split up into great strips of territory by the disappearance of the German and Russian concessions.

Antiforeign feeling has spread rapidly in this triple city of Hankow, Wuchang and Yangang. Street oratory and poster proclamations are stimulated by the dream of a splendid Chinese capital to be established there as it probably will be, and naturally feeling runs high.

## PUBLIC OPINION EXPORT OF CHRISTMAS TREES.


