SIR HENRY DRAYTON DENIES THAT THE GOVERNMENT WILL GET RID OF NATIONAL RAILWAYS

Ottawa, Aug. 5—Belief that the Canadian National Railways will show an assured improvement in operating results this year over last, coupled with praise of the "tremendous improvement made last year," is contained in a statement issued today by Sir Henry Drayton, acting prime minister, and acting minister of railways in the new government.

Sir Henry denies that the Conservative government is in "some way or other going to get rid of the National Railways and in some way or other is going to hand them over, presumably to the Canadian Pacific."

The newspaper which made this prophecy, adds Sir Henry, also prophesied that he would replace Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National, or Hon. P. C. Larkin, Canadian High Commissioner in London, England. "The suggestion is untrue and is made merely for the purposes of the election," he added.

Praises Results on C. N. R.

The acting Premier added high praise for the results achieved by Sir Henry Thornton as head of the National Railways.

Sir Henry Drayton's statement follows:

"My attention has just been called to the fact that the Toronto Star is making prophecies as to what I intend doing after the elections, and is slating me for high office.

"I wish I could look upon the Toronto Star's interest in my welfare as personal to me, but I am afraid that such is not the case. During the last election this paper tried to make much of the fact that the Conservative party was in some way or other going to get rid of the National Railways and in some way or other hand them over, presumably to the Canadian Pacific.

There was, of course, nothing in its rumor of that date; there is absolutely nothing in the Star's prophecy of today, under which prophecy I am to replace either Sir Henry Thornton or the Hon. P. C. Larkin. This news, indeed, is news to me; but it is not news at all; the suggestion is simply untrue and is made merely for the purposes of the election.

Mischievous Words.

"Anything that is either said or written, which in any way disturbs the country's greatest undertaking, is particularly mischievous. The president of a large system, such as ours, represents more than himself; he represents the organization which he has built up and through which he functions. There have been differences of opinion in the past as to railway management but, as I have before said, there can be more difference of opinion as to the tremendous improvement made last year—the impressive economies brought about in transportation cost.

Looks For Improvement.

"I have now been acting minister of railways for some time, and am pleased to be able to say that I look for an assured improvement this year over last. These results have been achieved through the loyal co-operation of 100,000 employees working with, and behind, Sir Henry Thornton, who has been eminently successful in obtaining the most loyal co-operation of the executive and of the whole personnel of the system.

"It is simply mischievous to suggest that the system can be made the sport of politics or to insinuate that Sir Henry Thornton's position is in the slightest degree jeopardized. In order for him to obtain proper results his position must be certain and subject to no question whatever."

LAPORTE AND BUREAU NOT ON JOY RIDE

Quebec, Aug. 5—Hon. Ernest Laporte, former minister of justice, and Hon. Jacques Bureau, former minister of customs, were declared innocent of any charge of their having taken part in a "joy-ride" on board the customs steamer Margaret, at a special inquiry opened here today before Sir Francois Lemieux. R. L. Calder, government counsel and W. P. O'Connor, associated with him, and also Inspector Walter Duncan, who probed Montreal customs conditions for the late government, gave the exoneration.

There only remains to be produced the log-book of the Margaret, which was not handed in today through a misunderstanding on the part of Mr. Calder, who is in Ottawa, and this will be done Saturday morning. An interim report will thereafter be made by Sir Francois Lemieux.

Documents Examined.

"After examining all documents and after Mr. Duncan, Mr. O'Connor and myself have taken note of all relevant evidence and the crew of the Margaret having been examined, I wish to declare publicly and categorically that no incident occurred aboard the Margaret which could reproach against the persons named, whether Mr. Laporte, Mr. Bureau, or any of their companions." This was Mr. Calder's summing up. Mr. O'Connor and Inspector Duncan added their substantiation.

The presiding judge refused to allow A. J. Doucet, ex-M. P., for Kent, N. B., who had initiated the charges in the Maritime Provinces, to be called for examination. The same applied to John Sullivan, Conservative candidate in Chateaugay-Huntington, who had also referred to the charges in an address in his constituency. "We are here merely to find the facts, we will hear neither Mr. Doucet nor Mr. Sullivan," was the judgment.

Lapointe on Stand.

The Hon. Ernest Lapointe, former Minister of Justice, was called. The only time he had ever been on the Margaret was in July, 1923, at Prince Edward Island. He and others were en route home from the Hector celebration at Pictou, N. S., where they had represented the Federal Government and the Province of Quebec.

"Captain Alfred Lacouvoe," the witness said, "asked me whether I would care to go out to see the speed of his ship. We did so. I saw Mr. Bureau, Mrs. Bureau, their daughter and two little children."

Representing Hon. Mr. Lapointe, Hon. Lucien Cannon, former solicitor general, cross examined. His questions soon led Mr. Calder to protest that

SIFTON, JR. WILL RUN IN NORTH YORK

Newmarket, Aug. 4—Harry Sifton, son of Sir Clifford Sifton and a member of the ranks of the younger Liberals was the unanimous choice of the Liberal convention of North York as their standard-bearer in the coming election. There were three nominations at the meeting held last night which was attended by about 200 delegates—Col. A. E. Kirkpatrick, Captain Aubrey Davis and Harry Sifton—but the first two retired in order to make the choice of Mr. Sifton unanimous.

the range of interrogation should not go outside the official commission. He did not think the court should be used "for political argument."

"The question was whether the statements made are true or not. If they are proven untrue, it seems to me nothing further is necessary."

The questioning, however, proceeded, the Hon. Mr. Lapointe reading what Mr. Doucet had said about him, some editorials, and adding he had heard rumors that he was supposed to be in trouble with his wife.

"My family is here," he continued, "and if any of my adversaries care to inquire they can."

He denied formally that he had ever taken any trips on the Margaret of the nature suggested by Mr. Doucet or by John Sullivan, Conservative candidate in Chateaugay-Huntington.

SERIOUS LOSS FROM FOREST FIRE IN WEST

Calgary, Aug. 5—The destruction of one life, 8,000,000 feet of cut logs, valued at over \$100,000; two camps, bridges and culverts along a logging railway, store and machinery, constitutes the toll of the great forest fire near Donald, B. C., which is still burning, although believed to be under control.

While the fire situation generally is improving, there has been little or no rain and if the violent winds of the past few weeks continue, new outbreaks may be looked for.

The fire, near Donald, burning over the Columbia River Lumber Company's property; cost the life of a logger named Lindstrom. In his dead grasp he held the axe he had been fighting the fire with. He was within a few hundred feet of safety when suffocated.

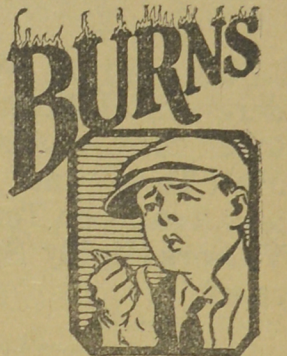

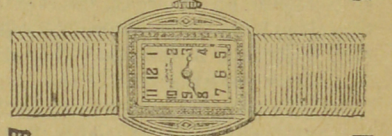
