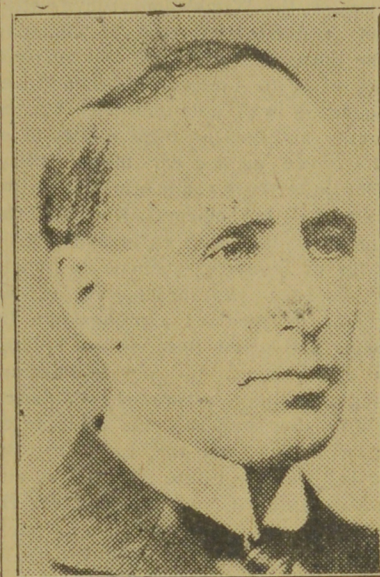

RIGHT HON. ARTHUR MEIGHEN HAS BEEN CALLED UPON TO FORM AN ADMINISTRATION

Ottawa, June 29—Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader, waited upon His Excellency, the Governor-General, shortly before midnight. It is understood that he accepted the task of forming a Government. Mr. Meighen declined to make any statement on his return from Government House. He said that he would make an announcement at noon tomorrow.

It is understood that Mr. Meighen will be sworn in as Prime Minister today. In this event, he will not be able to sit in the House, but it is expected that he will appoint acting-Ministers for the purpose of putting through the remaining estimates. Three probable appointees are understood to be Sir Henry Drayton, Hon. H. H. Stevens and Hon. Hugh Guthrie.

It is probable that Sir Henry Drayton will make a statement at the opening of today's sitting. As acting-Ministers receive no remuneration they are not precluded from sitting in the House of Commons.

Has King Quit.

Ottawa, June 28—Since Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King announced resignation of his government the rumor has been given wide circulation that he has likewise tendered his resignation as leader of the Liberal party. At Mr. King's office it is stated that nothing is known of any such action on his part.

Ottawa, June 28—The King Government has resigned and Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader, has been invited to form a new administration in its stead. Such are the outstanding developments in a day of dramatic surprises and swift action.

The House gathered at 2 o'clock fully prepared for a day of battle on the Customs report. During the week-end since the critical divisions of Friday, both Liberals and Conservatives had prepared moves and counter moves. But scarcely had the Speaker opened the House this afternoon when Premier King rose and quietly reading a slip of paper, announced that he had advised the Governor-General to dissolve Parliament, that His Excellency had declined and that he as Prime Minister, had therefore tendered his resignation.

Mr. Meighen suggested a conference between the Prime Minister and himself on the question of the completion of the session.

"There is no Prime Minister," Mr. Mackenzie King returned. "May I emphasize that? When there is a Prime Minister he may come to this House and announce his policy and his wishes."

It was all over in a few minutes. The end had come and the House adjourned almost before the crowded galleries realized what had happened.

As Mr. Meighen left the Chamber, he was loudly cheered by his followers. A few moments later, he was on his way to Government House where the Governor-General invited him to form a new ministry.

Tomorrow afternoon, the House meets again and new difficulties lie ahead.

Will Lose His Seat.

Mr. Meighen, once he is sworn in as Prime Minister, loses his seat in the House, as would any of his followers appointed to paid position as Ministers of the Crown. It is, therefore, suggested that acting unpaid Ministers might be appointed to put supply through the House. As Conservatives do not constitute an absolute majority in the House, it will also be necessary for Mr. Meighen to secure a certain measure of Progressive co-operation to put through supply.

Robt. Forke's Stand.

On this point, Robert Forke, Progressive leader, says: "I see no reason why we should not be able to pass supply. Beyond that I cannot say anything. Our party met this afternoon. It will want more light on things before we take a definite stand."

Progressives meet again tomorrow in caucus as do Liberals. The latter are to discuss their attitude towards the incoming administration during the remainder of the session.

Many Rumors.

There are rumors tonight that Liberals may endeavor to put up a barrage on supply with an endeavor to show that Mr. Meighen does not control a majority of the House. Another rumor, which lacks any confirmation in official circles, is that Mr. Mackenzie King is contemplating his resignation as leader of the Liberal party, with Hon. C. A. Dunning as his probable successor.

The feeling among parliamentarians generally is that dissolution will be the outcome of the present situation. When Mr. Meighen forms his cabinet, he will be faced by a series of by-elections and, in political circles, it is thought highly probable that he will decide on an appeal to the country.

FREDERICTON GOLFERS BEAT WESTFIELD

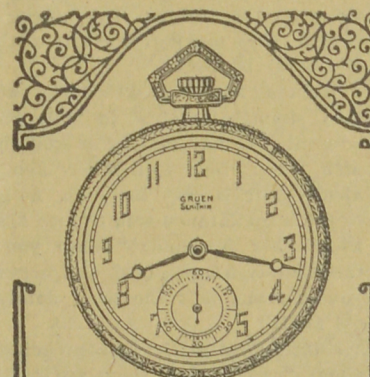

Institute re-dispersing with local High School graduation examinations.

None Proof Against Dishonesty.

Dr. Bridges asked about the working of the "Honor System" in United States Schools. Prof. Thomas replied that it did not always work well. He knew of no system that would absolutely prevent dishonesty in examinations.

Calixte Savoie of Edmundston objected to High School graduates having to repeat their work in Normal School. The Matriculation or High School Leaving Examinations and Normal School Entrance for First Class should be uniform.

Dr. Bridges said that country students allowed to enter Normal School were carefully sifted.

Miss Etta Losier continued the discussion, and said that pupils were examined on many subjects of no later use to them. There was much discrepancy in different teacher's markings. Pupils who "plug" just before examinations often make higher marks than those who work honestly the whole year.

Miss McGee of St. John did not favor written examinations for Grades I and II. Miss Fairweather of St. John agreed with her.

Community singing was then led by Prof. F. W. Harrison, the audience responding heartily.

The Country Teacher.

Mrs. Emma Prescott of Bale Verts read a paper on the Country Teacher and her work. She mentioned several country districts whose population was decreasing and recommended more intensive education in rural districts along agricultural lines. Rural schools generally lacked equipment, but teachers could remedy this largely.

Miss Prescott advised avoidance of slang in plays and recitations. Pupils should be exposed to the infection of good literature. Teachers should be pleasant and reasonable. Bible verses and the best short poems should be memorized. History should be a most attractive subject. The rural teacher

must have adequate preparations, high character, ability to rule, tidy in dress, imaginative and with a sense of humor.

Comment by Dr. Carter.

Dr. Carter heartily agreed with the paper. Thrift was accused of producing hard times. Disrespect for parents and the best traditions was fostered by slangy recitations, the so-called funny papers and some of the movies. He agreed with much of the criticism of different speakers on examinations. The Normal School should not be a place for receiving scholastic education. County aspirants for high school license had to attend graded schools. He did not believe in girls getting first class license the first time—it was better to work up. The country girl was more sociable as a teacher, and more adaptable to country districts.

Miss Etta Losier discussed school houses and how they could be improved and beautiful.

Miss Darling spoke along the same lines.
