Ottawa, March 17-Provision for he non-permanent active militia amounting to \$1,660,000 for the next fiscal year is made in estimates tabled today.

This is a decrease of \$50,000 from ast year's vote.

The provision for the permanent force is \$4,800,000, or the same as voted at the ast session of Pariament. For the nava services, the sum of \$1,500,000 is provided. This is \$80,000 more than voted at the ast session. Provision for the air service for the next fisca year amounts to \$1,800,000.




