HON. MR. TILLEY REPLIES

ing the time until the law was changed.

Agriculture

Agriculture, continued Mr. Michaud, was the basic industry of this province and all governments had given it their best attention. He knew that all government in this province had tried to encourage agriculture in every way they could. Reading from the Speech from the Throne in 1891, he went on to show that thirty-five years ago the very important subject of agriculture had been prominently before the country.

On the 12th of this month he had read in the press that the Maritime Provinces would starve if it were not for the products shipped in from other parts of the Dominion. We had to acknowledge our failure with respect to agriculture. No government, no individual, was responsible for that. One reason for the failure was that we had wrongly educated our farmers that the government could do everything for their success. This had been going on for forty years, and had produced the result that we were not producing enough for our own province. We were educating our own people away from the farm. Our younger generation were being educated along other lines than agriculture. The result was that the young population have not been able to find in this province sufficient work and have gone elsewhere particularly to the United States. This system of education should be changed immediately. Anything along that line advocated by the present government would receive his support.

Keep People Home

Immigration was another matter to which he would briefly refer. This government had appointed an official to get immigrants. He agreed with the President of the Council that the first step they should take would be to keep our own people in the country. The whole question was how to get people to come here. We must first invite them, see that they are properly protected, properly transported, properly located and become proper Canadians. The duty of selecting immigrants rested upon the Dominion authorities. It was also their duty to see that they were properly transported to this country. The duty of the province was to look after the distribution of the bringing in of immigrants from Central immigrants. There was a prejudice in Europe. These settlers were not the kind that should be distributed in Eastern Canada. Consequently if we wanted to look for immigrants who could easily adapt themselves to our way of living, we would have to look to the British Isles. There, again, was

the difficulty in finding people suitable to locate upon the land.

The old government, had been forced to embark upon the development of the water powers of the province, because in 1920 they saw that before long there would be a demand for electric power. But when the government began to look around they found that all the valuable water powers were in the hands of private parties, therefore they had to expropriate the water powers they desired. He wanted to say that notwithstanding the criticism in reference to hydro development the old government had been justified in going on as they had.

Period of Depression

He realized that there was an economic depression existing in these provinces. A campaign had been carried on in the Maritime Provinces to try and remedy the condition of affairs. Conditions had been ascribed to several causes; some attributed it to Confederation, others said it was due to the fact that the railways were not giving us the rights we were entitled to. Others contended that our natural resources were not being developed. He agreed that there was an element of truth in all these but we must face the situation as it is. It was up to them to find out the reason for our economic depression in the Maritime Provinces, and what remedy should be provided to bring about better conditions. When they could get together sit around a table and stop blaming this one or that one, they would get somewhere. He would like to see a Committee of this House represented of all classes and interests, get together and find out what was the matter and supply a remedy. He believed it could be done. It was up to the representatives of the people to grapple with the situation and bring about an improvement. If he could co-operate with any part of this House in doing that he would be glad to assist.

He hoped that the leader of the Government and all shades of opinion in the House would co-operate in directing the attention of the people to the vital necessity of doing something before it was too late.

He trusted that the cordial relations which had existed in this House in the past would continue in the future. He didn't believe in crying over spilt milk and he was willing to abide by the fortunes of war.

MR. SMITH (Carleton) moved the adjournment of the debate.

HON. MR. BAXTER moved that further consideration of the proposed Address be made the order of the day for tomorrow at three o'clock.

Adjourned at 6 o'clock.

it was reported that quarters of moose were being held in back settlements for the fox arches.

The general opinion of members was that the extra deep snow placed the game animals at a terrible disadvantage.

Bears Killing Sheep.

There was discussion on bears. Mr. Peck said that bears had killed many sheep in Albert and Mr. Oulton said the same of eastern Westmorland County.

Public Health.

Public Health was discussed. An under-expenditure of about \$4,000 was reported.

Mr. Michaud explained that warrants for over-expenditure for any particular branch under the department would be necessary, even if there was no over-expenditure on the total appropriation.

Mr. Oulton said the department was top heavy. He would suggest cutting down expense at the health centres.

Dr. Melvin Appeared.

Dr. G. G. Melvin, Chief Health Officer, who is practically Deputy Min-

ister, appeared before the Committee and explained items.

Dr. Taylor went into details of printing for the department.

Dr. Melvin said that vital statistics in his department were compiled much more cheaply than in Nova Scotia or other departments.

W. A. Loudoun, Comptroller General, appeared before the Committee.

Mr. Taylor inquired concerning the payment of \$2,400 to the Saint John Globe for printing the annual report and moved that Mr. Loudoun produce a statement of the dates on which payments were made.

Medical School Inspection.

Discussion opened on the matter of Medical School Inspection.

Mr. Taylor stated that the rural schools were not getting value for the money expended. The larger centres might be getting it.

Dr. Oulton supported that opinion. Dr. Melvin said that in his opinion inspection did more good in rural sections than in towns and cities.

Mr. B. F. Smith said there was chance to do more good there. He had been told that it had broken out in a school in Manguerville. It was closed and was reopened without the Department taking action.

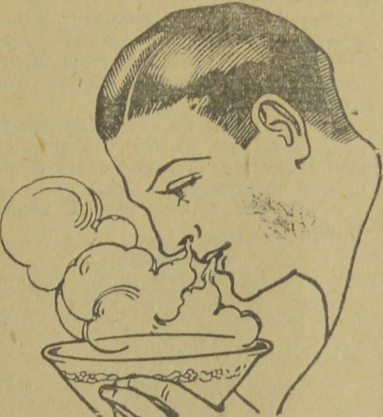
Dr. Melvin said that if the matter had been properly reported to the Department, action had been taken.

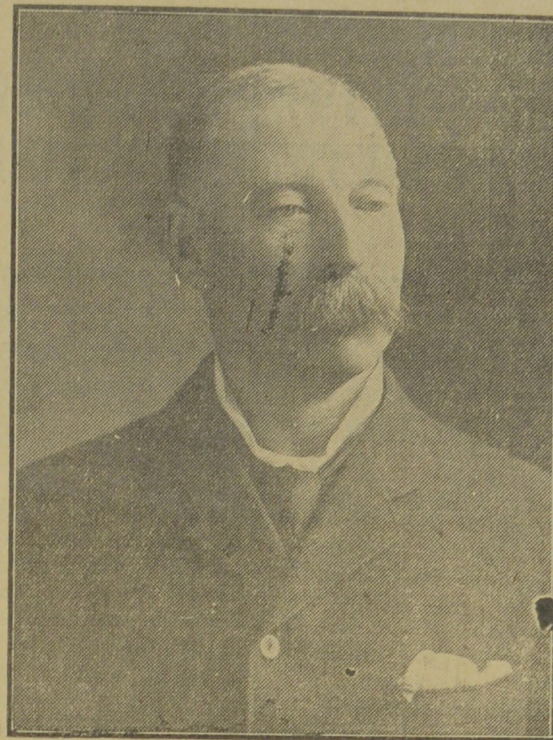
