

MINISTER FROM SCOTLAND FOR ST. ANDREW'S

Rev. J. G. Barry of Dalbeattie Requested to Come Here Directly—Congregation Held Meeting.

The congregation of Saint Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Fredericton, representative of the Continuing Presbyterians in Canada has decided to bring to Fredericton, Rev. J. Garrow Barry of Dalbeattie Scotland, with a view to have him become permanent minister of the congregation. A largely attended meeting of the congregation was held Thursday night in the church rooms, Queen street, at which various business matters were discussed.

Report Presented.

A report was presented by the Trustee Board and the Elders to the effect that they had been in touch with Rev. Mr. Barry with a view to extending a call to him. The information was given that inquiries had revealed that Rev. Mr. Barry is comparatively young with a family, and is desirous of removing to Canada to enter the work of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Asked To Come.

Mr. Barry has already planned to leave Scotland on the 20th inst. to come to Canada to look over the field and it was decided unanimously by the meeting that the congregation desire that on coming to Canada, he come direct to Fredericton with a view of becoming the pastor of Saint Andrew's Presbyterian Church and it was decided to send a cablegram to him, advising him of the action of the meeting.

Rev. Mr. Barry is of the Established Church of Scotland and at present is the Parish Minister at Dalbeattie and his work has been very highly spoken of.

Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Besides the parents one sister Muriel and one brother Carl survive. The funeral will take place Friday afternoon at 2.30 from 230 Westmorland street the home of the parents. Rev. I. A. Corbett will conduct the service and interment will be made in the Rural Cemetery Extension.

SUIT MONEY IN M'INTOSH CASE ORDERED PAID

Divorce Court Resumed Hearing of Case—Permanent Alimony the Point Which Will be Fought.

The Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes resumed hearing in the McIntosh case this morning and as a large number of witnesses are here the case is likely to occupy several days. The plaintiff wife Aine Drakeford McIntosh is residing in England having returned to her parents upon parting from her husband Dr. Lorne DeC. McIntosh of Hartland. The defendant was divorced in Maine since the departure of the plaintiff to England and was married again.

The suit has been before the court for some time delay being caused by the despatch of commissions to England for the purpose of taking evidence of the plaintiff. A discrepancy appearing in the matter of whether alimony was applied for or not, a second commission was despatched.

Commission Read.

This morning R. W. McLellan for the plaintiff announced that the commission had been returned and on instructions of the court he read the evidence. Mr. Justice Crocket was satisfied that application for alimony was intended and ordered that the money already paid be paid into court and be forwarded to the plaintiff. That amounted to \$200 for temporary expenses. The matter of permanent alimony will be decided later.

Two Witnesses.

Mr. McLellan then called witnesses for the plaintiff and Mrs. Minnie Attwater and Vernon W. Simms took the stand. Their evidence related to incidents in the domestic life of the plaintiff and defendant and to acts of alleged cruelty and ill-treatment. Cross-examination was conducted by W. P. Jones, K. C., Sheriff Albion R. Foster of Carleton County is one of the witnesses.

Standing Rules Committee.

The Standing Rules Committee of the Legislature met this morning for the first time. Hon. E. A. Reilly was elected chairman and the usual organization was made.

ONE BIG UNION RECEIVES SLAP FROM N. B. FED.

Organized Labor Body Wants O.B.U. Excluded From Proceedings Before the Commission on Conciliation.

The New Brunswick Federation of Labor which is meeting here in annual convention, this morning adopted a resolution which is a condemnation of the activities of One Big Union in the Minto coal dispute and which requests the Provincial Government to give support to the Commission of Conciliation in conducting an inquiry which would give full opportunity to representatives of the employees but which would exclude the O. B. U.

The Resolution.

The resolution as adopted by the Federation was as follows:

Whereas the Executive Council of the Government has appointed a Commission of Enquiry into industrial conditions involving the employees of the Minto Coal Co. and

Whereas, the attitude of the Government in this regard is in the opinion of this Federation deserving of commendation and

Whereas The One Big Union advocates have apparently been active in the situation and have apparently been recognized by the enquiring commission in the presentation of the case for the men, therefore be it

Resolved, that this Federation of Labor urge on the Executive Council of the Government that the fullest possible support and encouragement be given its commission, affording all possible opportunity to a proper and complete presentation of the case for the men by properly accredited representation of the men to the exclusion of the O. B. U. and be it further

Resolved, that this Federation lend its full moral support to the employers involved to the end that proper industrial condition may be established.
