Brigadier-Generals. In answer to a question in the House of Commons, the Minister of Defense pointed out that "there was never a substantive rank of Brigadier-General in the Canadian Militia." A temporary rank of Brigadier-General was abolished by Order-in-Council in 1921, when sixty Colonels were granted honorary rank of Brigadier-General in lieu of the lemporary similar rank held by them during the war.

Of the officers holding this honorary rank in Canada eight are on the active list, drawing pay which ranges between \$5,000 and \$6,500 per annum.
