UNIVERSITY HOCKEY TEAM WAS TOO GOOD

Defeated Marysville 8 to 1 in Wind-up Game of Season — Feeney Cut.

The senior hockey season made probably its last kick locally Thursday night when the University of New Brunswick cleaned Marysville up 8 to 1. Neither team had been doing much work lately but nevertheless presented a good game to the handful of spectators who turned out. Both teams are at practically full strength. Paul Fraser was missing from the U. N. B. defence but Jim Sterling was at centre and made a big difference.

The collegians scored early and often. An accident to Feeney the Marysville goaltender delayed the game for a long time. Jimmie Sterling in the first period sent in a high shot which struck him in the mouth. The injury was severe and Feeney had to be taken out of the game for medical attendance. Several stitches were required to close the gash. After a search Taylor of one of the Devon teams was located and was pressed into service.

The Scoring.

The U. N. B. team started scoring in half a minute Keene putting the rubber in. Keene, Steen and Keene scored in order before Charlie Wade made Marysville's lone counter. Jim Sterling then scored. He scored again and Steen and Keene right afterward.

NO BRIGADIER GENERALS NOW INCANADA

Ottawa, March 17—Canada has no Brigadier-Generals. In answer to a question in the House of Commons, the Minister of Defense pointed out that "there was never a substantive rank of Brigadier-General in the Canadian Militia." A temporary rank of Brigadier-General was abolished by Order-in-Council in 1921, when sixty Colonels were granted honorary rank of Brigadier-General in lieu of the temporary similar rank held by them during the war.

Of the officers holding this honorary rank in Canada eight are on the active list, drawing pay which ranges between \$5,000 and \$6,500 per annum.

WILL TRY TO PUT A STOP TO RUM RUNNING

Ottawa, March 17—"I hope it will be possible for us to co-operate to a certain extent with the administrators of the Provincial laws in an effort to put an end to rum-running and to protect not only the Federal revenue, but the revenue of the different Provinces concerned," stated Hon. G. H. Boivin, Minister of Customs and Excise when a vote of civil expenditure in his department was under consideration.

"Our preventive service has been lamentably weak on the coast, not only of New Brunswick, but of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island," said Mr. Boivin.

University of N. B. Won Basketball Title Beating Mt. Allison

Score 16 to 15—Red and Black Fought Hard at Sackville — Penalty Throw by Donohue Won the Game.

Sackville, March 18—By defeating Mount Allison by the narrow margin of a single point, the University of New Brunswick basketball team won the championship of the western section here tonight. Referee Harry Hutton got the game away at 8.15.

Lister took the first shot of the game and missed. Frank Thomas got the first point of the contest when he netted the ball after a foul by Fraser. A few minutes later Donohue tossed a foul on Wilson. Thomas got the first field goal of the game after four minutes of play and repeated a few seconds later.

The Red and Black were attempting to get in close but Wilson and Anderson were blocking well. The Mt. Allison combination was working well Ray Smith put Mt. Allison well in the lead with a fine basket from away out, and Lister repeated.

Lister threw another before the period ended, while Babbitt got U. N. B.'s lone field goal in this session, and his team mate, Seely, tossed a foul. Score at end of the first was Mt. Allison 12; University New Brunswick 4.

Second Period.

The second opened with Malcolm going for Thomas at centre. Smith got through after a fine dribble but missed his shot. Babbitt sent U. N. B.'s stock up with a couple of nice baskets. Smith got the ball from the throw up, and missed a long shot.

Donohue and Seely combined for a couple of field goals and the score was tied. At this stage of the game Thomas replaced Malcolm. Ray

Smith netted a foul shot, and a few seconds later Thomas sent Mt. Allison ahead with a field goal. Seely tossed a foul on Lister, and a minute later tied the score from under the basket. Donohue got what proved to be the winning point a minute before the end of the game when he netted a foul throw. Final score was 15-16.

Game Was Fast.

The game was fast right through, with Mt. Allison playing better basketball than the Red and Black in every department except shooting. It was a hard game to lose, especially after running up a substantial lead in the first.

For Mt. Allison, Lister and Wilson were good, while Anderson, replacing Rice, who is on the sick list, blocked well and effectively. Babbitt and Seely were the most effective for University of New Brunswick.

TORONTO UNIV. ELIMINATED PETERBOROUGH

Toronto, March 18—Displaying a superb brand of hockey throughout the play, Toronto Varsity senior intercollegiate hockey champions, defeated Peterboro senior O. H. A. title holders in the second game of their two game series here tonight by 7 to 1 and thereby won the right to meet Ottawa Gunners in the Eastern finals of the Allan Cup elimination series. In the first game Tuesday they defeated Peterboro by the same score as tonight's game, making the count on round 14 to 2. Varsity will meet Gunners in Ottawa on Saturday night and in Toronto on the following Monday.

SNOWSHOERS FETED AT ANCIENT CAPITAL

THE tramp, tramp, tramp, of four thousand snowshoes as they fell with regular thud over the soft, new snow which was falling in the night, was accompanied by glaring torchlights and with all the pomp and splendour which Quebec had to offer the two thousand snowshoers who had come from the furthestmost parts of Canada and the United States to participate in the International Snowshoers Union Convention which was held at the Ancient Capital recently.

Arriving on special trains the snowshoers were warmly welcomed to the city by Pro-Mayor Duquette. In true French-Canadian style they were given the freedom of the city and later were entertained at lunch. In addition to a smoking concert, a special church service was held at which hundreds of snowshoers, representing forty-seven clubs, were present.

In the afternoon of the first day six snowshoe races, involving three world championships and three Canadian championships, were held. The American snowshoers, not having sent in their entries by February 1, as required according to the International Rules, were

ineligible to compete for the titles, which all went to Montreal clubs.

In the evening the snowshoers were at the gigantic smoking concert which was held in the Drill Hall on Grand Allee. The next afternoon they took part in various attractions offered them and departed in special trains at night after attending the hockey match between St. Valier, of the Quebec City League, and the Lewiston Hockey team.

B. McKechnie, M.A.A.A., Montreal, won the 100-yard Canadian Snowshoe Championship, and the 220-yard World Championship, at the races. M. Martin, National Club, Montreal, won the 440-yard Canadian Snowshoe Championship. W. Smith, M.A.A.A., Montreal, won the mile Canadian Championship. G. A. Grites, M.A.A.A., Montreal, was first in the 880-yard World Snowshoe Championship. W. Montabone, M.A.A.A., Montreal, won the 120-yard hurdles, World Championship.

Among the visitors were three clubs from Lewiston, and another from Auburn, Maine.

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
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
